Spreading Science and Technology to Young People Around the World



Pictured: Malibu Rotary Club President Chris Bauman (L) with Book about Science Malibu Rotary is Presenting to School on Wheels with Dedication from Bettye Davis Walker and Hal Walker Jr, Co-Founders of the International Science Discovery and Learning Center in Inglewood, CA and Rotary Matching Grant Computer Literacy Program in South Africa. **Hildreth** (Hal) Walker, Jr has worked at JPL and was at Hughes Research Laboratory in Malibu (now called HRL) in the 1960s working on the most powerful laser beam ever created a beam 200 times brighter than the sun. Laser's were invented at HRL and the laser beam Hal worked on was to be pointed at the moon, and used to measure the exact distance between the earth and moon by reflecting the light off a highly reflective object on the moon surface



measuring the time for light to reflect back. That special reflective object was a 24 inch retroreflector left by astronauts Neil Armstrong and Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin on the moon's Sea of Tranquility on July 20, 1969. The placement of Apollo 11's retroreflector was very precise and when the powerful laser beam was pointed at it it worked very well for Lunar Laser Ranging.

The Soviets had managed to put a retroreflector on the moon in 1971 *Lunokhod 1*, using an unmanned robot lander. Nobody, including the Russians, knew exactly where

the *Lunokhod 1* retroreflector was until 2010. The fact that the Russians lost their retroreflector was an embarrassment to them in the space race of the 1960s and 1970s. Not only did the Soviets lose their retrofreflector, it was American scientists that found it, although it took 39 years. In April 2010, the Apache Point Observatory Lunar Laser-ranging Operation (APOLLO) team from the University of California at San Diego used images from NASA's Lunar Reconnaissance Orbiter to locate the orbiter closely enough for laser range (distance) measurements. On April 22, 2010 and days following, the team successfully measured the distance several times. The intersection of the spheres described by the measured distances then pinpointed the current location of *Lunokhod 1* to within 1 meter. APOLLO is now using Lunokhod 1's reflector for experiments. Retroreflectors left on the moon by astronauts on the Apollo 11, 14, and 15 missions prove conclusively that man-made equipment is present on the moon, and thus disprove moon landing hoax accusations. Astronomers all over the world have reflected laser light from the reflectors to measure precisely the earth-moon distance, and have verified independently the existence of the reflectors at the moon landing sites.

Hal Walker's credentials in science and technology put him at the forefront when government officials and Rotary were looking for ambassadors to encourage the study of science. Hal talks about his two Rotary moments. In 1994 his California State Senator Diane Watson had asked him to go to South Africa. There he met a Christmas bell ringer, who was a Rotarian, who was trying to get a computer lab built in a farm school where they didn't even have electricity. The President of the Pretoria South Africa Rotary Club went to the legislature and asked that the extend electricity to the this farm school. In the end the legislatures agreed to electrify all the farm schools in South Africa.

Hal was able to meet President Nelson Mandela and brought with him students aged 9 through 14, from the former farm school, which has now become a great center of learning. President Mandela was impressed with the children.

Hal and Bettye now spend several months every year going to South Africa to help expand the computer literacy program to these farm schools. The schools have become learning centers for everyone in the areas they serve The Walkers have managed to obtain a very difficult to get "continuous" Rotary Foundation Matching Grant, and are looking for other Rotary Clubs to partner with them. Malibu Rotary Club President-Elect Kevin Boling has committed \$500 from the Malibu Rotary Club to this program next year.

Along with their International Science Discovery and Learning Center (located at 101 S. La Brea Avenue in Inglewood, CA 90301) Hal and Bettye, along with their A-Man, Inc 501(c) non-profit corp., have managed to bring young people in South Africa and Los Angeles together using skype. PBS recently did a report about this. They introduce kids starting in first grade to science in underserved communities. The center has a space simulator and has obviously been a mind stimulator and inspirations as their high school students have gotten into Harvard and MIT.

Rotary Japan and Pacific Islands 2011 Disaster Recovery Fund

Jim Dyer, District 5280 Disaster Relief Chair, sent the following message about what Rotary is doing through the Rotary Foundation in Japan's current emergency situation and how you can help.

The 9.0-magnitude earthquake, Japan's largest in history, caused a devastating tsunami that swept over northern coastal towns. At least 10,000 people are assumed dead, but government officials say the death toll will rise. The emergency situation is still unfolding but what is clear is the immediate need for money to support relief efforts and shelter.

In response to this massive earthquake and tsunami, The Rotary Foundation has established the *Rotary Japan & Pacific Islands Disaster Recovery Fund.* Also, ShelterBox, a designated Global Rotary Club Project, had response team members on the ground within 24 hours after the earthquake, one of the first international aid agencies to arrive in Japan. The first deployment of ShelterBoxes, including the provision of emergency shelter, water purification and lifesaving supplies are on their way to Tokyo with more on stand by.

During this initial response period we are encouraging District 5280 Clubs, Rotarian's and friends to support one of the Rotary affiliated relief efforts or other recognized international relief organizations like the Red Cross.
