Speaker: Rebecca Olkowski, Word Press Blogging

Robin introduced her friend Rebecca as a person who can help with almost any online marketing problem one might have. Owner of SharpBizImage.com, Rebecca taught herself how to create blogs, make them look like websites, and add the elements needed to bring traffic to a site. She can do the set-up and design as well as writing.

A voice-over actor for 30 years (usually of kids, in lots of cartoons, especially anime), Rebecca was suddenly widowed 10 years ago and left with two young children. She went into sales and did very well, earning several cars, then marketing, in which she also did well. A year ago she decided to create her own on-line business based on what she likes to do, which includes creative writing. She taught herself how to create blogs and has become quite expert at it. She gets a chuckle when she hears others comment that if you want something created online, such as a website, to ask someone in their twenties.

Rebecca says blogs aren't just for kids, or people keeping an on-line diary or opinion site, almost every business can use a blog to increase revenues! In fact, many websites are actually blogs in their structure – interactive sites where visitors can add their comments, shop or connect to other information. Regular websites are more like a company brochure, where you hope a customer calls. Blogs are interactive, able to collect information from potential or existing customers.

Thanks to Goggle's recent algorithm changes, creating a good blog that you update frequently, with links to related websites or other information you offer, can gradually move you to the top of the list when people search on your topic.

Most people are on FaceBook – about 80% of those who are on networking or social sites. But there are major issues with using FaceBook for business. Companies would rather take their customers to a quieter, more private site. Links on your FaceBook page to your blog can help you do that. And with the software now available for blogs, you can manage those contacts.

Rebecca recommends writing 300-700 word articles that will generate hits (based on key words) in Google searches by your potential clients. That will drive traffic to your website. Do that several times a week and you could even move up past companies that pay to have their links in the top 10 search results.

Where can you host a blog? There are several free sites, including www.blogger.com, owned by Google, and www.wordpress.com, but since those are free, the hosting sites have veto power over your postings and could take your page down altogether. If you host it yourself you might pay \$80/year, but would be able to post anything legal that you wish. And you can still use the software capabilities of Wordpress, or hire someone to set the blog up for you. You can also manage standard websites with Wordpress. It's highly optimized, and allows you to add videos, photos and audio files.

Keeping your site active and clean (remove bad posts and prevent spam) isn't the only thing you need to be successful; you also need to differentiate your site and offerings from those of others. What niche can you serve? Highlight one aspect that is desirable but not really common, and make sure your page has the related words, so it will come up in a search for that product or service. You can find out how often a term is searched using the Google ad keyword tool. This works even for non-profits.

Offer site visitors or buyers something for free, whether an on-line lesson or interesting information. Add links to other websites that your customers might find of interest. Some of those might even pay you for doing that, usually as a small percentage of whatever the customer buys. This affiliate marketing is a great, easy way to increase your income. It costs nothing but brings in revenue. Commission Junction, Franklin Covey and many others offer these commissions. If you have an electronic product you can offer, like a Kindle book, you can make it easy for your vendors and customers to link to your site for quick sales, as well.

Ultimately the key driver of success comes from answering a few questions: What quick fixes can you offer

for sale in an area that excites you? Will people pay for it? Check Amazon and EBay for viable niches. Can you blog at least weekly for three years? It takes time to become known and trusted by site visitors before they become buyers.
