Ellen Shane Explains How Her Daughter's Memory Inspired Her to Create the Emily Shane Foundation and the SEA (Successful Educational Achievement) Program

Prior to the 2018 Malibu Times Dolphin Awards ceremony Ellen Shane had heard of Malibu Rotary Club President Bianca Torrence but had never met her. She got her chance to meet Bianca at the Awards ceremony. Ellen and her husband Michael were 2013 Dolphin Award recipients and Ellen hoped to meet Bianca because she knew if she had a chance to meet and talk to Bianca there would be special bond between them that only someone who has suddenly lost a child can feel.

Bianca introduced Ellen at the June 6 Malibu Rotary Club meeting. As nearly all of us in Malibu know Ellen's daughter Emily Rose Shane was tragically killed at the age of 13 when a suicidal driver hit her near the intersection of PCH and Heathercliff Rd on April 3 2010. The intersection is now call Emily Shane Way. But who was this girl and how did her life become an inspiration to help a group of children in the Southern California area who never met her?

"Emily was one of those amazing kids who was kind to all. She transcended cliques, advocated



for those less fortunate, and was all about helping others. She was the one who would ask you to join her at the lunch table if you were sitting alone; who welcomed a new student to the school, who tried to cheer you up if you were sad.

She

is remembered for her laughter and compassion.

She left a positive impression on anyone she met."

Despite the fact that Emily could express herself so eloquently she had some problems in school processing information. She was dyslexic. To assist Emily in school her parents enlisted the help of Pepperdine students to help mentor and tutor her.



Emily was achieving some success from this tutoring at the time of her death. Her parents, Ellen and Michael decided to honor the memory of Emily by forming a foundation, the Emily Shane Foundation and helping middle school children in the Los Angeles area by linking them with local colleges to help mentor and tutor them, in a program called SEA (Successful Educational Achievement) Program.

They started with a pilot program and 3 middle school

students who were having problems in school. The premise was that they were not in the program because they were stupid but because nobody would help them.

Most of the University students want to get paid for their mentoring students and the Shane's started having fund raisers for their foundation.

With the success they were having in Malibu Ellen decided to try to use the program where it was needed even more desparately in south Los Angeles, and recruited students from USC to mentor the failing middle school kids.

"A SEA student is one who is in middle school, in the mainstream classroom, and is failing and/or struggling academically. SEA only serves those unable to afford this much needed outside, consistent support. Many of our students are considered "at risk". We serve a disadvantaged population."

SEA sessions address three main areas: organizational skills, study skills, and the subject(s) where the student is performing poorly. Mentors focus not only on a child's subjects of difficulty, but on the skill set necessary to be a successful student. Mentors are trained to provide the utmost positive support and encouragement to their students. In the required Mentor Training Session, it is emphasized that for each SEA student participant "trying is what he/she CAN do, and eventually trying her/his very best is the ultimate goal."

Students who fit the SEA Program's profile often head towards a negative path, often including low self esteem, bullying or acting out, being bullied, drugs, gangs, giving up, etc. Our aim is to use a positive approach to tackle the core issues of why the student is performing poorly (often social or home life issues are a factor), and through directed, caring support, allow them to attain their best academic performance.

Results of SEA since its inception in the spring of 2012 are: increased motivation to succeed and improved grades. Studies show that youth who have mentors have increased graduation rates, maintain a better attitude about school, aspire to higher education goals, are less likely to initiate drug and alcohol use, and create healthier relationships and lifestyle choices.

#### **Student quotes**

"I used to not care about school that much. Ever since I joined The SEA Program I've been doing much better in school. I would fight a lot then I would tell (my mentor) Maya about it

and she would give me advice about stuff like I shouldn't be fighting. And just listening has helped because I stopped fighting," Anthony, 8th grade, MVG.

"My mentor taught and changed me (by teaching me) how to be responsible and be organized. He has been so nice to me. They have (impacted me) because he loves math. I was failing, but now I have a B," **Christian, 6th grade, South LA**.

The SEA Program changed me (by teaching me) the proper way to speak English. The SEA Program changed me to be not shy all the time," **Juan, 7th, South LA**.

#### Kelly, Juan's mom, South LA:

"Juan has improved in science. His grade went up rom a C to an A. Juan is always saying his mentor is patient and helpful when he is having trouble. He's mentioned that she's very nice. I just want to say thank you for all of the help and patience that is given to Juan."

#### Karlene, Gabe's mom, Malibu:

"She shows more focus and accountability when he knows he's meeting with (his mentor) Kelsey. Kelsey wrote a letter on behalf of Gabe to all his teachers. It truly blew us both away! She is awesome, encouraging, loving and supportive."

#### The program spreads to Pico Rivera

A 10<sup>th</sup> grade student in Pico Rivera, Andrew Parris, heard about the Emily Shane Foundation and volunteered to organize a program in Pico Rivera, which wasn't near a university, and have high achieving high school students mentor the failing middle school students. This would become a successful program too. Andrew later received a scholarship to Harvard University when he graduated high school.

#### Fund Raising Events for the Emily Shane Foundation

Emily was especially fond of butterflies. The Emily Shane Foundation has fund raising events to raise money for the student mentors. A fun event is the Butterfly Release Fundraiser, which has been held a Bluff's Park. This year it will be held on Sunday November 4 at Alumni Park at Pepperdine University from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m.
