Giving Oral Polio Vaccine in Kampur India

Polio is history throughout much of the world—a distant memory for some, a photo in a textbook for others. For more than 20 years, Rotary International, a global humanitarian service organization, has played a major role in the fight to end polio worldwide, contributing more than \$800 million to the effort through its PolioPlus program. Rotary's involvement is also highly personal, with thousands of members volunteering to reach the world's children with the oral polio vaccine (OPV). To date, Rotary members have helped immunize more than 2 billion children in 122 countries.

A Leader in Polio Eradication Efforts

Rotary became involved with polio in 1979, when the organization committed to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines through a Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) grant from The Rotary Foundation. Encouraged by the program's success, Rotary consulted with Dr. Albert S. Sabin, developer of the OPV, and launched the PolioPlus program in 1985.

Focus on the Goal

When Rotary started the PolioPlus program, more than 350,000 children worldwide were infected annually by this crippling and sometimes fatal disease. In 2008, fewer than 2,000 children were infected, a reduction of more than 99 percent. Eradication clearly is within reach—but polio remains a threat until the day the world is certified polio-free.

Today, the wild poliovirus persists in only three countries: Pakistan, Nigeria, and Afghanistan. However, eradicating polio requires more than just eliminating the disease in these core countries. Children worldwide must be continually protected from outbreaks caused by imported cases. Rotary and its partners in the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (World Health Organization, the U.S. Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, and UNICEF) use four key strategies to help nations become—and remain—polio-free:

• Routine immunization Each child must receive four doses of the oral vaccine during the first year of life if countries at risk for imported cases are to remain polio-free.

• National Immunization Days For decades, Rotary and its partners have organized and implemented National Immunization Day events throughout the world. Rotary members visit villages and towns to distribute vaccine supplies to local health centers, educate the community about disease prevention and the importance of vaccinations, and work with local officials to ensure that the vaccine reaches every child.

Surveillance

Rotary members play a vital role as they <u>volunteer</u> alongside health workers, pediatricians, and others to find, report, and investigate reports of polio symptoms, ideally within 48 hours of onset.

• Targeted mop-up campaigns Rotary members join health workers in door-to-door community outreach in areas where recent outbreaks have been reported.


Champions of Fundraising

Over the years, Rotary members have raised <u>funds</u> in some very creative ways. In 2008, for example, more than 200 Swiss Rotary clubs pooled efforts to designate Sept. 13 as Swiss National Polio Day. Some 13,000 Rotary members worked with local political leaders and regional health officials to set up brightly colored booths on sidewalks and public squares in cities and villages across the nation. Rotary volunteers sold small packets of sunflower seeds for 75 rappen (about 64 cents), about the cost of the six doses of vaccine necessary to protect a child for life. Each packet carried the slogan, "With only 75 rappen you are in!" to demonstrate how even the smallest contributions can make a difference. The one-day event raised \$643,000.

Rotary also benefits from outside grants, including recent contributions totaling \$355 million from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. Foundation Co-chair Bill Gates announced the latest grant during his <u>speech at the Rotary leadership conference</u> in January 2009. Rotary in turn pledged to raise \$200 million in matching funds within three years.

"We are making this grant and asking you to raise a total of \$200 million by June 30, 2012, because we know eradication doesn't come in an instant," Gates said. "If we all have the fortitude to see this effort through to the end, then we will eradicate polio."

Mike Hebert is owner of the Postal Annex in the Trancas Center in Malibu, and a member of the Rotary Club of Thousand Oaks in District 5240 in Ventura County. His daughter was already

in India, working on women's rights, and Mike recruited her and his niece and wife to participate in this year's India NID. He wanted to be part of the effort to eradicate polio in the world, and wanted the hands on experience doing it.

Although this year India has had no new cases of polio (and therefore it has been certified by WHO as being polio-free) polio is not considered eradicated until each child receives four doses of the oral vaccine during the first year of life. Without this the country is still at risk for imported cases. So although we are close, these NID efforts continue in India.

Mike told us some staggering numbers about India, polio, and the eradication effort. On National Immunization Day (NID) 1.3 million kids are immunized. This is done be 350,000 volunteers. There are three NIDs in India each year!

Beside Rotary there are three other major groups that make it happen: WHO (World Health Orgainization), thousands of local voluteers, and UNICEF, which provides marketing, PR, for the need for immunization, sets up posters and advertises NID. They have to counter

misinformation such as that had been spread by local Muslim clerics that the vaccine was "giving polio" to children.

Mike described how difficult it was to reach all the children in these villages and give them the oral vaccine. The country is very poor. It does not pay for education. There is no communication with the outside world. There are 8,000 births per day. There are boarding schools for boys and boarding schools for girls that are supported by donations. The children who are lucky enough to attend these schools are brought there by their parents and left for the school year. The unlucky kids live in the streets. There is poor sanitation, with sewage in the streets, and poor water quality. Polio is just one of many diseases and health problems that these kids are subjected to, but at least there is something that can be done about polio. Despite the

poverty most kids Mike encountered seemed happy, with beautiful smiling faces which could be seen in the pictures he showed.

The polio vaccine has to be kept cool and the end delivery to the village may be by all sorts of means, including elephants and camels. Although it is only 125 miles from Delhi, it takes about 8 hours on dirt roads to get to Rampur. Most children were brought from the rural areas to central areas for inoculation, but after that the volunteers go door to door. As a reward for being inoculated Mike brought with him to give to the kids a 1,000 See's Candy suckers. T

After inoculation the children's finger nail is marked so they can be identified as having been inoculated with vaccine. He said some kids tried to wash the mark off to get more candy. Only the under 5 were being given the vaccine. He said he had some problem with older kids trying to get inoculated in order to get candy. He found a way to have them help by telling them if they could find some younger kids eligible for vaccine, they would be able to get the Sees Candy suckers too, and sure enough they found younger kids and got their reward.

Mike said the roads in the Rampur area were terrible. They were narrow and people neither drove on the right nor left, but anywhere on the road that they could get through. If you were in an auto accident on the road at night they would just leave you there. There were cows everywhere and 9,000 monkeys in town, and they fight with people and try to steel their food.

Mike Hebert's presentation the Malibu Rotary Club was enlightening for everyone. Although we were all aware of Rotary's effort in Polio eradication, Mike's first hand account made it very real for us, as did the presentation given to the club by our winter visitor **Tom Bos** who has been on three NID trips to India.

Marine Sargent Winston Fiore Started his 5,000 mile Cross Country Motorcycle Trip in Malibu. His purpose is to bring awareness of children's cleft palette and raise money for the International Children's Surgical Foundation. The organization provides surgery, training for 3rd world surgeons, plus follow-up care for surgical correction of children's cleft palette disease. The US trip was in preparation for a 5,000 mile walking trip

across Southeast Asia which he began in September. Before he left he explained "My route will take me through eight different countries, beginning and ending in Singapore, and the yearlong trek will be an ongoing effort to raise funds for the ICSF and awareness for children living with clefts in the developing world. I chose to base this trip in Southeast Asia because of the region's high prevalence of cleft births."

Malibu Rotary Club is one of his sponsors. One surgery costs \$240.
