

Speaker Ako Eyong, "The Painter of the White Dove" on Political cartooning and human rights within the context of a third world dictatorship



Maggie Luckerath introduced most Malibu Rotarians to Ako Eyong at the May 29th Malibu Rotary Club Brazilian Bash Blowout fund raiser where he donated a copy of recent book *Vision of the Blind King*.

At the July 10th meeting of the Malibu Rotary Club we learned a lot more about the gentleman from Cameroon, and also about the country of his birth.

Ado holds a bachelor's degree in history and a diploma in Political Science. Presently, he is working on his next book; THE GENERAL'S SON.

Ako is an artist who employs different types of artistic media like writing, painting, and music with the content and expression of the art almost always about the same theme:

-The world and man's role in

Ako's signature on his paints is the "Painter of the White Dove," a universal symbol of peace.

Ako had some success Cameroon as a cartoonist in the largest newspaper in the country. *The Post.* He said he enjoys being a cartoonist because even people who are illiterate can understand cartoons. Some of his cartoons were political in nature. Not only could the illiterate understand

it.

Ako's cartoons, so could the corrupt government which was often the subject of his cartoonist. This ultimately led Ado to unceremoniously exit the country in 2003 using a fake passport.

Cameroon, officially the Republic of Cameroon (French: République du Cameroun), is a country in the west Central Africa region. It is bordered by Nigeria to the west; Chad to the northeast; the Central African Republic to the east; and Equatorial Guinea, Gabon, and the Republic of the Congo to the south. Cameroon's coastline lies on the Bight of Bonny, part of the Gulf of Guinea and the Atlantic Ocean.

After World War I, the territory was divided between France and Britain as League of Nations mandates. The Union des Populations du Cameroun (UPC) political party advocated independence, but was outlawed by France in the 1950s. It waged war on French and UPC militant forces until 1971. In 1960, the French-administered part of Cameroon became independent as the Republic of Cameroun under President Ahmadou Ahidjo. The southern part of British Cameroons merged with it in 1961 to form the Federal Republic of Cameroon. The country was renamed the United Republic of Cameroon in 1972 and the Republic of Cameroon in 1984.

Compared with other African countries, Cameroon enjoys relatively high political and social stability. This has permitted the development of agriculture, roads, railways, and large petroleum and timber industries. Nevertheless, large numbers of Cameroonians live in poverty as subsistence farmers. Power lies firmly in the hands of the authoritarian president since 1982, Paul Biya, and his Cameroon People's Democratic Movement party. The English-speaking territories of Cameroon have grown increasingly alienated from the government, and politicians from those regions have called for greater decentralization and even secession (for example: the Southern Cameroons National Council) of the former British-governed territories.


The President of Cameroon has broad, unilateral powers to create policy, administer government agencies, command the armed forces, negotiate and ratify treaties, and declare a state of emergency. The president appoints government officials at all levels, from the prime minister (considered the official head of government), to the provincial governors and divisional officers. The president is selected by popular vote every seven years.

Corruption is rife at all levels of government. In 1997, Cameroon established anti-corruption bureaus in 29 ministries, but only 25 percent became operational, and in 2011, Transparency International placed Cameroon at number 134 on a list of 183 countries ranked from least to most corrupt.

Ako says all African governments are corrupt, but Cameroon tops the list. Some of this is detailed in the Messi Messi Affair in which the President had special deals with the main Bank of Cameroon whenever he need it (See <u>http://www.dibussi.com/2006/03/looking_back_at.html?cid=15138348</u>). The president filled the prisons with anyone who opposed him or was suspected of opposing him. The prisons became so full that the President had the military go into the prisons and randomly kill prisoners and bury them in shallow graves.

It was under this climate that Ako, in 2003, found himself at the airport in Cameroon with a fake passport, with a destination of Atlanta, Georgia, USA. He said he chose Atlanta because, having lived his life near the equator, and didn't want to go anywhere where it was going to be cold, like Chicago or New York. Of course when he landed with a fake passport he had a log of explaining to do to US officials. Ultimately he was granted political asylum and ultimately chose another warm place in the U.S. to live, the City of Buenaventura, which is the official name of Ventura, California, where he continued to apply his art to media and also to tell people about what is going on Africa.

Because Ako is a Polical Exile he cannot return to Cameroon. If set foot on Cameroon soil he would be arrested and who knows what would happen if he was imprisoned there. He recently received his American green card, and will apply for American citizenship as soon as he is eligible, which will be in 3 years. As an American citizen he could return to Cameroon without being arrested, because the Cameroon government doesn't want to have to deal with the American State Department.



Ako published his book *Vision of the Blind King* on February 14, 2014 and signed copies of it at the Malibu Rotary Club meeting.

Description of the work:

A people find themselves caught in a web of circumstances that push them to question the most fundamental beliefs about existence. It is a time of distrust, confusion, and uncertainty, -a time when loyalties are questioned and love is challenged. News that a powerful foreign enemy has its army on the march will quickly complicate an already complex situation, exposing fault lines that accentuate the stakes into a drawn out debacle between survival and extinction.

As the people fight back to undo the tightening vise, it never dawns on them that their predicament could be a function of one man's infatuation with Time. The Vision of the blind King is a literary historical fiction story that spills over into the present day. It is a book that allows us to draw clear and important parallels that may hold a key to the survival of our civilization as we know it.

Or is it a vicious

the poorest? Dwindling natural resources, blood minerals, and a new age of economic

imperialism; How Africa rob Africa; Religious nuts, fundamentalism, politics and

the justification of violence and war; and finally, Ako's speech on Gas, water, and war.

Everyone at the Malibu Rotary Club meeting on July10 had a special treat in seeing and hearing Ako Eyong tell his story. He delivered an entertaining, humorous and gracious presentation.
