A little bit about brown bears

LaVern Beier is a Wildlife Research Technician for the Alaska Department of Fish and Game's Division of Wildlife Conservation. His work with Alaska



Department of Fish and Game started in 1973 in Petersburg.

In this time period he has participated in a variety of wildlife research projects on many of the major islands and mainland of Southeast Alaska. These wildlife research projects have included the safe live capture, immobilizing and radio collaring and tracking of Sitka black-tailed deer, wolf, mountain goats, wolverine, elk, black and brown bears.

In addition to his knowledge and experience with a variety of wildlife species, from 1981 to the present, Beier has evolved primarily as a brown bear expert having captured, immobilized, radio-collared and tracked and participated in population estimates of

brown bears in study areas on Admiralty and Chichagof Islands and on the mainland from Misty Fiords National Monument to the south and up to Yakutat and Wrangell-St. Elias National Park Preserve to the north. In his career Beier has amassed nearly 1,000 bear captures in the rainforests of Southeast Alaska.

Beier also has a keen interest in the history of the fish and wildlife resources in Southeast Alaska. Because of this he is recognized among his peers as a wildlife historian. To compliment his interest in Alaska's fish and wildlife history he owns and has restored the retired Bristol Bay cannery tender Sultana. Built in 1937 by the Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea Company, he believes the Sultana is the last existing Bristol Bay Monkey Boat.
