Pepperdine Provost Dr Darryl Tippins: "Ferment and Change in the Modern University: What Lies Ahead"



In front of an audience made up almost equally of Malibu Rotary Club members and faculty and administration of Pepperdine University Pepperdine Provost and Professor Dr Darryl Tippins delivered and address at the April 1 Malibu Rotary Club morning meeting entitled "Ferment and Change in the Modern University: What Lies Ahead".

Dr Tippins points out "The university, of all institutions, is one of the most remarkable in its resiliency, its longevity, and its centrality to human well being...If there are thriving civilizations without great universities, I do not know about them. While corporations come and go with amazing rapidity, great universities survive through the ages." He cited several universities in the were that still exist more than a thousand vears after their founding. "The longevity of academic institutions is due

to a paradox, namely, their willingness to adapt and change. John Henry Newman, author of *The Idea of the University*, once said that, —In order for a thing to remain the same, it must change often.|| Paradoxically, universities do well through the tides of history because they

simultaneously hold on to certain core values and purposes, while remaining flexible as they are buffeted by changing external circumstances."

Dr Tippins cited four trends that were touched on in an article in *The Chronicle of Higher Education* by American public policy analyst Daniel Yankelovich. The four trends alluded to were: TREND 1: CHANGING DEMOGRAPHICS: CHANGING LIFE CYCLES OF AN AGING POPULATION, (retired people going back to school, age group of students not the typical 18 to 22 year olds). TREND 2: GROWING VULNERABILITY IN SCIENCE AND TECHNOLOGY (the fact that young people in the Western industrialized nations, especially in the United States, are not flocking to study science and technology like their counterparts in other countries, TREND 3: THE NEED TO UNDERSTAND OTHER CULTURES AND LANGUAGES (most American college students do not get to study in other countries), TREND 4: PUBLIC SUPPORT FOR OTHER WAYS OF KNOWING (The logic of the Enlightenment that informed the founding of our nation assumed that as science gained ground, *other ways of knowing and finding truth — particularly religious belief — would lose ground*. But in our American culture, that has not happened. While higher education has grown more scientific in its quest for knowledge, the American people at large have grown more religious, more fretful about moral _truths, ' and more polarized in their struggle to find political and existential truth.

Dr Tippins, the chief academic officer at Pepperdine University, notes that Pepperdine is bucking many of these trends. It's typical undergraduate student is in the 18-25 age group. It encourages the study of science, technology and business, but also puts a moral and ethical foundation in its teaching, and hopefully business students won't be the morally corrupt ones that have caused the current financial crisis in this country. Trend 3, the need to understand other cultures and languages is very important in the Pepperdine Seaver College undergraduate program, and students are encouraged to study at one of Pepperdine worldwide campuses. Dr Tippins points out that Pepperdine is #7 in American universities in students studying a semester abroad, and ranks #1 in California in this regard. The study of world cultures and religions is deemed very important.

It is appropriate that Pepperdine has embraced Rotary as Rotary has embraced Pepperdine. Dr Tippins' father was a Rotarian in Oklahoma. It is not surprising that an organization (Rotary) that embraces the Four Way Test, an ethical standard to be used in business and in all way say and do, should meet on a campus where ethical standards are considered along with science.

Editors Note: Most of you know how strongly I feel about the Project TRIUMPH program conceived by Ilan Magdali of the Newbury Park Rotary Club. The program brought 10 teenage Arab and 10 teenage Jewish students from Israel to a leadership camp in Simi Valley where they all learned to work together, develop leaders skills before returning to Israel to use what they learned back home. Most of us feel helpless in trying to find a solution to the constant war in the Mid East, but at least this program is trying to do something, In the last issue of The Malibu Rotary Club Surfwriter I had written about e-mail communications I had had with Frances Fuji of the Project TRIUMPH organizing committee. She had written

"In light of the current economic climate and more challenging environment for securing grant monies, instead of hosting students this year, we are taking the opportunity to strengthen infrastructure in Israel and to establish collaborative relationships with aligned organizations.

Upon our request, Shaul, from the Rotary Club of Haifa, provided us with a budget and proposal to hire a part-time facilitator to be responsible for year-round support of both new Project TRIUMPH students and alumni. We are sending money to contribute to the facilitator's salary, and she has already begun meeting with the kids there.



We are excited about prospects for 2010 and beyond (the plan is to resume bringing kids over in 2010, assuming that we can raise enough funds in 2009) and believe we will emerge from this fallow year with an even stronger, more well-rounded

and promising program than ever before."

In a subsequent e-mail she had written about what some of the student alumni of the Project TRIUMPH program (many of whom we had met when they were here) were currently doing after participating in the Project TRIUMPH program:

"Our greater vision is to inspire leaders of tomorrow by imparting wisdom and broadening the perspective of high school students. Our first year students, who were here in 2006, are now in the army or beginning to build careers. We have stayed in contact with some of them through Facebook. Very soon, their generation will be making pivotal choices that will impact not only their region, but the world.

We're proud of all the young people we've worked with, and we thank you for your belief in them.
