Speaker: Lisa Long, Mission Circle Ministry at St. John Eudes Parish

Lisa started her talk by showing us a set of photos that included children in a classroom, a mother, and a group of villagers enjoying clean water – all success stories thanks to the work the ministry has done in the village of Egbelu in the Amaimo Local Government Area of Imo State in Nigeria, where Father Kenneth grew up. So far they have outfitted 360 grateful students with school supplies and uniforms, which also helps the local economy – the cloth is local, and village seamstresses measure each student then make the clothes to fit.

The one well they have helped drill and pump serves all 60,000 villagers, with the pump working at scheduled hours and the system always guarded against possible vandalism. It has been working so well that it has yet to need any repairs.

Circle Ministry also helps a number of other non-profit groups, including ZOE in the Philippines, which helps prevent and rescue kids being sold into prostitution, some as young as 8 years old. They also help Home Boys here in Los Angeles. This organization works with gang members to get them off the streets and into productive lives, teaching them job skills, operating the now-famous bakery and craft sales, removing tattoos at no charge, and getting the boys and girls into safe housing.

Father Kenneth Chukwu of St. John Eudes Parish told us most members of his former home are farmers, though his parents were teachers. If people are lucky enough to gain some wealth they usually move to the cities, where there is clean water, electricity and a much lower likelihood of being kidnapped for ransom. He became a priest and taught in Nigeria, then came to the U.S. six years ago, where his first position was as chaplain at Northridge Hospital. He returns to his village every year, living as the villagers do so he can better understand what they face. The children still have to carry heavy loads of water, making at least two trips before school starts for the day. At least in Egbelu the water is now safe, thanks to the new well. But elsewhere, as in much of rural Africa and many other places in the world, the only water sources are full of disease and industrial pollution from the growing number of foreign manufacturing plants. By providing clean water they can help prevent both sources of illness.

The well they helped put in required drilling to 500 feet. It was then sedimented (for purification of the water it goes through a layer of sand) and pumped up into 3,000 gallon tanks for storage. From his own pocket Father Kenneth pays for the gas and oil to run the pump – there is no electricity in the village.

In addition to clean water, which the villagers make a community project, Father Kenneth emphasized the need for education. With a corrupt government, villagers need outside support for education and keeping the schools in good repair. During the rainy season hard rains can be a real problem when roofs leak – schools have to close. Money is still needed to help repair many of the buildings. As Father Kenneth noted, without a decent education, they will not be able to fully develop either their own potential or their community.

It was heartening to learn that when uniforms and school supplies were provided, school enrollment went up 100%. Children beg on the street for pens so they can attend, and many who had dropped out returned. But the strong desire among the young people to do similar good works when they grow up is perhaps the most heartwarming outcome.

Additional efforts include providing scholarships and necessities to the poorest villagers. They are also looking at the possibility of buying animals for orphans, so they have a means of supporting themselves and don't end up in slavery.

To help raise money for other charities, there will be a special fair held November 12 and 13 in Fr. Grill Hall at the church, 9901 Mason Ave. in Chatsworth. If you'd like to participate, you can put an ad in the program, or rent a booth to showcase your business or sell your products. Lisa said they are also looking for sponsors to provide the \$300 booth fee so that non-profits can exhibit at no charge. The charities to be supported are Homeboy, Good Shepherd Sisters, St. Andrew's Abbey and SJE's Hispanic Ministry.
