Rosenthal has appeared throughout


North America, Europe and Asia in

In 1995, the Kennedy Center commissioned Rosenthal to create and premiere a two-person show for young audiences. Strings & Stories, which combines storytelling, theater, mime, and music for solo violin, came from that commission. Along with Los Angeles actor Bill Blush, she performs this show in schools, libraries, museums and theaters for thousands of children across the country each year under the auspices of the New York-based Piatigorsky Foundation.

Rosenthal has commissioned and premiered many works for solo violin, electric violin, violin and piano and violin and narrator. Her solo CDs include Three American Sonatas, Favorite Violin Encores, Fiddle-de-Bop, Glacier Blue — Concerto For Violin and Big Band by Evan Solot, commissioned by Juneau Jazz & Classics in 2000.

Rosenthal received the Governor's Award for Excellence in the Arts in 1978 and an honorary doctorate of humane letters from UAS in 2005.
