# Isabelle Fox Tells How She Became Surgical Mission Media Consultant of Mending Kids International –And Why She is Passionate About it.



**Isabelle Fox** was an actress in Canada for 20 years. She later became a director of film and stage and ended up in Malibu with 2 kids. She met Rick Johnson, the former artistic director of Malibu Stage, and in fact directed the last Malibu Stage production on under Rick Johnson at Malibu Stage.

She attended a fund raising auction and found herself bidding on an unusual item: going on surgical mission with an organization called Mending Kids International to anywhere in the world. One of Isabelle's children is an adopted child from China, and she had always wanted to find out about the child's background and she thought if she went as a volunteer on this surgical mission to China she could also learn more about her adopted daughter.

A surgical team from Cedars Sinai Hospital was ready to go and there was supposed to be a photographer or cameraman going with the team. The surgeries are filmed so that they can be used as training tools for local doctors in the countries where the Mending Kids International missions go. The photographer who was supposed to go couldn't make it. When MKI learned of Isabelle's background, not necessarily involved photography but having to do with film, they asked if she could film what happened on that surgical mission.

She got a camera started to document what she saw on the mission. She was amazed how the doctors dropped whatever they were doing in their regular life to positively change other people's lives on this and other missions she subsequently went on. Isabelle was overcome by her experience on this 8 day mission. She went on a mission to Guetamala, and the one in Haiti was her 8<sup>th</sup> one.

She is divorced and said her husband is able to take care of the kids while she goes on the missions, filming them. She said that everyone has skills that can be utilized on the missions to assist the surgical team.

The U.S. surgeons teach the local surgeons so that they can do the procedures. Hopefully the local surgeons become proficient enough that they can charge for the procedures for the families that can afford to pay.

Also attending the Malibu Rotary Club meeting of June 29<sup>th</sup> was **Marchelle L Sellers**, Executive Director of Mending Kids International, as well as incoming President (2013-14) of the Rotary Club of South Pasadena. She was also the Founder of the Ronald MacDonald House in Pasadena.

Marchelle says, "As a mother of a child who endured 14 surgeries in 13 years, I never realized the luxury of having top surgeons down the street that had all of the knowledge to do the best job for my son. I also never realized until I traveled to other countries, that mothers have no health insurance or options when they discover their child's life-

saving surgery is something they will never be able to afford. What makes us so lucky to live in a country with everything we need to get help for our children, while others are so unfortunate. I work every day with a committed staff and Board to ensure that EVERY child and EVERY parent gets the surgery they need to live a long, healthy childhood. Medical care should not be optional or impossible."

We asked Marchelle to tell us more about MKI and she sent us the following:



Since 2006, Mending Kids has helped over 1000+ kids with life-changing and life-saving surgeries. Known for their separation of the previously conjoined twins "The Two Marias" from Guatemala, MKI has been featured on the Anderson Cooper Show, CNN, LA Times, People Magazine, Good Day LA and countless other media outlets. Founded almost 30 years ago, MKI now reaches into more than 52 developing countries around the globe.

Mending Kids International provides life-changing surgical care to children worldwide. For 30 years, thousands of children have received corrective and transformational surgeries that have given them another chance at a longer, healthier life. Most of the surgeries performed are for congenital heart defects, orthopedic abnormalities and cranial facial deformities. Mending Kids International provides surgeries through 4 core programs:

The U.S. Surgeries program identifies children with complex surgical needs and flies them to Southern California to receive treatment by renowned children's hospitals in the Los Angeles area. Children are cared for by MKI approved Host Families who make certain all of their emotional needs and living arrangements are provided. An exciting new Hometown Mission being introduced this year, will provide surgeries to children from Southern California who do not have access to the life-mending surgical care they need. (20 children)

The Surgical Mission program targets areas where there is a high concentration of children requiring surgery. MKI brings surgical teams (15-20 members composed of surgeons, techs, nurses and volunteers) to a hospital to not only perform delicate surgeries on 15-50 children and evaluate over 100 children for future mission trips, they teach their colleagues in the process. This year alone, MKI will send 9 mission teams to Ecuador, Haiti, Ethiopia, Guatemala, Nicaragua, China, Mozambique, Cambodia and Christmas Island.

The International Surgeries Program identifies children in remote areas who need corrective surgery. For many reasons, including funding, it may be near impossible to fly the child to Los Angeles or send a surgical mission team to correct one patient. To solve this problem and provide surgery to as many children as possible, MKI arranges to fund or provide surgeries to these children by partnering with local hospitals and other NGO's who may have access to surgeons but no money to pay them.

In July 2013, MKI is launching the first inaugural Hometown Mission at Cedars Sinai Medical Center in Los Angeles. Volunteer surgeons will be performing 20 surgeries in 1 day utilizing 6 OR spaces. Patients who are receiving surgeries are being referred from both international locations and local patients from right here in the U.S. who do not have insurance or documentation to receive the care they need. MKI will host a second Hometown Mission in December 2013.

In 2009, MKI provided complex surgery to 89 children. In 2010, MKI provided surgery to 162 children, in 2011 MKI provided surgery to 284 children, and in 2012, we provided 302 surgeries! This year we are likely to expecting to exceed 400 kids! While our demand has increased, we have worked hard to restructure our organization, reduce costs, and add emphasis to surgical missions and international surgeries in order to serve more kids. In essence, we are serving more children with a reduced budget.

Funding for Mending Kids International is provided by individual and corporate sponsorships, special grants, special events and in-kind contributions. Donated services are a large portion of our annual revenues and are instrumental to the work we do to save lives. Currently 92% of donations we take in goes directly to fund our surgical costs!

As you can imagine, there are thousands of children waiting for surgeries so they too can reclaim their normal childhoods.
