

Speaker: Ken Craft, Hope of the Valley Mission (with some information from their website)

Robin introduced our speaker, Ken Craft, who founded of Hope of the Valley Mission (previously the valley Rescue Mission) three years ago next month. In that time the Mission has served over 70,000 hot nutritious meals, distributed over 35,000 articles of clothing, provided over 10,000 hygiene kits, 850 showers and numerous referrals for shelter, as well as completing and opening their 22,000 square foot facility in Sun Valley. They provide more than 50 showers a day to those living on the streets, and serve 1,100 meals a week.

After serving six years as Director of another local rescue mission, Ken Craft, along with the advisory board that served with him, felt it was time to start a Rescue Mission that would be headquartered in the San Fernando Valley and led by the people that live and work here. Each night LA has nearly 73,000 homeless people and only 17,000 shelter beds available, leaving 56,000 homeless

people in LA County with no place to sleep tonight. One out of every 9 homeless persons in the US (about 660,000 nationally) lives in LA County. As Ken told us, most people think of this as a skid row problem, and there are 10,000 people concentrated into that area. But at least 7,000 live in the Valley, spread out among the various communities, where, on average, there are only 850 shelter beds available, including those at the Mission.

The fastest growing homeless group is women and children – 41% of all who are homeless are families, and most of those are headed by women. While there are alcoholics and addicts among the homeless, most are in that situation because of an unexpected change in their life. The top three causes of homelessness in Los Angeles are loss of a job, abandonment of the family by a significant other, and a health care crisis, any of which can lead to a loss of sufficient income to pay for food, housing and medicine. One third of the Valley residents live below the national poverty line.

The suicide rate among the homeless is very high. Ken told us of a 60 year-old man he spoke with just yesterday who was in despair because he didn't have the \$15 he needed for his essential medication. He had tried his pastor and his family with no luck, and was hopeless enough he was contemplating suicide. Ken gave it to him, helping for now, but there needs to be an on-going level of support for people like him.

Ken observed that people don't care how much you know until they know how much you care. The first step in helping someone is to give them a good hot meal. Each week, Hope of the Valley Rescue Mission provides between 700 and 800 hot nutritious meals to the homeless living on the streets in the Valley. The Mission also provides between 175 and 250 hot showers each week to the same population. A hot shower and hot meal often are the first step to a changed life.

The Mission focuses on "the 5 H's": Hope, Hot Meals, Housing, Health Services and Healing. With the support of the community, they offer:


- Daily hot meals
- Mobile hot showers
- Community food box distribution
- Emergency shelter for families
- Men's in-patient drug and alcohol recovery program
- Emergency shelter for men and women
- Transitional shelter for families
- Transitional shelter for men and women
- In house and mobile medical and dental facilities
- Homeless drop in center for mail, showers, computer learning, case management etc.
- Mentoring and tutoring programs for homeless children
- Job training courses
- Life skills classes, e.g., money management, parenting classes, etc.

A very generous donation of \$25,000 from a couple who were touched by Ken's presentation at a church allowed him to buy a canopy, which now covers the inner courtyard of the Mission. It allows 50 people to sleep there every night, regardless of the weather. Retelling the story of the little boy saving starfish stranded on the beach, Ken said he wishes he could help everyone, but he feels good knowing he makes a difference to each one he can help.

Currently they are renovating a 12 bedroom, 6 bath house in Pacoima that will house 10 mothers and 20 children. It is a partial donation on which they had to get a mortgage for half the property's value, but well worth that investment, plus some remodeling. They are putting in new doors and windows and hope to have it open soon. It is very much needed in that area, since Women's Care Cottage closed in 2009 for lack of funding.

The fourth "H", Health Services, they tackle in several ways. A recent partnership with Santa Maria's Children and Family Center allows the Mission to provide, free of charge, a wide array of medical services to the homeless. The clinic sets up at the Mission and provides prenatal care, consultations, blood work and lab tests, vaccinations, physicals and more.

Healing has to come from the inside out, so they also offer therapy and addiction rehabilitation — whatever a person needs to recover. To help them continue, and to provide hope, they offer classes to the adults on job skills, parenting, etc., and tutor children on school work. There are many other ways they help individuals and families get back on track. July 18 they gave away 2,500 new backpacks to homeless and underserved children throughout the Valley as part of a special day for them. (The children were also treated to a professional soccer game and given a healthy meal.)

Homelessness is a community problem. "When you help your community, you help yourself!" There are many ways to join the rescue effort:

- Give a financial gift
- Donate your time (tutoring, cooking, donation pick-ups, cleaning, serving, office assistance, etc.)
- Donate food
- Donate your clothes and household items for sale in the Thrift Store (if an organization fills one of the Mission trucks with donations for the Thrift Store, the Mission will give it \$1,000)
- Donate a vehicle
- Conduct a drive for food, clothing, hygiene items, etc.
