Malibu Rotarian Peter Formosa's Craft Talk— **Engineering Project** Manager, Food & **Beverage** Industry, Restaurant Owner Reinvents Himself as **Financial Advisor** 

Peter Formosa
was inducted

he had

a member of the
Rotary Club of
Mount Shasta

California. When Peter joined the Mount Shasta Rotary Club it was when he was the manager and owner of the Mount Shasta's Bagel Bakery and Café. He was in the restaurant business for 9 years (1988 to 1997). When we think of Rotary club members giving a craft talk, the member talks about his occupation. In Peter's case, we are sure the craft talk he gave in Mount Shasta was much different than the craft talk he gave to the Malibu Rotary Club February 27, 2012. Depend on the year Peter has had many crafts.

Peter was born in San Francisco, CA, where the city icons are cable cars, the golden gate bridge, and the TransAmerica Pyramid building. When Peter lived in San Francisco he looked at the TransAmerica looked at the TransAmerica building never dreaming that lives fortunes would have him associated with the company many years later. What he did when he left home had him doing many different things.

After Peter graduated from the University of Santa Clara with a BS in Mechanical Engineering he was set to work for Boeing in the aerospace industry when the industry tanked. He went into the food and beverage industry, was a chef.

By 2000 he was using his engineering skills in Windser, CA as a Project Manager for American Tank Company which makes large water tanks. From 2002 until recently he was Projector Manager for Alchemical Solutions, a startup company based in Ashland Oregon, where he was dealing installation and refinement of engineered Flammable Liquid Class 3 production equipment.

Meanwhile he had a family and his daughter Chrystal had moved to Southern California and said the weather was fine. And that company with the pyramid building that he used to see in San Francisco, TransAmerica, had a position as a Financial Advisor, that he felt he could do.

Now Peter was ready for his year 2013 craft talk—on being a Financial Advisor. While Peter has changed a lot since leaving San Francisco, so has TransAmerica. In 1999 TransAmerica was bought by Aegon, a multinational company headquartered in The Hague, Netherlands. Peter joked that TransAmerica people call Aegon their rich Dutch Uncle.

Peter repeated a quote attributed to Mark Twain: "When I was younger I used to think money is everything. Now I know money is everything."

Peter said the Mission Statement of the TransAmerica Financial Advisors is "No Family Left Behind."

His job his seek out younger middle class families, and after listening to their goals and aspirations, analyzing their data, and to educate and advise them how to achieve their goals—retire with dignity. He brings the data back to various specialists at TransAmerica, who certified in various areas—insurance, investments, and other areas. The Financial advisors figure ways to realize the Dream Map. Things considered are cash flow (including saving, alternate income streams) protection (insurance), debt management (credit card debt, which is sometimes the number thing to overcome), having an emergency fund, and asset accumulation.

Peter says the initial hour consultation with the client is free. Fees are based on commissions on the financial products sold.

Peter admits that his newest craft is a departure from his previous ones but he likes it.

## Other News From Last Malibu Rotary Club Meeting

Peter Formosa began his presentation by reading a thank letter from Malibu Rotary Club High School Music Competition winner Hailey Hoffman, thanking the Malibu Rotary Club for having the Competition and allowing her to compete in the district event on March 9<sup>th</sup>. Peter noted that participating in this event was one of the many things he enjoyed about being in Rotary. He also has enjoyed the networking of all the people in Rotary. He wants the help the Malibu Rotary Club increase membership and found himself, along with Malibu Rotary Club President, being appointed membership chairman.

Current Malibu Rotary Club President **Bill Wishard** is also the club President-Elect, and as such attended PETS (President Elect Training Seminar) again during the previous weekend. Bill said that there were 700 people dining in a room designed for 500. He said that it was the biggest and best PETS yet, with great speakers and announcements of many changes on the horizon for Rotary and the Rotary Foundation. Some of the changes include the fact that with increased size of the Rotary District, District Governor-Elect Doug Baker, who volunteered to again be District Governor following the untimely death of Governor Elect Jim Dyer, is not going to have each club spend a lot of time doing an "Awards Book," as we have in the past. The Awards Book reports involved a lot of time and energy with competition among clubs, while the biggest competition should be the energy we expend on doing projects like eradicating polio. Also because of the enlarged District of 73 clubs, the District Governor himself is not going to visit each and every one, he will get to as many as he can, and Senior Assistant Governors will visit and get his message out to the rest. The clubs and district will have more control of Rotary Foundation money and how it is spent. We will hear more about these changes of Rotary administration as the year unfolds.

Bill said it is important that members of the club attend the District Assembly where plans for the coming Rotary year are announced. He said by not knowing when things are happening and missing deadlines the club may not get a chance to do things that it might participate in. As an example of missing deadlines he pointed out that we did not have our

music competition until February when the District deadline for presenting an entry was January 31. Fortunately we still were able to get our entry (Malibu High School vocalist Halley Hoffman) into the high school district competition which is being held at Loyla Marymount University March 9<sup>th</sup>, but it was only because the district chair of the event allowed us to submit a "name to come," after deadline entry.

Bill also talked about his friend Page Jones, son of Parnelli Jones, whom Bill had met while both were recovering from brain trauma accidents at Daniel Freeman Hospital. Page gave his first public speaking appearance at the Malibu Rotary Club at Bill's urging. Page has now spoken at 10 Rotary Clubs and at a Rotary District Conference and was about to give his latest speech this week, which was being covered by TV news crews.

Bill urged all members to attend the next Rotary District Breakfast March 12 at Westin LAX hotel. The theme of the Breakfast is New Generations and speaker is Amanda Wirth Rotary, whom he had heard about at PETs as very inspiring, and who will talk about how she went from being a Youth Exchange Student to accomplished Public Health Advocate. Because Bill wanted to members to go to District Breakfast he wanted to cancel the Malibu Rotary Club meeting scheduled for noon on March 13<sup>th</sup> at Tra di Noi Restaurant at which Mike Kelly was going to speak. After the February 27<sup>th</sup> meeting Maggir and John made arrangements to cancel the March 13<sup>th</sup> Malibu Rotary Club meeting

Malibu Rotary Club Past President Chris Bauman brought up two subjects for club consideration. He said the club needs to define itself better in the community—do something more in the community that everyone can identify with the club, and that would attract new members. The other subject that Chris brought up was an idea he had of wanting his young daughter experience visiting a retirement home—the experience might be good for both child and residents of the retirement home.

the country, changed the name to Miramar, and imprisoned him. When Rotary sponsored a Global Peace Conference in Honolulu in January 2013 with Burmese liberator Aung San Suu Kyi as keynote speaker, Jimmy jumped at the chance to attend with Malibu Rotary Club President Bill Wishard so he could ask Suu Kyi and important question concerning his people. He took many pictures at the conference, meeting Rotary leaders including Rotary International President Tanaka, whose theme has been global peace. Mehm Mon, is not only named Mon, but is of the Mon ethnic group. The Mons were believed to be one of the earliest people of continental Southeast Asia. As the eastern Mon were absorbed into the Thai society long ago, the western Mon of Burma have largely assimilated into Burmese society. In Burma, the Mon are fighting to preserve the Mon language and culture, and regain a greater degree of political autonomy. The Mon were responsible for the spread of Theravada Buddhism in Burma and Thailand, which is the earliest form of Buddhism
