District Foundation Meeting

On Saturday, September 10, 2011 at Woodbury University, District 5260 met to talk about the various aspects of the Rotary International Foundation. The seminar gave a comprehensive look at the Foundation and why it needs our support.

District Governor Tom Hardy kicked things off with a question: "Do you know who Luis Fermin Tenorio is?" Give up? In 1991, at the age of 9, this young Peruvian boy was the last person in the Western Hemisphere to contract polio.

Rotary committed to eradicating polio in 1988 and since then has lowered the number of cases from 1,000 cases per day to 358 cases so far this year (122 cases in the four endemic countries: Afghanistan, Nigeria, India and Pakistan and 238 in non-endemic countries). To be considered a non-endemic country, there have to have been no new polio cases for three years. Unfortunately, new cases are brought in by travelers from the endemic countries. Our district alone has donated over \$1.3 million to this cause.

The Rotary Foundation dollars go toward a multitude of projects, including providing mosquito nets to combat malaria and projects to prevent human trafficking.

Speakers, including PDG Eli Gauna, touched on their own personal experiences while participating in National Immunization Days in India and witnessing people receiving wheelchairs in Nepal. PDG Ken Banks provided detailed information on what it meant to be a sustaining member (\$1000/year), a major donor (\$10,000 in a lifetime), and the Paul Harris Society (\$1,000 total). Rotarians can also designate funds through an insurance policy, or an amendment to a trust or will. As PDG and

North San Fernando Valley Rotary club member Les Grossman joked, "becoming a Paul Harris Fellow is only one decimal point to the right of one Rotarian every year", which requires a \$100 donation.

Lee Stacy of Burbank Sunrise talked about the opportunities clubs miss out on when they don't apply for a matching grant. Larry McLaughlin schooled us the points to consider before doing an overseas project, including if the club overseas has ever done a joint project, and if they have, have they submitted a report. Jim Baker of the North Hollywood club talked to us about community service grants. Our club recently applied for this district grant to be used for teaching the Junior Achievement business program to students at San Antonio Boys Home.

Pam Russell, PDG of District 5340, current Zone 26 Future Vision Transition Coordinator and a member of the LaJolla/Golden Triangle club, described the six areas RI is focusing on:

- Peace, and Conflict Prevention and Resolution
- Disease Prevention and Treatment
- Water and Sanitation
- Maternal/Child Health
- Basic Education and Literacy

Economic and Community Development

RI has renamed matching grants and is now calling them global grants. The renaming was done to move away from small projects to larger ones. Clubs will have to come up with \$15,000 instead of \$5,000. Matched, this will be \$30,000. If you get a few clubs together, think of what you can do with the money. The largest global grant available is for \$199,000.

Rotary Minute

PDG Emilio Basile gave our Rotary Minute. He spoke about the district community grant we applied for to teach students at San Antonio Boys Home how to start a business using either the Junior Achievement business program or Ray Carlson's adaptation. We discussed who could commit to the program and its cost. According to Emilio, Ray's modified program would cost us \$`1,300 for three hours of instruction to train us, plus student workbooks for up to 30 students. The Junior Achievement program, which Emilio taught for five years, would cost \$1,000 for an hour and a half of instruction and the manuals. We need volunteers to either teach or be guest speakers over the course of eight to ten weeks of instruction. To apply for the grant we have to put up \$450 for the district to give us the other \$550, totaling \$1,000.

Speaker: Chuck lacobellis, Value and Purpose

Chuck lacabellis, a web designer and owner of Value and Purpose spoke to us about how he's helped clients, many of which are nonprofits with their fundraising activities. Chuck is also a member of the Northridge Kiwanis and so like Rotary members is always involved in one project or another.

Chuck began his talk, "Fundraising...Is it for You?" with several questions:

- What kind of fundraising have you done so far?
- What are your expectations when fundraising?
- How many members actively participate?
- How many outside supporters to you have?
- Do you have relationships with any local businesses?
- Do you understand the power of compounding?

Answering his last question first, Chuck explained what he meant by compounding. Twenty participants are each responsible for four ticket sales at \$15 per ticket. That's 80 tickets and \$1,200.

Chuck then laid out the four main types of fundraising. They include:

- Direct sales with immediate delivery of something (e.g. the purchase of a raffle ticket)
- Direct sales with delayed delivery (along the lines of Girl Scout cookies)
- Special events
- Donation solicitation (traditional and online)

Be realistic when deciding on a type of fundraising. Do you have buy-in from your club? Have you targeted the right audience? Do you have enough people to work on the project? Is this something you want to do annually?

Once you decide how you are going to fundraise, the planning kicks in. You'll need to:

- Get the message out early
- Personalize your event (tell your story)
- Build a community of supporters
- Use Facebook and Twitter to advertise it on a consistent basis.
- Define its perceived value.

Any fundraiser you do has to be fun for both the participants and your volunteers and club members. Don't forget to formally thank each volunteer after the event and

then again during the holidays—reminding them that you will be repeating the event later on in the year and would love their participation again.

What types of events are successful? Car shows, bake sales, yard sales, family portraits and custom charity coin banks. For example, Chuck was involved with a Simi Valley Car show six years ago in a church parking lot. The event featured live music, a bake sale, a yard sale, and family portraits were taken in front of the cars. Each portrait was sold for \$10. Vendors were also included. Cars paid \$25 and vendors were charged \$100 for a table.

Custom charity coin banks are another great money generator. Let's say you have 300 supporters and you give them each a coin bank. The cost of the banks is about \$800. If you don't want to pay for them yourselves, get a local business to sponsor the banks and put their name and logo on it. Each bank holds \$35 to \$45 worth of coins, which is collected in a three to four month time period, totaling \$10,500.

How do we put all this into action? First we have to start a fundraising committee. Then choose a fundraiser, something simple to start. Organize and divide the tasks. Make sure you're following the tax laws. Find out when other fundraising events are being held so your event isn't in competition for funding, plan for what participants will get, and think about hiring a fundraising consultant.
