Oscar Mondragon, MCLE Executive Director since 1993, pointed out this could well be the theme of the Malibu Community Labor Exchange as it has made a positive difference in thousands of lives of the people it has served in the Malibu community.

The Malibu Community Labor Exchange is a 501(c)3 nonprofit organization whose primary function is to provide a safe and convenient place for people to wait for day jobs. This facilitates a connection with prospective hirers. The benefit to the community is in having a central location where people can find workers; and the benefit to the workers is in having a safe and supportive organization that helps facilitate the work process. The MCLE is neither an employment agency nor an employer. All workers are independent.





After a quarter-century of providing a free service to help day laborers find work and help local residents, organizations and businesses find temporary labor, Malibu Community Labor Exchange Director Oscar Mondragon says over 20,000 workers have registered. Service is free to both the workers and employers. Oscar keeps a file on workers, to assist employers with the services they need. The MCLE has been able to connect enough workers with employers that the workers have collectively earned \$300,000 per year. About 30% of the workers are women.

"We've become kind of an institution in the community," Mondragon said. "But the bottom line has always been to provide a venue for workers to get jobs."

For the past 25 years, the Labor Exchange has been operating out of a trailer parked in the parking lot in front of the old Malibu Sheriff's Station, in the Civic Center area near the library; Mondragon has run it the entire time.

"It's like my home," he said. "I come here every day."

In the morning, the Labor Exchange opens for business at 6:30 a.m. Workers interested in day jobs gather outside the trailer to sign up for work. When local residents and employers start calling or stopping by to find workers for various short-term jobs, Mondragon does everything possible to make sure they get what they need. Workers for unskilled jobs are often chosen by lottery.

At 1:30 p.m., the trailer closes. By that time, most employers and residents who need help have already come by. The routine is repeated six days a week from Monday through Saturday.

They have had to deal with homeless, and all sorts personal needs for people.

"Our little trailer gives local folks a place to go for help if they need someone to clear brush from their property, paint a room or build a dog run, among many other things," Kay Gabbard, president of the Board of Directors and head of fundraising, said.

Tom Urban, a member of the board of the MCLE who was at the Malibu Rotary Club meeting on May 23 talked about an incident that connected him with MCLE earlier that week. Visiting his dentist he mentioned he was a volunteer at MCLE the dental hygienist told him she had started her first job, and began earning the money that allowed her to pay for the education needed for her position at the dental office, when she went to the MCLE years ago as one of the workers.

In next couple months, before Santa Monica College begins to demolish the old sheriff's station to construct its new Malibu campus on the site, the Labor Exchange will relocate to the east side of the library. Construction on the SMC campus is supposed to begin in August.

The Board of Directors decided the upcoming move would be the perfect time to reorganize their setup. The old trailer, which has Mondragon's office and a small classroom, will be replaced by the City of Malibu, and the group also hopes to modernize training facilities and security.

The MCLE has received a Federal Grant of over \$100,000 that will buy a much needed new trailer, is currently trying to raise \$25,000 for its upcoming relocation and a Go Fund Me at gofundme.com/8dqq8yek raised about \$8,000 toward that goal.

"Our biggest challenge is to get the word out to the community that we exist — not only letting the community know there are workers in Malibu every day looking for the dignity of a job to help them provide for their families, but also in terms of finding a base of local patrons that we can count on from year to year to sustain our work," Gabbard said.

"For 25 years, we've scrambled every year to make up the difference between our budget and the amount of continuing support we receive from the city, county, local churches and a few longtime supporters," Gabbard explained. "We have operational expenses in keeping the hiring site open and run in an organized manner, including our one employee, Oscar Mondragon. However, we pride ourselves on providing services at a very low cost — a fraction of what other community exchanges operate on."

"The board's real mentor and guide is Mondragon — one of the most selfless and genuine people I've ever met," Gabbard said. "His caring and sensitive interaction with our clients is inspirational, and his dedication to helping them learn to help themselves is impressive."

The Labor Exchange also provides volunteer and student internship opportunities for the Malibu community, including Pepperdine University, churches, high schools and scout troops, who teach subjects to workers that include English, CPR in Spanish, how to set up a bank account and family budget, immigration laws and rights, resume writing and how to use the internet.

"It's a forum for anyone in the community to share skills with our clients," Gabbard described.

"Our clients include both men and women trying to improve their lives, educate themselves and ultimately move into a full time position," Gabbard said. "Our goal has always been to help them move into the future through employment and skills training."

At the Malibu Rotary Club meeting there was some discussion about the future of Malibu's biggest annual community event, the Labor Day Malibu Kiwanis Chili Cook-off. Apparently former President of the Malibu Kiwanis Club John Paola has left the club, and a new version of the Labor Day event will be done by the Malibu Boys and Girls Club. It may or may not continue to be a Chili Cookoff, but it will be a community fund raiser. We expect the Malibu Rotary Club to be part of new event, which will be held at the same site on the corner of Webb Way and Civic Center Center. The City of Malibu is in the process of buying the site from the Malibu Bay Company. We expect to hear more about this in the near future. The Boys and Girls Club had invited the Malibu Rotary Club to tour their facilities and we may have a future Malibu Rotary Club meeting at the B&G Club on the Malibu High School campus.

Malibu Rotary Club President Bianca Torrence announced that the first Homeless Connect Day of 2018 is set to take place on May 30 from 10 a.m.-1 p.m. at the old Malibu Courthouse.

The event will provide free services—including legal assistance, medical services, housing resources, complimentary lunch, haircuts, food stamps and more—for homeless individuals.
