Margo Neal Presents Highlights of Her Recent Humanitarian Trip With Rotary District 5280 Rotarians To Guatemala



Malibu Rotary Club President Margo is wearing and holding some of the items she brought back with her when she joined 130 Rotarians from local Rotary District 5280 on a Humanitarian Trip to Guatemala Feb 5 through Feb 9.

The Rotarians were all given the yellow t-shirts before they left, and the items Margo is holding were all handmade thank you gifts from children who were helped by various Rotary projects in Guatemala sponsored by Rotary clubs in the Los Angeles area.

The district has a trip each year to a different country. Margo said several of the people on her trip go every year. She said she had fun but it was exhausting. He flight left Los Angeles at 12:30 a.m.

and landed at 9:30 a.m. in Guatemala. Then there was a 2 hour bus ride up a mountain, and then a 2 hour tour. The 5 star hotel was owned be a Rotarian, and was part hotel and part museum. There were several Rotary projects in the area, and Margo said she enjoyed the ones involving kids. The Malibu Rotary Club donated \$250.00 for back packs and before Margo left, Malibu Rotarians brought items to put into the bags. She and the other Rotarians were allotted extra luggage space for these items, and they were well received when they got to their destination.

In her slide presentation Margo showed a bookcase and books that were donated by Rotary.

Margo said she enjoyed having lunch with the kids. The sent to several places for several different Rotary projects. One of the more moving experiences occurred when they distributed wheelchairs, which were donated by faith based group Hope Haven International which is located in Sioux Falls, South Dakota. In giving thanks for her wheel chair the recipient said, "You freed me from the earth!"

There was a lot of poverty, but not everywhere. Saturday night Rotarians enjoyed a dinner at the private hacienda of the widow of a Rotarian.

The Rotary group took buses to 3 small planes to go to Tikal. Tikal is the ruins of an ancient city found in a rainforest in Guatemala. It is one of the largest archaeological sites and urban centers of the pre-Columbian Maya civilization, dating back to 400 BC. Our own David Zielski, whose company Raincatcher brings clean drinking water to people by harvesting (and filtering) rainwater might be interested in Tikal's early public works project. One of the largest of the Classic Maya cities, Tikal had no water other than what was collected from rainwater and stored in ten reservoirs. Archaeologists working in Tikal during the 20th century refurbished one of these ancient reservoirs to store water for their own use. So Dave, if you go there, just bring the filters—they already have the reservoirs!

When it was time to go back to their hotel Rotarians on who visited Tikal were told there was a "Change of plans." They would not be going back to the hotel that evening. A volcano had erupted making it unsafe to return to the hotel, but not to worry. There was a nearby 4 star hotel owned by a Rotarian. It had a lake front view and they would have to pay for the room—it was not included in their all inclusive tour price. So how much for this 4 star hotel? Would you believe \$16.00?

On Monday morning the Rotarians viewed the Joya Verde Sanitation Project, bringing clean water to homes, delivered backpacks and school supplies to schools, and repaired and painted the playground for kids.

Next January the Rotary District humanitarian trip will go to Panama.

"3-2-1- Go To End Polio" Day at Griffith Park on March 21

The district event was part of world wide Rotary event, with activities scheduled around the planet to help raise money and awareness for Rotary's effort to end polio. The local district event was a 5 K / 10 K Run or Walk and Family Festival with the Start and Finish Line at

Griffith Park at Chrystal Springs. There was also a 1 mile fun walk and lunch by IN-N-Out Burger and a raffle. All proceeds went go to END POLIO NOW, a humanitarian program of Rotary International to eradicate polio worldwide. At least 400 people participated in the district 5 K/10 K Run or Walk and thousands worldwide.
