Marshall Thompson, Brad Davis, and Ciana Grove Talk About the Malibu Emergency Preparedness Network in the City of Malibu

Malibu Rotary Club President Margo Neal (2nd from R) presided over the meeting. Brad Davis is the City of Malibu Emergency Services Coordinator, and heads the Malibu Emergency Preparedness Network. Ciana Grove works for the Wilderness Institute in Malibu, which sells backpacks, like the one carried by Marshall, which contains essential items useful for survival in a large scale emergency. For those of us who have lived in Malibu for a few years we have come to expect natural disasters from minor to major. When the three speakers who came to address the Malibu Rotary Club on April 1 asked how many people in the room had lost homes in Malibu fires, at least 2 (Malibu Rotary Club President **Margo Neal** and the eldest Malibu Rotarian, Margo's neighbor **Fred Cornet**) both admitted to having endured such a tragic event.

We haven't yet had the big earthquake, but a major disaster could happen at any time. The City of Malibu Emergency Preparedness Program was established to coordinate the City's response to disasters, such as fires, floods, earthquakes, and storms.

Under the City Manager's direction, the Emergency Services Coordinator is responsible for maintenance and implementation of the City's Emergency Operations Plan, which includes:

Training of City staff and community volunteers
Equipping and managing the Emergency Operations Center (EOC)
Overseeing the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT)
Managing the City's emergency notification systems

Brad Davis is the city's Emergency Services Coordinator. He was previously was with FEMA and has worked for the City of Malibu for 11 years. His message was clear. Don't expect first responders—fire and paramedics to get to you during a major disaster. Roads into, out of and through Malibu might be blocked. There are only 17 fire fighters assigned to Malibu. In a large area fire they will have to chose where to deploy. You may not have or be able to get to food, water, and other essentials. That is why it is important that residents take the responsibility to be prepared, both in materials and training.

Brad Davis tells us to be aware and prepare. The Emergency Operations Center (EOC) in City Hall and the Emergency Preparedness Network (EPN) not only includes the Brad Davis and City of Malibu, but the Malibu Chamber as well. A member of the Chamber will be in EOC and members of Chamber are part of the EPN. Disasters affect residences, businesses and government. During major disasters 40% of businesses do not survive. An added value of chamber membership is being part of Emergency Premium Network.

To be prepared for disaster means to have a plan in place, and be self sufficient for at least a few days. The human body needs food and water to survive. A human can go for more than three weeks without food (Mahatma Gandhi survived 21 days of complete starvation), but water is a different story. A human cannot survive more than a few days without water. A Go bag is should be created with water and health essentials. If normal communications are down which out of state relative should be contacted? Where should everyone go?

Malibu City offers quarterly CPR/AED classes for \$40 per class

Brad's department also encourages and trains people to be part of the Community Emergency Response Team (CERT). This is a 21 hour class and is free.

Brad introduced Ciana Grove of The Wilkderness Institute at the Malibu Rotary Club meeting. Ciana had with her a backpack with survival items that is sold by the Wildlife Institute, which is located in Malibu. Among items in the pack was a water filter, that can be used to make safe drinking water from contaminated water. There was also food that when sealed has a shelf life of 30 years, and a shelf life of 1 year after opening. There was also wind up battery charger that can be used to charge batteries for flashlight, radio and cell phone.

It was great to be able to present to some of your members this afternoon at the meeting!

For those of you who were not in attendance we shared a two person basic emergency pack. The Malibu Emergency Preparedness Network is encouraging everyone to be prepared. Having an emergency pack in each of your cars and your place of business and home is a perfect way to start.

Feel free to check into other items in the store. The Freeze Dried foods are delicious and have a 30 yr shelf life and approximately 1 yr shelf life once opened.

Malibu Rotary Club Presents Check to Malibu Community Labor Exchange

The Malibu Community Labor Exchange opened its doors and hosted its first work lottery on August 31, 1993. Today, the City of Malibu continues to contract with the MCLE to run the site at a trailer office on L.A. County property near the Malibu Civic Center and County Courthouses.

The only paid employee of MCLE is Oscar Mondragón, who joined the Labor Exchange in January of 1993 after over 10 years working with Cesar Chavez and the United Farm Workers.

In 2010, the Labor Exchange celebrated its 20th Anniversary. Having registered over 5000 workers and helped facilitate thousands of day jobs at no cost to the workers or the hirers, Malibu's Labor Exchange is one of the oldest such hiring sites for day laborers serving all races and backgrounds in the state. It is supported by the City of Malibu, the Malibu Chamber, Wells Fargo Bank, local churches and other local service organizations and individuals. The is a 16 member volunteer board, currently headed by Kay Gabbard, which meets monthly.

Bill Wishard appointed Rotary District Special Olympics Chair

Bill Wishard is coordinating Rotary District efforts for the Special Olympics games being staged in Los Angeles July 25 - August 2, 2015. People in Los Angeles, and especially Rotarians, can get involved. Bill spoke about this at the Rotary District Breakfast March 31 at the City Club in Los Angeles, and will be speaking about it at the District Assembly on June 20th. The Special Olympics will have 7,000 athletes from 177 countries.

Rotarians to participate as volunteers "Fans in the Stands," or by sponsoring an athlete.
