Rose Parade

By all accounts, the Rose parade this year was terrific – and the Rotary float won the Princess Trophy! as the most beautiful float under thirty-five feet. The float, with the theme "Inching Towards The End Of Polio," featured an inchworm in a doctor's outfit, helping bring the complete

eradication of polio. Rich was there, having been lucky enough to get some of the district's tickets, as were Nathan and our German exchange student, Leo Baum. Leo was the center of attention for Nathan's daughter and her friend, both of whom have been studying German in school.

Rotary Minute

Robin read an article in the November Rotarian about a project in Cameroon, carried out by District 7820 in Canada. They supply 34 hospitals with modern birthing beds, operating tables and other equipment, as well as schools with computer labs, libraries, bathrooms and buses. Besides the district and direct donations, these projects are supported through grants from The Rotary Foundation.

Speaker: Nathan Wolfstein, Disaster Services Preparation in the SFV

Over two years ago Nathan started working not just on disaster relief, which Rotary excels in, but preparation. His extensive background in scouting (with the Boy Scouts) gave him an excellent foundation in emergency preparedness. What's the difference between an emergency and a disaster? In an emergency, like a car accident or someone choking, 911 is able to respond; in the case of a disaster, emergency services, such as police and fire departments, are too overwhelmed to be likely to respond to any one call – if you can even reach them by phone.

When Nathan became our Rotary District's Disaster Recovery Officer, he became the first, and maybe still only, one in the country. In that role he has been working to get individual clubs trained to step up in case the need arises. So far just a handful of clubs, including ours, have done much in the way of either training (CPR or CERT) or helping promote readiness through education and

essential supplies. He would like to see as many Rotarians and others as possible take the 17½ hours of CERT (Community Emergency Response Team) training from Fire Chief Stacey Gerlich. This free program is an all-risk, all-hazard training designed to help you protect yourself, your family, your neighbors and your neighborhood in an emergency situation.

Within Rotary we now have a true community-based program – Disaster Aid USA, which works with the new Disaster Aid International (previously Shelter Box). Rather than just provide shelter and supplies on site during a disaster, the organization is working to stockpile supplies in locations where they are most likely to be needed. Working with other organizations such as the Salvation Army and Boy Scouts has helped create a strong structure and leadership.

Next year most of District 5260 will become part of District 5280, which, having had no program of their own, is adopting our disaster program. Nathan will be making presentations in February at the Zone meeting, to Interacters in April, and later this year at the Rotary worldwide Emergency Disaster Recovery forum in Berkeley. Before then, on January 19 in the afternoon, there will be a special event at the Salvation Army (TSA) location in Canoga Park introducing their Emergency / Disaster Services facility – the first in the Valley. Assemblymember Bob Blumenfield will be on hand for this.

TSA is always among the first responders in a disaster, providing food, clothing and shelter, among other necessities. The Canoga Park location will be both a local storage and training center. Other than this, so far only the Lake Balboa Community Council has anything in stock, and they have just 2 containers. At Judy's location they now have 20 pallets of supplies and a 6,500 kilowatt portable generator (still in need of a 500 gallon fuel tank). Since they have been borrowing the canteen truck from the Glendale center, they hope to get one, preferably two, of their own for use both in emergencies and by the community for events.

Training at TSA's ARC (Adult Rehabilitation Center) will include CPR, CERT and how to effectively utilize the emergency supplies stored at the ARC. With so few people currently CERT trained and only the supplies mentioned, using them wisely and distributing them where most needed will be a challenge. Nathan advocates the establishment of an emergency / disaster **volunteer** center to correspond to the co-ordination efforts of professional first responders (fire, police, medical, etc.). A simple first step is for each of us to keep our critical information, including contact lists, on a thumb drive we keep with us.

What other things can we do? Denny's is a corporate sponsor of CERT training, and they make it easy to help. When you get and use a Denny's card (like a CVS or supermarket card), Denny's will automatically donate a percentage of your bill. Nathan shared copies of the book, "It's a Disaster" with us. These detailed preparedness guides can be purchased wholesale by the case, with our club information on a label on the cover, and included with our disaster kits. (Rich still has 10 and Rosie also has several.) The combo can then sold at retail, making them a good fundraising tool. If the district or club buys 1,000 or more, we can even get a custom cover and several pages

for our own information in the front of the book.


