Last Week Malibu Rotary Club Meeting: May 6 Malibu Rotary Revisits Camp Bloomfield

In 1953, Norman Kaplan and a group of a dedicated volunteers founded Junior Blind of America (formerly known as Foundation for the Junior Blind) to provide recreational services for children who were blind or visually impaired. In 1958, Henry Bloomfield gave Junior Blind access to a 40-acre campsite in Malibu, California. Since then, Camp Bloomfield has served as a year-round residential camp for youth who were blind or visually impaired and their families. One of the first projects of the Rotary Club of Malibu after its incorporation in 1971 was to build the restroom for Camp Bloomfield. It was completed in 1974.

Through the years Malibu Rotary continued to contribute to toward Camp Bloomfield and had visited to club and had

a meeting there about 10 years ago. Faith Nunley, Development Coordinator for Junior Blind of America, the parent organization runs many activities for blind and visually impaired youth, including Camp Bloomfield, wanted to do a program for the Malibu Rotary Club, and John Elman and Margo Neal thought that having the presentation at Camp Bloomfield, rather than our normal meeting place at Pepperdine, might be a good idea, so that meeting, which included breakfast at the camp, was done the morning of May 6.

Faith explained that the mission of Junior Blind of America is to help children and adults who are blind, visually impaired or multi-disabled achieve independence. The differ from the Braille Institute in that Jurnior Blind concentrates on children with these disabilities while Braille concentrates on adults. Services offered by Junior Blind includes Child Development Program (inhome therapy, early intervention and support to multi-diabled blind children [ages birth to 6]); Special Education School (a state certified, non-public school that offers individualized instruction for students with visual impairments and other disabilities such as autism and cerebral palsy); Children's Residential Program (serves the unique needs of chidren and youth, ages 5-21, who are blind, visually impaired and /or have moderate to profound disabilities. In a home setting,

Youth and adult services include the Student **Transition** & **Enrichment** Program (STEP), which concentrates on developing work-readiness skills through individualized instruction, group seminars and activities, and an internship work experience matched to a student's indentified strengths and interests. Another program aimed more at adults is the Davidson Program for Independence. It is a comprehensive program designed to help adults ages 18 and older, who are blind or visually impaired through training in four key areas: Braille, Assitive Technology, Orientation and Mobility and Living Skills (such as cooking, cleaning and money management.

Other programs of the Junior Blind are vision screening programs for low-income pre-school and elementary school children and an After School Enrichment Program designed to integrate children who are blind, visually impaired or mutil-disabled with those who are sighted. Students take part in fun and educational activities while learning about the importance of physical fitness and health nutrition. There is also a program called Visions: Adventures in Learning which provides experiences for teens who are blind or visually impaired through exciting three-day adventure, doing such things as water and snow skiing with a sighted aid. These challenging activities help teens prepare for independent living by challenging them to overcome physical and emotional obstacles. There is also a Junior Blind Olympics for blind and visually impaired who are ages 6 through 19.

The guided tour of Camp Bloomfield by Mike Bloomfield allowed us to visit dorm rooms, fields an playgrounds and various locations on the 40-acre residential camp site where blind or visually impaired campers are able to participate in horseback swimming, archery, riding, campfire activities, wall climbling and more, as they learn independence skills and self-adovacy. The little bus carrying Rotarians slowly climbed heart attack hill, a very steep going up to Arts and Crafts, Archery, Campfire, Boystown, Upper Playground, Pool and finally the large ball field on top called

Happy Hollow. Before going up the hill we were able to tour the rest room built in 1974 by the Malibu Rotary Club.

We are hoping to stay in touch with Faith and the people of Camp Bloomfield to participate with the campers as a hands on experience for Rotarians (and possibly Rotaractors). Faith Nunley had put together many printed handouts and also had several gifts for Rotarians in attendance. Much of this will be available in our meeting room for those who could not attend the meeting.

The headquarters for Junior Blind of America is 5300 Angeles Vista Blvd, Los Angeles, CA 90043. Camp Bloomfield is located at 35375 Mulholland Highway Malibu, CA 90265. The Junior Blind pays the Bloomfield Foundation \$1.00 per year to use the 40 acre camp. Also on hand at the Malibu Rotary Club presentation was **Bonnie E. Harris, Esq.,** who is Director of Planned Giving for the Junior Blind of American.

Editors Note: Most of you know how strongly I feel about the Project TRIUMPH program conceived by Ilan Magdali of the Newbury Park Rotary Club. The program brought 10 teenage Arab and 10 teenage Jewish students from Israel to a leadership camp in Simi Valley where they all learned to work together, develop leaders skills before returning to Israel to use what they learned back home. Most of us feel helpless in trying to find a solution to the constant war in the Mid East, but at least this program is trying to do something, In the last issue of The Malibu Rotary Club Surfwriter I had written about e-mail communications I had had with Frances Fuji of the Project TRIUMPH organizing committee. She had written

be responsible for year-round support of both new Project TRIUMPH students and alumni. We are sending money to contribute to the facilitator's salary, and she has already begun meeting with the kids there.

"In light of the current economic climate and more challenging environment for securing grant monies, instead of hosting students this year, we are taking the opportunity to strengthen infrastructure in Israel and to establish collaborative relationships with aligned organizations.

We are excited about prospects for 2010 and beyond (the plan is to resume bringing kids over in 2010, assuming that we can raise enough funds in 2009) and believe we will emerge from this fallow year with an even stronger, more well-rounded and promising program than ever before."

about what some of the student alumni of the Project TRIUMPH program (many of whom we had met when they were here) were currently doing after participating in the Project TRIUMPH program:

"Our greater vision is to inspire leaders of tomorrow by imparting wisdom and broadening the perspective of high school students. Our first year students, who were here in 2006, are now in the army or beginning to build careers. We have stayed in contact with some of them through Facebook. Very soon, their generation will be making pivotal choices that will impact not only their region, but the world.

We're proud of all the young people we've worked with, and we thank you for your belief in them.
