Last Week's Program:

Club Assembly and Foundation Jeopardy...



Foundation Month and our Club Assembly were put on hold last week due to the Gastineau Apartment fire where, miraculously, no human life was lost. Today, we'll be saluting the Foundation with our annual auction, but let's take a quick look at what the Foundation is, what President Ann was going to present last week — and see how well you would have done with the planned Jeopardy Game.

WHAT IS THE ROTARY FOUNDATION? The Rotary Foundation (TRF) is the nonprofit arm of RI. It provides support for humanitarian projects around the world, fulfill ing its mission of advancing world understanding, goodwill and peace through the improvement of health, the support of education and the alleviation of poverty. Every tax deductible dollar you contribute to the Foundation goes to one of three program areas — educational, humanitarian grants and probably best known, Polio Plus.

Along with the proceeds from today's Auction, it's hoped each member will contribute a minimum of \$100 every year (Every Rotarian/Every Year or EREY). Between these two efforts, we hope to reach our Club goal of \$12,000 for TRF and \$2,000 for Polio Plus. Members may make contributions at any time directly to the Foundation by mail or on "Member Access" on RI's website. Using *Rotary Direct*, you can set up recurring gifts over multiple years. Visit the Foundation's secure online contribution system at <u>www.rotary.org/contribute</u> to learn more. The online system can accommodate one-time or recurring contributions and can be dedicated to one of three specific programs: the Annual Programs Fund (*Every Rotarian, Every Year*), the Permanent Fund and PolioPlus. Enrollment is as easy as one, two, three: (1) Select your fund, (2)



choose your amount, and (3) indicate how often you wish to contribute.

So, on to the "Return to Jeopardy" — here are some of the questions you missed. To see them all, visit clubrunner!

This program, started in 1985, has benefitted more than 2 bil-

lion people and invested more than \$1 billion dollars.Q: What is Polio Plus and the US \$200 Million Challenge?

Since 1965, this program has benefitted more than 70,000 non-Rotarians in a program to promote international understanding about different cultures and professions.

Q: What is the Group Study Exchange program?



In 2011, 414 participants from 52 countries traveled to 73 countries under this program.

Q: What is the Ambassadorial Scholar program?

These three Foundation programs form the backbone of funding for programs that address health, hunger, and the improvement of human development around the world

Q: What are the grant programs of the Rotary Foundation? (Health, Hunger and Humanity Grants, Matching Grants, and District Simplified Grants.)

This program, started in 2002, has sent more than 600 to study at these centers under the Rotary Peace Fellowship Program. Q: What are the Rotary Peace Centers?
