Dan Sullivan is Commissioner of the Alaska Department of Natural Resources, where he is responsible for managing one of the largest portfolios of oil, gas, minerals, renewable resources, water, and land in the world—including two of the largest oil and gas fields in North America.

Sullivan previously served as the State of Alaska's Attorney General, U.S. Assistant Secretary of State for Economic, Energy and Business Affairs, and as a Director in the International Economics Directorate of the National Security Council and

National Economic Council staffs at the White House. He has served in the U.S. Marine Corps since 1993 on active duty and in the reserves as an infantry and reconnaissance officer and is currently a Lieutenant Colonel in the U.S. Marine Corps Reserve.

Sullivan graduated *magna cum laude* from Harvard University with a Bachelors degree in Economics, and graduated *cum laude* from Georgetown University Law Center, earning a Juris Doctor and Masters of Science in Foreign Service joint degree.

BOARD REPORT: The board met on March 18. Keni Campbell presented a final recap of the finances from the Wine Auction. The board voted to allocate our portion, \$9,701, to the scholarship portion of the corpus (UAS Scholarship Trust), since we have sufficient funds in the spendable portion to pay out this year's scholarships. The

total amount in the trust (spendable and principal) is around \$80,000.



In other action, the board approved President Ann's proposal regarding the deposit of speaker honorariums to The Rotary Foundation. This year's speaker roster will result in a \$2,000 contribution to the non-profit, and for those speakers who are Rotarians, the funds will go towards their Paul Harris Fel-

lowship. The board will look into scheduling a fellowship to recognize our 100% Paul Harris Fellows Rotarians.

MARCH IS LITERACY MONTH

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Sergeants-at-Arms Scott Fischer Pam Halloran "New data released by the <u>UNESCO Institute for Sta-</u> <u>tistics</u> show that literacy rates for adults and youth are continuing to rise. But 775 million adults still cannot read and write – and many countries are unlikely to meet the Education for All goal of halving adult illiteracy by 2015.



"The new data show that the strongest literacy gains were for young women aged 15-24. Women still lag behind, however. In 2010, 87% of young women had basic literacy skills, compared with 92% of men. The UIS website features interactive illustrations of the new data by country, gender and in relation to GDP.

"The benefits of having a literate population are immense. Literacy increases people's self-esteem and creates opportunities to escape poverty. It equips women with the knowledge and confidence to participate in decisions that affect them. Literacy programmes also promote equity when targeting populations with a history of marginalization.

"Literacy can also clear the path to peace... Any government with a commitment to basic human rights and poverty reduction, or with an interest in removing a major barrier to economic growth, should therefore make reducing illiteracy a priority." 
Rose Sale Picking Up — Sales and Opportunities to Sell
