

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

Tommy Hawkins and "Life's Reflections: Poetry for the People"

**Editors** Note: Growing ир in **Minneapolis** Minnesota I was always a fan of my home team Minneapolis Lakers. With George Mikan as the first great big man in the game, the Lakers won 5 championships before my family moved to Los 1957 Angeles in when I was 13. When you're 13 you where **g**0 your parents go, but I missed friends and team. When тv Mikan retired in 1956 the team fell apart, but with a losing record they were able to get the best college players

in the draft. In 1958 the top player in college, and soon to be one of the best all-time players in the NBA they were able to pick Elgin Baylor. The next year the Lakers selected Notre Dame's best all-time player Tommy Hawkins. And the following year they selected Jerry West. I was happy when my home team Lakers followed me to Los Angeles in 1960. Except for me, according to Tommy, few people in Los Angeles knew about the Lakers. The first year the games were not even broadcast on the radio, and they only had 3000 fans at games in the new LA Sports Arena. Players had to drive around in trucks with bull horns promoting the team and announcing the existence of Laker games. The Lakers made the playoffs that first year but it wasn't until they hired local sportscaster Chick Hearn to do the playoff games on radio that the Lakers popularity soared, in Los Angeles, and later throughout the world.



Tommy still holds the record for the most rebounds at Notre Dame, averaging 23 points and 17 rebounds a game his senior season. Tommy played in the NBA for 10 years, and in additon he was the player representative while in the league (the roll that Derek Fisher currently has). He has adapted his life to various careers and situations. In high school and college he was a 6 foot 5 "back to the basket" center on these basketball teams who played near the basket, and a top score. When he got into the NBA they considered him too small to play center and changed his position to "small forward", playing away from the basket where he could not

shoot, and he was forced to swallow his ego as he was relegated to the bench, rarely getting into games. One day when the Lakers were playing against the St Louis Hawks Bob Pettit was scoring at will against the Tommy's team. The coach called a time out asked his players "Can anyone stop Pettit?" At the end of the bench Tommy said he could do it. He stopped and after that, although he wasn't a starter, Tommy would come off the bench in every game to become the defensive stopper against opposing teams' best scorers. Many basketball players go into broadcasting when their playing careers are over—but the broadcasting is generally having to do with commenting on basketball. Tommy went into both radio and TV broadcasting, and he covering all sports and other areas of human interest. For a long time he was associated with KABC sports, which broadcast the Dodger baseball games, and so impressed the O'Malleys they made him Los Angeles Dodgers Vice President of Communications. Growing up in Chicago he was introduced to jazz music by his brother and got to know the great artists of day as they performed in Chicago. The great Cannonball Adderley was a guest at his house and he remains friends with jazz guitarist and head of UCLA Jazz Program Kenny Burrell. Until recently Tommy hosted a jazz program on KJZZ radio. I have been a fan of Tommy's for over 50 years, and seen him around Malibu, where he has lived for the past 30 years, but hadn't met him till this meeting, and appreciate the time I got to spend with him both at the Rotary meeting, and in a one-on-one interview afterward.

Tommy Hawkins was the best high school basketball player in Chicago in 1954. So good that he was offered a full scholarship to Notre Dame University in Indiana. Today's talented college basketball players typically only spend a year or two in college, using it has a stepping stone to a lucrative professional basketball career without intending to get a college degree. In the 1950's, the college scholarship was worth more than a professional sports career. Two of the best basketball players of all-time, Elgin Baylor and Jerry West, only made \$20,000 per year playing for the Lakers in the 1960's. Tommy realized that his college education and degree would be useful many years beyond his basketball playing days. At Notre Dame in 1955 he was one of only 10 black students on a campus of 10,000, and the only the black student on the basketball team. He has nothing but praise for his alma mater and his treatment there, especially the President of the University Father Theodore Hesburgh. Father Hesburgh let it be known that if any of the black students were not treated well at the University, he would not tolerate it.

Tommy's record performances on the college basketball court made him a first round NBA draft pick, but what he learned in the classroom was even more important preparing him for life, and his many careers after basketball. Tommy said that the typical class size at Notre Dame had 20 students. This allowed students access to professors and encouraged students like Tommy to become comfortable as public speakers.

During Tommy's sophomore year at Notre Dame there was a class on his schedule that he thought he would snooze through, but instead the class shocked him into a reality he had never known, one that one changed his life. It was one of his English Literature classes. On the first day of class at the front of the classroom stood a tall priest who spoke with a deep voice that resonated in the classroom . You couldn't ignore him even if you wanted to. He introduced himself as Father Chester A Soleta. "My specialty is poetry and I will make it live in your soul!" Making good on his promise, he introduced Tommy and the others in the class to poet T.S. Elliot, dramatically reading his composition *The Love Song of Jay Alfred Prufrock*. The reading changed Tommy's world, engendering a lifelong love of poetic expression.

Tommy not only began to appreciate the poetry of others, it inspired him to start creating poems of his own, on a variety of subjects that moved him in one way or another. Father Soleta set out "to make poetry live in [Tommy's] soul," and he succeeded.

While Tommy was pursuing his various careers, playing basketball, hosting TV and radio shows, taking care of his executive duties with the Dodgers, observing people, places, and things, the world was inspiration for unpublished poetry that he was writing. He had been planning a book for years, but never got around to it. He shared his writing only with a few people. One of them was his mother, who encouraged him to publish his work. He finally got around to it this year.

Tommy didn't want his book to be just a collection of poems. He wanted each poem to have an illustration, either a painting or photograph. It had to be high quality, hard vinyl cover, and have universal appeal. To visualize his messages he has paintings from LeRoy Neiman, Tim Stownsley, Ernie Barnes and others. Other poems are illustrated with photographs. The wide spectrum of areas covered in Tommy's poems include love, women, sports, psychiatry, travel, music, family, relationships, the 1960s and much more.

After reading a couple examples of his work nearly everyone at the Malibu Rotary Club meeting bought one of Tommy's books, which he autographed. Tommy is on a book tour, starting mostly locally, but soon he will be heading back to Chicago and Notre Dame. He is a wonderful speaker and one can buy a book for \$40.00 at any of his book tour stops. #### Malibu Rotary Club International Projects in Puerto Rico



With matching grants from the Rotary Foundation, Rotary District 5280 (District Designated Funds [DDF]), and in partnership with other Rotary clubs in Rotary District 5280 and host clubs in Puerto Rico, the Malibu Rotary Club is involved in two humanitarian international projects in Puerto Rico in 2012.

The most ambitious project (*Hogar* Santisima Trinidad [HST] in Barrio Macarabones, Toa Alta, Puerto Rico) involves rehabilitating alcohol and drug

abusers at the HST Center (who are also highly likely to have HIV) to train for job skills and also educate in recycling and train in solid waste management. HST is a private community based non-profit organization, offering a safe residential rehabilitation and treatment program to 35 young males addicted to drugs and /or alcohol, established in 1993. HST depends on income from their semi-industrial aluminum and metal recycling and processing program. As part of their rehabilitation program, the HST implements occupational, physical and work therapies through their Mobile Recycling Center Program (MRCP). It consists in the training of patients in the use of a fixed industrial recycling unit permanently located at the Center, where they learn how to process and recycle aluminum, car batteries, diverse metals and other materials under the close supervision of trained supervisors. They also pickup recyclable materials in nearby communities to process at the center. The project also addresses a problem of waste management in Puerto Rico. Studies done by the US Environmental Protection Agency have revealed that improper or in sufficient capacity to dispose of solid waste in Puerto Rico has created public health problems. The management and disposal of solid waste in the Island has long been a challenge, aggravated by the limited space available due to its geographical size, roughly 100 mi by 35 mi, and its delicately balanced ecosystem and the large amount of solid waste generated, at 4,000,000 tons per year. Puerto Rico's residents generate more waste than people living on the mainland and recycling rates are lower. Much of Puerto Rico's waste ends up in landfills, most of which do not comply with local and federal governments' landfill requirements. The cost of HST Rotary project in Puerto Rico is \$22,570. The primary

international club sponsoring this project is the Westchester Rotary Club. Malibu Rotary Club is an equal share holder with the Westchester Rotary Club, with each club contributing \$1570.00. Besides the host Rotary Club of Santurce, the Rotary Club of Torrance-Lomita is a partner in this project.



project (Centro In the second Geriatrico San Rafael, Inc in Areciba, Puerto Rico) the Malibu Rotary Club is the PRIMARY **INTERNATIONAL** PARTNER. This project costs \$15,585.00 of which the Malibu Rotary Cub and the Westchester Rotary Club have given \$1170.00 each. Other partner clubs are Culver City, Wilmington, along with the host Rotary Club of Arecibo. The project involves upgrading equipment (mostly air conditioning) in a low income senior

citizen residential facility in Arecibo, Puerto Rico.

#### Malibu Rotary Club is Official Sponsor of Smile Trek



Marine Sargent Winston Fiore Started his 5,000 mile Cross Country Motorcycle Trip in Malibu. His purpose is to bring awareness of children's cleft palette and raise money for the International Children's Surgical Foundation. The organization provides surgery, training for 3<sup>rd</sup> world surgeons, plus follow-up care for surgical correction of children's cleft palette disease. The US trip was in preparation for a 5,000 mile walking trip across Southeast Asia. He explains, "In late September,

2011, I will set out on a 5,000-mile walk through Southeast Asia. My route will take me through eight different countries, beginning and ending in Singapore, and the yearlong trek will be an ongoing effort to raise funds for the ICSF and awareness for children living with clefts in the developing world. I chose to base this trip in Southeast Asia because of the region's high prevalence of cleft births." Malibu Rotary Club is one of his sponsors. One surgery costs \$240. See Winston's blog at http://www.smiletrek.org (which includes multiple videos) as he travels across the world. As of January 18<sup>th</sup> th he has raised almost \$33,000 for ICSF, over 73% his goal of \$50,000.
