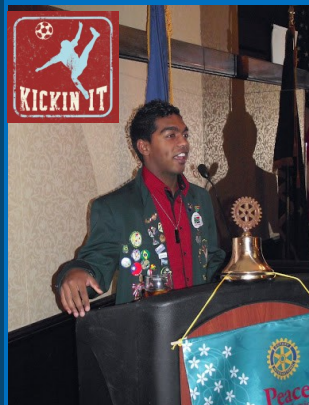


After a 33-year career in the US Coast Guard, Rear Admiral Jim Underwood joined the URS Corporation team in May, 2005. He led the company's Homeland Security program before transitioning to his current position in June, 2007, as VP for Business Development. Admiral Underwood now leads the marketing and development of URS Federal Services in Alaska and Florida. He currently works closely with URS I&E Division offices to develop new opportunities in the Miami, Tampa and Port Canaveral regions of Florida, and throughout our state.

Admiral Underwood's Coast Guard career included senior command and policy positions — ashore and at sea -- including serving as Commander of the 17th Coast Guard District in Juneau, where he first joined Rotary. During his Coast Guard career, he worked with an array of professionals to build strong alliances among public and private sectors (within the U.S. and abroad), improved international and interagency relationships, developed transportation security programs, generated comprehensive maritime safety and marine resource protection laws, expanded counter-drug and illegal alien interdiction operations, and promoted alliances with fishing and boating industries and associations.

Admiral Underwood graduated from the U.S. Coast Guard Academy with a Bachelor of Science in 1972, and Harvard University with a Masters in Public Administration in 1988. He has also completed numerous professional training seminars at Harvard University including Advanced Management Curricula and the International Security Forum in 2000. His military awards include the Coast Guard Distinguished Service Medal and two Legion of Merit medals.

He currently serves on several boards and holds positions in numerous community organizations including the Alaska Aerospace Corporation, the Alaska Military Force Advocacy and Structure Team, the Joshua Collingsworth Memorial Foundation, the Propeller Club of Port Canaveral, and the Cape Canaveral Lighthouse Foundation. He is also the Area Governor for RI District 6930 and is a Paul Harris Fellow.

Making-Up is Easy to Do



Whether you're working towards that 100% attendance pin, or just trying to catch up if you've missed a few meetings, there are many ways to earn a make-up. Just remember, make-ups should be reported to the club Secretary and can be used for a missed meeting that takes place within three months of the make-up. Here's how to make it happen:

- Attend a meeting at another club, including Interact and Rotaract;
- Complete a make-up online with an e-club — (<http://www.rotary.org/en/Members/GeneralInformation/MakeUpMissedMeetings/>);
- Attend a club board or committee meeting;
- Attend a club fellowship event (i.e. Cruise Ship Luncheon, Rowdy Rotary Picnic, Theatre Night, tonight's Fellow-Shoep!);
- Participate in a club service project (i.e. Glory Hole, Food Drive, Bell Ringing);
- Participate in a club fundraiser event (i.e. deliver roses, Brewfest, Wine Auction);
- Attend an event, fundraiser or participate in a service project for another club, Rotoract, or Interact;
- Spend time outside of meetings with our Inbound Youth Exchange student;
- Attend District-level meetings or conferences;
- Attend RI-level meetings or conferences, or
- Attend an informal fellowship gathering of three or more Rotarians (i.e. Young Rotarians, Out-the-Road-Rotarians). Notice must be given to the club President or Secretary in advance of this type of gathering.

Members who take on a role within the club that requires a significant time commitment outside of meetings (Secretary, Treasurer, Windjammer) will earn one make-up per/month.
