Library Volunteer Readers Program

The Northridge Library needs people for its Volunteer Readers Program. Children's Librarian Mona Gilbert has openings for four volunteer readers. The individuals must be over 21 years of age, be able to pass a background and fingerprint search, and commit to a six month time period. Each session is two hours, one day each week. The idea is to build a relationship with the children, preschool to third grade. If they come back to read with you, they get a free book. The library keeps a record of how many children are in the program.

According to Mona, the library offers a one-day training seminar. Once you take the training, you can use it at any of the city's 72 libraries, although Mona hopes you will use it at Northridge. She brought applications with her. The next training in the Valley is scheduled for May 14, noon to 4:00 p.m. at the Van Nuys branch. Once you complete the training, you'll be expected to go to the library for an orientation. You can make the reading experience anything you want it to be, using flannel boards, stuffed animals or another language—just make it your own.

Speaker: Paul Eisenstadt,

Paul Eisenstadt, owner of Protection Alarms, spoke to the Mid San Fernando Valley Rotary club about "New Technology for Residential & Commercial Security." Did you know if you have an alarm system, you need a city alarm permit? According to Paul, the permit is \$30. Does it really matter if you have a permit or not? Yes. False alarms cost \$150 with the permit and \$300 without.

Alarms have changed over the years from the traditional where doors and windows were wired with motion detectors and alerts sent on phone lines. In the new world, cellular communications are used. Paul has partnered with Alarm.com to offer this system, which he says gives you complete control from your phone or your computer. You can ask to be notified of any changes via texts or emails. You can also include normal activity—doors/windows opening and closing. The system keeps track of who is coming and going in your office, activity

near your computer server, medicine chests or jewelry boxes.

The whole ideas, says Paul, is flexibility. "You can't be everywhere at all times. Not all events revolve around a burglary."

What's coming in the future? Soon these capabilities will be available for your wireless thermostat, heater, lights and doors.
