#### Other news from last Malibu Rotary Club Meeting

#### **Highlights of the Rotary District Breakfast**

John Elman and Bill Wishard reported the Rotary District Breakfast they attended the previous morning with Allan Mannheim, Teresa LeGrove, and Peter and Sally Formosa (Peter rejoined the Malibu Rotary Club at the breakfast meeting). The breakfast featured an Olympic of 5-time Olympic medalist medalist Janet Evans, 2-time Olympian and silver medalist Haley Anderson and 12-time medalist and paralympian Candace Cable, as well as Jeff Millman, which is the Chief Communications Chair for the LA2024 Olympic Committee. Each of the women had inspiring stories to tell, had did so with great humor.

Haley Anderson said she always tried to follow in the footsteps of her sister, who was a competitive swimmer and 14 months older than her. In high school she did everything her sister did, and it was difficult because her sister was so good at what she did. The sister, Alyssa, continued her swimming at the University of Arizona. Haley decided to go to USC, where she was on the USC Trojans swimming and diving teams. She decided to start to compete in a sport that was new to the Olympics, but probably one of the first type swimming people ever did, swimming not in a pool, but in open water like rivers and lakes. She described how one of the first of these events she competed was in Canada. In June 2012, Anderson qualified for the 2012 Summer Olympics by placing first at the FINA Olympic Marathon Swim Qualifier in Setubal in the 10-kilometer open water event. She won a silver medal in the 10-kilometer open water event at the 2016 Olympics in Rio.

Janet Evans, who was born in 1971 in Fullerton, described how she was inspired to be an Olympian as a child when she went to the 1984 Los Angeles Olympics. When she was 17 years old she competed in her first Olympics and was very excited to beat the East German team. In 1987, she broke the world records in the 400-meter, 800-meter, and 1,500-meter freestyle

distances. At the 1988 Summer Olympics in Seoul, South Korea, she won three individual gold medals, and she also earned the nickname "Miss Perpetual Motion." Evans won the 400-meter and 800-meter freestyle events at the U.S. National Championships 12 times each, the largest number of national titles in one event by an American swimmer in the 100-year history of the competition. At the end of Evans' swimming career, she held seven world records, five Olympic medals (including four gold medals), and 45 American national titles – third only to Tracy Caulkins and Michael Phelps.

Evans ended her swimming career, for all practical purposes, at the 1996 Summer Olympics in Atlanta, Georgia. She did not win any medals, but she did add one more highlight to her life. She was given the honor of carrying the Olympic torch in the opening ceremony, and she handed the torch to the American boxing legend Muhammad Ali to light the cauldron. She developed a fiendship with Ali, which continues with Ali's widow.

In her interview at the Rotary District breakfast Eveans said, "it's wonderful to win Olympics, but 90% of the Olympians to win medals and it's important to give back." She was inspired by the Olympics she saw as a child and that is why she is part of the committee to bring the games home to Los Angeles in 2024—"to Iinspire."

Candace Cable's story was especially inspiring. She was born in West Covina and told the story of how in 1975 when she was 21 years old she was in an auto accident in which she suffered a spinal cord injury and lost the use of her legs. She spent a year in depression, feeling sorry for herself. Finally she decided to go to college and enrolled at Long Beach State University, where she was dismayed to find the campus was on different levels, and she hardly had enough energy to make it to closes. She decided to train with the Long Beach State swim team and the coach let her. In high school she had not been competitive, but she found that training with the swim team made her competitive. It became important to make small goals for herself. "Five feet, five feet,

Besides swimming Candace became competitive in wheel chair racing and later even in downhill skiing. She was instrumental in the sport of wheelchair racing not just by being a participant and winner, but in the design of competitive which chairs. She said that when she started th the sport of wheel chair racing people were all in 50 pound Everest & Jennings standard wheelchairs. It you were in a street race the wheel chairs would pull to towards the curb because of the crown of the road. She develop a device which would turn the wheel chair toward the center of the road. She was told if she used the device that she would be disqualified. She used the device, won the race, and was disqualified. She argued that everyone should use the device to make the sport better. It was, and so were other wheelchairs designed specifically for racing—three wheelers with the bottom of the wheel turned out further than the tops.

Candace Cable has been ranked number one nationally in wheelchair racing competition from 1984 to 1990. Furthermore, internationally, she has won 75 marathons, including six Boston Marathons (1981, '82, '85, '86, '87, & '88) and has set world records in every distance throughout her 21-year career. Winning two Olympic medals in three Summer Olympic Games, Candace participated in the only exhibition event for the disabled. Additionally, she has won nine Gold medals in five Summer Paralympic Games. Since 1990, Candace has been competing

on the United States Disabled Ski Team, winning three Paralympic medals on the Alpine team. In 1994, she switched to the Cross Country Team, and is currently on the "A" team.

To say that Candace has been an inspiration of disabled people is an understatement.
