Jaim Le Talks About is RYLA experience

Editors note: Each spring between 180 and 200 high school students from Rotary District 5280 in the greater Los Angeles area meet for 2 ¹/₂ days to improve their skills as leaders in their communities. Students participate in experiential learning activities, including active leadership workshops, team building activities, and a RYLA Olympic and talent show. Set high in the San Bernadino Mountains the camp is breathtaking and completely private, giving the students a peaceful environment in which to learn more about themselves and their peers. The local program is part of a worldwide program provided by Rotary International in which thousands of students participate.

Jaime Le will be a senior at Malibu High School this year. Last year his friend Keaton told him about great experience he had when he was selected by the Malibu Rotary Club to go to the RYLA camp in the San Bernadino Mountains. At the August 17 meeting of the Malibu Rotary Club told the Rotarians that he an Keaton were alike in many ways, and liked a lot of the same things. On Keaton's recommendation Jaime applied for and was approved by the Malibu Rotary Club to attend the camp. He said that his expectations were already high for the camp before he went there, but he told the Rotarians that his experience surpassed his expectations.

Jaime told us that when he arrived at the camp the only other person he knew was the Malibu student this year, Malibu High School student Nick. Jaime said that when he arrived at the camp everyone was devided into smaller groups to work on various activities. He said the group he was assigned to were kids who were mostly in the South Bay area. We welcomed the chance to meet new people, and said that on the Malibu High sports teams that he was in they did not play any teams in the South Bay area and he enjoyed broadening his scope of peers who would become friends. The activities that the RYLA camp did, involved trust and problem solving together. One of the activities involved Improv. He had to pick up ideas that others a started and "go with the flow." You don't say no to idea that you might not have considered before.

Jaime said he learned about 4 personality types. He said that all the personality types are necessary for an organization to function. Some people a leaders who delegate. Some people like to be told what to do, and like to do the grunge work. Some people are intellectual and like to talk about ideas. When asked what personality type Jaime was he said he was intellectual. One of the activities Jaime participated in a the camp was the task of creating a budget on a product his group worked on as an assignment.

When asked how he implement things he learned at the RYLA camp into his life as he begins his senior year a Malibu High Jaime replied that he will find a lot of usefulness in leadership skills acquired at the RYLA as he leads the Robotics Club at Malibu High School. He said the Robotics Club is given an assignment to create a robot that performs a certain task, like hit a volleyball. The club competes against robotics clubs in other schools. He believes skills learned at the RYLA camp will him do this.

Editors Note: Rotary International and the local Rotary District sponsor two types of youth exchanges. The most common one is for a year, and is generally opened for students to spend their entire senior year of high school in another country living with a Rotary host family. Rotary District 5280, in addition to the one year program offer a short term summer program which gives students the opportunity to spend 3 months during the summer overseas. Grace Stickeny and and Ryota Shimada particiapated in the short term program shis summer.

Grace Stickney Talks About Her Experience as Exchange Student to Japan

Grace Stickney is a 15 year sophomore at Malibu High School. This summer she became a Rotary Exchange student to Japan and was able to go to the home of Ryota Shimada in Shizuoka Japan. She said the Shimada family included Ryota's older brother, his parents, and a poodle dog. Shizuoka is aout three hours from Tokyo, and not many foreigners go there. It allowed Grace to completely immerse herself in true Japanese culture. Prior to her trip Grace had taken 6 months of Japanese language courses online. Her Japanese is still very limited so she was thankful that Ryota's mom had been a foreign exchange student to America and spoke much better English than Grace spoke Japanese. The extended family had many younger children, which worked well for Grace, because she enjoys playing with and teaching children.

In Japan Grace with to Ryota's high school. There was an intramural sports tournament going on at the school and Grace got to play basketball. She also attended a music class. Kyota plays violin and Grace plays guitar. She found herself giving elementary guitar lessons to some Japanese students.

Grace also visited a girls high school. She was given a chance to play harp at that high school. One thing Grace really enjoyed while in Japan was the Fire Works Festival. Grace said that this is a regular event in Japan, and unlike the Fourth of July in the US goes on several weeks. The fireworks are coordinated with music and the result is an artistic entertainment that is very captivating.

Grace also played volleyball while in Japan. She enjoyed it so much she plans to play volleyball this year at Malibu High School.


In addition to activities around Ryota's home Grace the Rotary District in Japan sponsored a trip to Kyoto where Grace was able visit that cities temples and shrines. A highlight was playing word games with members of the Rotary Club there.

Grace was able to pack in as much as she could in the three weeks she spent in Japan . She feels she was able to bond with people despite the now being fluent in the Japanese language. Asked about difference between American and Japanese culture Grace said that the Japanese are able to pick up on little things that Americans don't notice. She also said that there is a formal way, and respect that they have that does not seem to prevail in America.

Ryota Talks About his home and his visit to Malibu

Ryota Shimada said that he is learning to speak English and his participation in the Rotary Youth Exchange is part of that goal. He has been aware of Rotary for some time. His grandfather is a Rotarian in Japan. Ryota said that the city he from is near Mount Fuji, and Mt Fuji is depicted on the Shimizu-Chuo Rotary Club flag. When the group of Japanese students visited the Los \Angeles area (as part of Rotary District 5280 exchange) the Japanese students met with the American students and they all went to Camp Stevens for a week. They also visited and attended several concerts at Music Academy of the West in Santa Barbara. Because he spoke limited English he depended on Grace to help him explain his experience, which was obviously a positive one.
