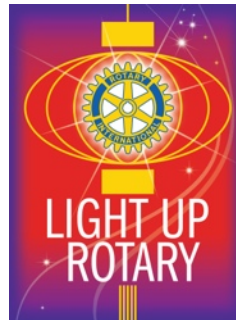
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all. It's about the people we help," said Burton. "At the end of the day, the only thing that matters in Rotary is how much better the world becomes because Rotary is in it."

The four-day event, which drew to a close on June 4, attracted more than 18,000 attendees from 153 countries. Burton encouraged convention goers to return to their clubs ready to do more to improve the lives of others.

"Together, we can dream big and we can achieve. We can change whole communities for the better, not for a day but for a lifetime," he said.

Rotary changes lives by improving literacy, making water cleaner, bringing better



health care to mothers and children, and eradicating polio worldwide, Burton said.

Members of Burton's Rotary Club of Norman, Okla., and President-elect Gary C.K. Huang's club of Taipei, Taiwan, took the stage to exchange club banners, a

tradition that unofficially marks a changing of the guard.

Huang will become Rotary International president on July 1. During his term in office, he has set a goal of growing Rotary's membership to 1.3 million. Huang told the audience that increasing and sustaining membership will help Rotary achieve its goals. He shared a story about a small Taiwanese club that had only six members. But after asking their wives to join, the club grew to 29 members in three years because the spouses asked their friends to become members as well.
