## David Baird Presents Rotary Information Meeting for New and Prospective Members—"What is Rotary?"

In a program designed to explain what Rotary is to guests in the community who were not Rotarians, Malibu Rotary Club Past President, Seaver College Dean Emeritus and Pepperdine Professor of History **W. David Baird** (left) showed a video and shared his experience as a longtime Rotarian in California and Oklahoma.

Of course as a historian David told of the history of Rotary and the ideals and programs of Rotary as they exist today. This material is available on the Rotary International website: Rotary.org.

Paul P. Harris, an attorney, wanted to create a professional group with the same friendly spirit he felt in the small towns of his youth. On 23 February 1905, Harris, Gustavus Loehr, Silvester Schiele, and Hiram Shorey gathered at Loehr's office in Room 711 of the Unity Building in downtown Chicago. This was the first Rotary club meeting. They

decided to call the new club "Rotary" after the practice of rotating meeting locations.

Within five years clubs had formed across the country, from San Francisco to New York.

In August 1910, Rotarians held their first convention in Chicago. The 16 clubs that existed at that time united to form the National Association of Rotary Clubs.

In 1912, the name changed to International Association of Rotary Clubs to reflect the addition of clubs in other countries. The name Rotary International was adopted in 1922.

By July 1925, Rotary had grown to more than 2,000 clubs and an estimated 108,000 members on six continents.

Rotary's reputation attracted presidents, prime ministers, and a host of other luminaries to its ranks — among them author Thomas Mann, diplomat Carlos P. Romulo, and composer Jean Sibelius.

As Rotary grew, members pooled their resources and used their talents to serve their communities. The organization's dedication to this ideal is best expressed in its motto: Service Above Self.



## The Four-Way Test

In 1932, Rotarian Herbert J. Taylor created The Four-Way Test. It should be the ethical basis which that all Rotarians should adhere to in their business and in life. The test, which has been translated into more than 100 languages, asks the following questions:

Of the things we think, say or do

Is it the TRUTH?

Is it FAIR to all concerned?

Will it build GOODWILL and BETTER FRIENDSHIPS?

Will it be BENEFICIAL to all conc

Our 1.2 million-member organization started with the vision of one man—Paul P. Harris. The Chicago attorney formed one of the world's first service organizations, the Rotary Club of Chicago, on 23 February 1905 as a place where professionals with diverse backgrounds could exchange ideas and form meaningful, lifelong friendships. Rotary's name came from the group's early practice of rotating meetings among the offices of each member. Our ongoing commitment

Rotarians have not only been present for major events in history—we've been a part of them. From the beginning, three key traits have remained strong throughout Rotary:

We're truly international. Only 16 years after being founded, Rotary had clubs on six continents. Today we're working together from around the globe both digitally and in-person to solve some of our world's most challenging problems.

We persevere in tough times. During WWII, Rotary clubs in Germany, Austria, Italy, Spain, and Japan were forced to disband. Despite the risks, many continued to meet informally and following the war's end, Rotary members joined together to rebuild their clubs and their countries.

Our commitment to service is ongoing. We began our fight against polio in 1979 with a project to immunize 6 million children in the Philippines. By 2012, only three countries remain polioendemic—down from 125 in 1988.

### **History of The Rotary Foundation**

At the 1917 convention, outgoing RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed to set up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International. Growth of the Foundation

In 1929, the Foundation made its first gift of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into Easter Seals.

When Rotary founder Paul Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring in to Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation. Evolution of Foundation programs

1947: The Foundation established its first program, Fellowships for Advance Study, later known as Ambassadorial Scholarships.

1965-66: Three programs were launched: Group Study Exchange, Awards for Technical Training, and Grants for Activities in Keeping with the Objective of The Rotary Foundation, which was later called Matching Grants.

1978: Rotary introduced the Health, Hunger and Humanity (3-H) Grants. The first 3-H Grant funded a project to immunize 6 million Philippine children against polio.

1985: The PolioPlus program was launched to eradicate polio worldwide.

1987-88: The first peace forums were held, leading to Rotary Peace Fellowships.

2013: New district, global, and packaged grants enable Rotarians around the world to respond to the world's greatest needs.

Since the first donation of \$26.50 in 1917, the Foundation has received contributions totaling more than \$1 billion.

Each year, gifts to the Rotary Foundation fund thousands of projects around the globe. Here are a few examples from 2011–12:

\$102.8 million spent on fighting polio in areas including India, which marked its first polio-free year

\$2 million raised by Korean Rotary members to build a maternal and child health complex in Tanzania, serving an area of more than a million people

\$40,000 spent to provide safe drinking water, sanitation and facilities, and training in India.

### We are responsible leaders

Responsible leadership means being both efficient and trustworthy with our donations. We're committed to making the most out of every dollar we receive—that's why we use nearly 90% of our funding for program expenses in an industry where the average is only 65%.

## The Structure of Rotary

Rotary is made up of three parts: at the heart of Rotary are our clubs, who are supported by Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation.

Rotary clubs bring together dedicated individuals to exchange ideas, build relationships, and take action.

Rotary International supports Rotary clubs worldwide by coordinating global programs, campaigns, and initiatives.

The Rotary Foundation uses generous donations to fund projects by Rotarians and our partners in communities around the world. As a nonprofit, all of the Foundation's funding comes from voluntary contributions made by Rotarians and friends who share our vision of a better world.

Together, Rotary clubs, Rotary International, and The Rotary Foundation work to make lasting improvements in our communities and around the world.

## **Rotary and the United Nations**

Rotary's relationship with the United Nations dates back to 1945 when some 49 Rotary members acted as delegates, advisors and consultants at the United Nations Charter Conference. Today,

Rotary holds the highest consultative status possible with the United Nations as a non-governmental organization.

Rotary and the United Nations have a long history of working together and sharing similar visions for a more peaceful world.

In 1942, Rotary clubs from 21 nations organized a conference in London to develop a vision for advancing education, science, and culture after World War II. That event was a precursor to UNESCO. In 1945, 49 Rotarians went to San Francisco to help draft the UN Charter. Rotary and the UN have been close partners ever since, a relationship that's apparent through PolioPlus and work with UN agencies.

"The invitation to Rotary International to participate in the United Nations Conference as consultant to the United States delegation was not merely a gesture of good will and respect toward a great organization. It was a simple recognition of the practical part Rotary's members have played and will continue to play in the development of understanding among nations. The representatives of Rotary were needed at San Francisco and, as you well know, they made a considerable contribution to the Charter itself, and particularly to the framing of provisions for the Economic and Social Council."

Rotary currently holds the highest consultative status offered to a nongovernmental organization by the UN's Economic and Social Council, which oversees many specialized UN agencies. Rotary maintains and furthers its relationship with a number of UN bodies, programs, commissions, and agencies through its representative network. This network consists of RI representatives to the United Nations and other organizations.

The relation between Rotary continues: If you are in New York in November you are cordially invited to attend Rotary Day at the United Nations on Saturday, 2 November 2013, 8:00am Registration, 9:30am program begins, till 4:00 pm.

## Malibu Rotary Club Charter Member Jack Corrodi Gets His Favorite Foods Delivered from the Malibu Rotarians

Last week before the Rotary meeting Maggie telephoned Jack and Kay Corrodi to get an update on their health.

Jack had recently returned home after a 24 day hospital stay and had to relearn to walk as he was not allowed out of bed for 24 days and Kay had just had breast cancer surgery.

I asked Jack what we as the Rotary Club could do for him and told him I hate to spend money on flowers as they have such beautiful gardens at home. I asked him what his favorite food was. Jack said mashed potatoes (immediately I saw myself making a big pot of Yukon gold mashed potatoes which was my mother's recipe as she was from the Munich area of Germany). I said Jack what else is your favorite food. He said "Wendy's Chili with extra onions and extra cheese. Well, I said, we will make that happen and you will have your dinner delivered Thursday evening!

I knew Hubert had appointments in Santa Monica on Thursday.

Hubert was kind enough to stop by Wendy's in Santa Monica and pick up Jack's favorite chili... I arranged with the manager we would bring our own containers and they would fill them once we arrived.

This was after Maggie made twelve telephone calls, from one person to the next, and ended finally talking to the District Manager who agreed to provide us with two 6 pound cans in bulk of chili .... the local managers said they could not sell in bulk .... long story short ... when you can't

get results go to the top person... I must admit it was alot of time spent on getting what I wanted and alot of telephone calls .... but shows to persevere ...... it pays off!

So by the time Hubert got home I had the 10 pounds of mashed potatoes whipped up and the onions sautéed in butter and hard boiled eggs sliced over the potatoes.

When we sat the potatoes and chili on the table, hungry Jack (after a long day as an outpatient in Santa Monica Hospital for Hemodialysis) dug right in with his fork and kept saying "yum"and kept going back for more and more....

Jack and Kay were very very happy and felt so blessed that we the Malibu Rotary Club thought about them.....



P.S. I ran into their son Benjamin last evening at the Pavillions and asked him if Jack was enjoying the chili and potatoes. He said "Oh, my and how!". Benjamin told me Jack woke up during the night and around 2:00 A.M. asked Kay to fix him a bowl of chili and potatoes". Benjamin said "you have to teach mom how to make those potatoes". Benjamin said "Jack has almost finished them already".

My mother who was from the Munich area of Germany used to make this kind of mashed potatoes. On top put onions sauteed in butter with sliced hard boiled eggs... when I sat them on the

**Julie Jenkins,** of the Rotary Club of Burbank Sunrise, visited the Malibu Rotary Club last year as Rotary Assistant District 5280 Governor. This year Julie, who is a victim of polio, has been named Rotary District Polio Plus Chairperson.

She has written the following:

The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation has generously provided a new challenge to help meet the U.S. \$1.5B funding gap in the strategic campaign to eradicate polio by 2018. Through June 2018, the first \$35 million donated via Rotary to the Polio Plus Fund each year will generate a \$2 matching contribution from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. This is a fantastic opportunity for every participant to see his or her donations quickly expand to inoculate three times as many children.

\$1 donated through Rotary + \$2 contributed by Gates Foundation = \$3 total funding = children inoculated

\$35 million donated through Rotary + \$70 million contributed by Gates Foundation = \$105 million total funding = 175 million children inoculated
