

John W Elman "Frustrations and Rewards of Trying to Go Electronic"



Whenever you try to use anything electronic, whether it's turning on lamp, a toaster, or a computer, a lot of things have to go right. On a good day everything works fine-on a bad day nothing works. This is especially true if you are trying if you are using a Windows based computer. We appreciate the

great donations Bill Gates has given to the Rotary Foundation so I shouldn't really rag on him too much, but if any version of the Windows operating system actually was shipped without a multitude of flaws (a.k.a. bugs) then Microsoft wouldn't be sending out almost daily updates, security patches, and selling new versions of Windows every other year (try Windows 7 beta anyone?).

I knew a computer network guy who had these words of guidance on his invoices, "Repent, Reboot, Rejoice." Rebooting any electronic device seems to fix the problem most of the time, especially computers, modems and cell phones. Power off the device (remove battery from cell phone, unplug computer), wait a minute, then power it back on. It's as if when it didn't work the first time you tried it it was just a bad dream—it didn't really happen—just turn it off and turn it on again. This seems to fix computer problems 90% of the time. When it doesn't then you have to talk to the tech guy in the call center in India. He may or may not be able to help you.

When I set up the Malibu Rotary Club website at home I was anxious to share what I had done with the members of club. Although I could have taken pictures (screen shots) of the site I wanted my presentation on April 8 to be a real hands experience for those attending the meeting. I wanted to show how the links worked, how the login worked, what happened when you clicked on various places in the site. I wanted to show how members can interact with the site and update information. I knew we could project the contents of a laptop computer using the projector in the Fireside Room at Pepperdine, and I knew that previously I was able to connect to the internet in the that room using David Baird's laptop computer. I also knew the connecting to the internet at Pepperdine was not that easy. Through experimentation in previous weeks I found that I could use the wireless connection in my laptop computer and connect to Pepperdine's broadband internet connection when I was in Pepperdine's Payson Library. I also knew that although Pepperdine students, staff and faculty, could connect to the internet using wireless connections on the laptop in the cafeteria building I could not. Two weeks earlier when I was unable to connect the internet Fireside Room using my laptop computer I asked David Baird to bring his laptop computer and indeed his computer connected to the internet and to the Malibu Rotary Club website. I thought that the IT people at Pepperdine didn't trust us outsiders on their network in the cafeteria, even though "Guests" could log in at Payson Library. And if anyone had great Pepperdine login credentials it would be David, being Dean Emeritus, History Professor and author, who probably needs to get on the internet to do research for his books. That's what I thought. If anyone could get connected to the internet in the cafeteria building it would have to be David.

The morning of my presentation David brought his computer but said he had recently put in a Norton Antivirus update the night before and his computer had been acting strange ever since. I was already thinking this is not going to be a good day. Computer antivirus software has a way of making your computer not do what you want it to do, especially connecting to networks.

My presentation, predicated on connecting to the Internet in the Fireside Room, and which was based on graphic representation of images not seem went something like this, "On the left side of the home page you'll have to imagine you would see links about this and this...." I would have walked out on me had I been in the audience.

I promised the Rotary members that I would send them an e-mail describing how to log in to our new website. After one logs in one can go to a special e-mail sending tool on the Malibu Rotary ClubRunner hosted website. All the members of the club, as well as the honorary members of the club, are listed, and anyone logged in can send an e-mail to any or all of the other members (as well as the presidents and secretaries of all the Rotary Clubs in District 5280). President Bow and David recommended it be an assignment for the Malibu Rotary Club members, to log

in to the Malibu Rotary Club website at www.maliburotary.org and use it. To complete the assignment the members were to send me an e-mail from the Malibu Rotary ClubRunner site with the subject line "I DID IT!" Failure to do so would result in a fine of \$10.00 per offending member.

I composed an e-mail that had 12 steps on how to log on to www.MalibuRotary.org, how to edit your personal information on line, how to upload pictures, and instructions on how to send an e-mail to President Bow, David and myself.

But when I tried to send that e-mail that I had composed on and was trying to send from the Malibu Rotary ClubRunner site I kept getting error messages from ClubRunner saying "you have exceeded 8,000 characters" and the e-mail could not be sent. I tried composing and sending using several different Web browsers, including Internet Explorer, Mozilla Firefox, and Apple Safari. Part of the message went through using Apple Safari—the first 11 of the 12 steps in my detailed instructions to the club. The 12th step of my message was to click the "Send" box at the bottom of the ClubRunner Email page. By that time it was well into the night and the support people for ClubRunner in Ontario, Canada were not available. I left both e-mail and phone messages to "Support" at ClubRunner. In the meantime I used my Blackberry to use my maliburotary@hotmail account to send the 12th step of instructions to the Malibu Rotary members to complete their assignment.

By morning I received the following response from Sabrina S, Product Special at ClubRunner:

John,

I have just spoken with someone on our development team. He has informed me that a fix for this issue will most likely be published today by 1:00 PM Eastern Standard Time.

Again, I apologize for the inconveniences this has caused, and I am glad that you are promoting ClubRunner to your club.

Seeing as you had informed me over the phone that your club is fairly new to ClubRunner, I will like to take the opportunity to let you know that we now host Web Training for our software about two times a week. These training sessions go through all of the features of the software, and how to utilize them. In addition, other than the ClubRunner '101' sessions, we offer specialized sessions for certain features such as the Events section, eBulletin, Membership Attendance etc.

Editors Note: Most of you know how strongly I feel about the Project TRIUMPH program conceived by Ilan Magdali of the Newbury Park Rotary Club. The program brought 10 teenage Arab and 10 teenage Jewish students from Israel to a leadership camp in Simi Valley where they all learned to work together, develop leaders skills before returning to Israel to use what they learned back home. Most of us feel helpless in trying to find a solution to the constant war in the Mid East, but at least this program is trying to do something, In the last issue of The Malibu Rotary Club Surfwriter I had written about e-mail communications I had had with Frances Fuji of the Project TRIUMPH organizing committee. She had written

"In light of the current economic climate and more challenging environment for securing grant monies, instead of hosting students this year, we are taking the opportunity to strengthen infrastructure in Israel and to establish collaborative relationships with aligned organizations.

Upon our request, Shaul, from the Rotary Club of Haifa, provided us with a budget and proposal to hire a part-time facilitator to be responsible for year-round support of both new Project TRIUMPH students and alumni. We are sending money to contribute to the facilitator's salary, and she has already begun meeting with the kids there.



We are excited about prospects for 2010 and beyond (the plan is to resume bringing kids over in 2010, assuming that we can raise enough funds in 2009) and believe we will emerge from this fallow year with an even stronger, more well-rounded and promising

program than ever before."

In a subsequent e-mail she had written about what some of the student alumni of the Project TRIUMPH program (many of whom we had met when they were here) were currently doing after participating in the Project TRIUMPH program:

"Our greater vision is to inspire leaders of tomorrow by imparting wisdom and broadening the perspective of high school students. Our first year students, who were here in 2006, are now in the army or beginning to build careers. We have stayed in contact with some of them through Facebook. Very soon, their generation will be making pivotal choices that will impact not only their region, but the world.

We're proud of all the young people we've worked with, and we thank you for your belief in them.

Since then, Camp Bloomfield has served as a year-round residential camp for youth who were blind or visually impaired and their families. One of the first projects of the Rotary Club of Malibu after its incorporation in 1971 was to build the bathroom for Camp Bloomfield
