# Speaker, Craft Talk: Frank Santucci, World Financial Group

Frank has had a wide variety of careers, starting with the U.S. Army, into which he was drafted on Dec. 7, 1955

- the 14<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the bombing of Pearl Harbor. He did his basic training at Ft. Dix in New Jersey, not much fun in the winter. During those eight weeks he volunteered for guard duty as a way to keep warm – the guard shacks were heated! From there he was sent to Georgia, where he got into a radio and teletype school. But when the instructor asked who could type and he raised his hand, having taken typing in high school, he found himself five minutes later outside mowing the grass. Most of the class was spent just teaching the men how to type.

While there, Frank was also a trumpet player in the base band. When he got orders sending him to Korea, he went directly to the Colonel in charge of the base and argued the band couldn't spare him, so couldn't his orders be changed. Turns out they could, and he stayed there, and in the band, until his discharge.

Those of us lucky enough to attend a performance of the Los Angeles Symphonic Winds, an orchestra comprised of 100 musicians, including Frank, know how skillfully he still plays the trumpet.

After the Army, Frank was a gandy dancer for three years. Turns out that's not a stage performer, but a rail worker who places and fixes the rail ties, using the hand-propelled cart we've all seen in old movies to travel along the tracks.

In 1963 Frank started another three-year stint, this time in radio, then three more handling cameras in television production. From there he joined a company selling transmission equipment. When that company was sold to Ampex, he moved with the new parent to northern California, staying 10 years.

By 1982, Frank decided to start his own video equipment company, which he moved to southern California in 2001 as Santucci Video, a company he still owns and operates. In fact, since he started in 1961, this year marks his 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary in the television industry. Some years later he added Pets & U Photography, now closed in the face of the exploding digital camera market.

Marc Tapper and Frank met in 2004, and soon after Frank became a member of our club, then president in 2007. It was at PETS (President Elect Training Seminar) that he met another incoming president, who worked in the financial market. When looking for a new job, he contacted her, and about 18 months ago joined the same company: World Financial Group. While Kristine Mason, our Jan. 20<sup>th</sup> speaker, talked about insurance, his topic and area of business is a related product: annuities.

Just in case he hadn't done enough different things, in 1978, when he was between jobs, Frank got his pilot's license. He still loves to fly, and has gone up with both Marc and Rich, but doesn't fly on his own much anymore. The other fun activity he keeps up is his trumpet playing. We're all invited to hear him at the next Los Angeles Symphonic Winds concert, May 22.

Frank asked some excellent questions to learn what we might already know about annuities. He explained that his business is helping families and companies plot a plan for their future. Most people aren't aware of all the different elements that need to be considered for the wide variety of circumstances they could face, including natural disasters.

Even just considering cash flow, basic needs expense management and debt management, many folks are out of control, often with huge credit card debts. He works with another company that can help put things back in order, by arranging payment plans and getting reductions of the debts to as little as 50 cents on the dollar.

In preparing for disasters, Frank advises having 3-6 months' expenses in cash on hand – ATM's may not be working, banks may not have access to their records or even be open, and cash may be your only means of exchange. Obviously a disaster of the magnitude we are seeing now in Japan is something we hope never to be faced with, but we all know it could happen, and most of us remember the first, difficult days after the Northridge earthquake.

Frank also helps with more normal future planning for retirement, and estate management. One vehicle that is especially good for retirement and building a special purpose nest egg (like for college tuition) is an annuity. Annuities are investment vehicles that you pay into for a fixed amount of time (or in one lump sum), which pay out a fixed monthly / annual benefit upon your retirement, with a guaranteed acceleration rate, such as 2% per year, for the rest of your life. No matter what happens in the stock market. Ideally you live so long you get paid many times what you invested.
