Rhoda Robinson and David Robinson Hicks Talk about Malibu Ballet and Performing Arts Society and Arts Programs for Underserved Kids

There was no scheduled speaker for the rainy day Malibu Rotary Club meeting on October 5. Two guests that were introduced by **Geoff Ortiz** quickly took care of the void. **Rhoda Robinson** and her 15 year old son **David Robinson-Hicks** have been involved with dance and performing arts since each of them were children. And they each feel it important that children experience the arts.

Rhoda began her dancing and singing in Chicago. She and her young son David were street performers and found themselves living in a campground in Malibu in 2001. They met people at Vineyard Church, before it became the Malibu Performing Arts Center. David was given a scholarship to the local dance studio. They lived in Florida for a while and now are back in Southern California where David was already persuing a career in the entainment industry. In 2002 he appeared in an episode of *Scrubs*.

The Malibu Ballet and Performing Arts Society was originally started about 30 years ago at a ballet studio (Ballet Studio by the Sea) that was located in the Malibu Country Mart 2 story building. The most advanced students at the studio made up a performing group, Malibu Civic Ballet. The original artistic director of the studio JoAnna Jarvis, choreographed ballets that incorporated the older (teenage) dancers in major roles and the smaller children in supporting roles. Each December the studio presented a full length production of Nutcracker at Smothers Theater. Over the years the studio changed hands, name, location, but the tradition of having the Nutcracker Ballet at Somthers theater featuring local children remained. Current artistic director of Malibu Civic Ballet is Diane Linder. Even though Malibu Ballet and Performing Arts Society is run by volunteers, and much of the production is done by volunteers doing stage direction, and costumes, etc., the cost of renting the theater and its technicians costs about \$50,000 according to Rhonda. Besides the tickets that are sold, the Malibu Ballet Society busses in 500 kids from the inner city to see the production. This year the principal of Foster Elementary School in Compton has arranged for the transportation of 300 children from Compton. The main reason for Rhoda's visit was to ask for help in providing for the bussing of about 200 other children, mostly coming

from Inglewood. We had suggested contacting the Inglewood Rotary Club for help in this endeaver.

This year's Malibu Civic Ballet's Annual Production of THE NUTCRACKER will be taking place December 3-5 at the Smothers Theatre in Malibu. Call 310.506 4522 for tickets.

Rhoda says arts is about diversity. Besides the December performances of the Nutcracker, which will include 5 performances in the 500 seat Smothers Theater Rhoda recommended two other events. Colin Macfarlane, a member of Rotary e-Club One in district 5450 and an honorary member of RC Dhaka Buriganga in Bangladesh. his home bases are Melbourne Australia and Dhaka Bangladesh. He will talk about the Bangladesh Clubfoot Project: These children have a future because Rotarians care.

5000 children (maybe 7000 feet) a year are born with clubfeet in Bangladesh : before the program started most went untreated. In just two years we are now approaching 4000 feet under correction by the Ponseti Method. This method involves no invasive surgery and has a 95% success rate in children under 12 months old.
