Malibu Rotarians Go To Rotary District Breakfast on Tuesday July 31 to Hear Carol Pandak Speak on the Final Push to End Polio

Editor's note: Malibu Rotary Club members attended the Rotary District Breakfast on July 31 instead of having a club meeting on 1. Guest August Speaker at the District breakfast was Carol Pandak.

For the past 12 years, **Carol Pandak** has worked for national

and international nonprofit organizations, including the Society of Actuaries, the American Academy of Pediatrics and Rotary International. At Rotary, Ms. Pandak has spent most of her career with The Rotary Foundation. Currently, she oversees the day-to-day operation of Rotary's polio eradication initiative. She is in fact Division Manager for Polio Plus, and represents Rotary in meetings with its global partners in eradicating polio in the world. She works out of the Rotary International headquarters in Evanston, Illinois. She flew to Los Angeles just to speak at the Rotary District Breakfast on July 31, and update local Rotarians on the current status of polio.

Only one percent left of the world still is being infected with new polio cases. Thanks to a global partnership involving governments, the World Health Organization, Rotary International, UNICEF and the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the total number of polio cases worldwide has gone from 350,000 a year prior to 1988, to just 650 in 2011.

That is a truly amazing feat.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has removed India from the list of active polioendemic countries, following a year in which the country reported no new cases of the virus. Ghulam Nabi Azad, India's minister of health and family welfare, announced the decision during the Polio Summit 2012 jointly sponsored by the government of India and Rotary International, 25-26 February in New Delhi. Azad received a letter from Dr. Margaret Chan, head of the WHO, informing him that India's name had been removed from the list. India's recent success has proven that eradication is possible. Not so long ago, people thought that India would be the last place on earth to stop transmission of the disease. Yet despite the difficulties, the four partner agencies of the GPEI, the Indian Government and the Indian people worked together to see it done.

Although 50 % of the funding of the India Polio eradication program came from the Rotary Foundation, 24% was self funded by the government of India.

Rotary Foundation launched the worldwide Polio eradication program in 1985, after success it had seen earlier in immunizing children in the Philippines. Polio afflicts children under age 5, and to completely eradicate the disease children need to bet booster shots until age 5. Salk's original vaccine was developed in 1955 and by 1963 Dr Albin Sabine developed oral Vaccine to include protection against three strains of polio and was licensed as "trivalent oral poliovirus vaccine" (OPV). OPV was the vaccine of choice for the United States and most other countries of the world from 1963 until changes in U.S.policy in the 1990s. In 1988, an enhanced-potency IPV formulation became available and by 1997 had become part of the routine schedule for infants and children, given in a sequential combination with OPV. In 2000, an all-IPV vaccine schedule was adopted in the United States. We have been told that polio has been eradicated in all countries of the world except Afghanistan, Pakistan and Nigeria. It turns out that one country in which polio was eradicated had a few cases last year. That country is Chad, which neighbors Nigeria, and which had visitors from Nigeria bring the disease back to Chad.

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And there's public opposition tied to reports the CIA used a fake vaccination program to hunt down al-Qaeda leader Osama bin Laden. In some places people did not let the children have the oral polio vaccine (OPV) because it carries live polio virus. The change to an all-IPV schedule in the United States occurred because the few cases of polio that were occurring (8-10 per year) were caused by the OPV vaccine itself and not the wild virus. The change to IPV protects individuals against paralytic polio, while contracting polio from the live oral vaccine. OPV is better at stopping the spread of the virus to others, but now that wild (natural) polio has been eliminated from the Western Hemisphere, this advantage is no longer a consideration in the United States. IPV has been used exclusively in the United States since 2000. However, in other countries where wild polio is still a threat, OPV is still used. It is much easier and faster for non-health worker volunteers to give the oral vaccine than the injected.

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it's PolioPlus campaign.

This year effort to finally eliminate polio has been stepped up like never before. Advertising campaigns featuring sports and entertainment celebrities are seen on TV commercials doing "This Close," promos, indicating how close we are for polio eradication with the help of people throughout the world.

The government leaders of Afghanistan, Pakistan, and Nigeria are all on board now with Rotary, WHO and the PolioPlus campaign.

According to a statement released by Afghan presidential palace, Afghan president Hamid Karzai was awarded a medal by Rotary International for his efforts to eliminate Poliomyelitis virus in Afghanistan.

The source further added, Kalyan Banerjee president of Rotary International following his meeting with the Afghan president Hamid Karzai awarded him an award and praised him for his efforts and campaign to eliminate Poliomyelitis virus.

Rotary surpassed the Bill and Melinda Gates challenge in raising \$200 million for PolioPlus (Rotarians raised \$227 million). Rotary has donated \$405 million dollars in

A country is not certified as being polio-free until 3 to 4 years after the last new case. We are not there yet. And the last part is the most difficult because of the dangers of security and those last 3 countries. Three polio workers were recently shot in Pakistan, and Afghanistan is in constant war.

But we are optimistic that these challenges will be overcome and the devastating disease of polio will be eliminated.

September. Before he left he explained " My route will take me through eight different beginning countries, and ending in Singapore, and the yearlong trek will be an ongoing effort to raise funds for the ICSF and awareness for children living with clefts in the developing world. I chose to base this trip in Southeast Asia because of the region's high prevalence of cleft births."
