

# **Speaker:** Susan Smith, Valley Alternative School Board Member

Susan Smith, a member of the PTSA at Valley Alternative School, an LAUSD magnet program located at the corner of Balboa Blvd. and Vanowen St., spoke to us about the school and its unique qualities.

Joined by Assistant Principal Chuck Broslawksy and Brenda Schwartz, who runs the school farm (yes, I said farm), Smith gave a parent's perspective of the school.

All three of her children attended the magnet, which includes grades K-12. Although the school has seen some changes over the years, it maintains an open door policy where students can drop in on teachers for advice or direction, and address teachers and administrators by their first names.

Susan explained that one of her sons, who has Asperger's Syndrome, would not have thrived in a regular school environment, but at Valley Alternative he was

allowed to learn in his own way. When he first started, he felt safest sitting under a desk and the teacher allowed him to stay there until he felt safe enough to sit at the desk on a chair.

Susan also highlighted the school's annual Peace Day, where elementary school students bring food in for a feast which is actually an international thanksgiving meal. Older children in the  $6^{th}$  grade assist the younger students that day, making it truly an inter-grade experience.

Besides its unconventional teaching methods, the school has something other schools in LAUSD do not—a farm. The farm has chickens, miniature horses, pigs, peacocks, goats, rabbits and ducks. The children help Brenda, who is in charge of the farm and has been at the school for 30 years, sell the chicken eggs. The money earned is reinvested in the farm.

Said Brenda, "The farm makes a big difference to a lot of kids. It's therapeutic and gives them a chance to interact with the animals and learn from A to Z: birth, what they eat, how to care for them, as well as how to garden, compost and harvest." The children celebrate the harvest every year with an end of school Salad Party.

Chuck added that science is also included in the farm lessons. In addition, it allows the children also learn a lot about social skills. Valley Alternative is also a Title 1 school, which means that a majority (in their case 67%) of their students qualify for free breakfast and lunch at school.

Responding to questions, Chuck explained that the school was started in the 1970s by parents who wanted a different kind of education for their children. The original school was on the CSUN campus. Today the school has 650 students in grades K-12. Chuck began working as a teacher at the school in 1992 and was given the freedom to teach how he wanted to. As an example, when he taught U.S. history he collaborated on teaching lessons with an English teacher. The class was split into two camps: Union and Confederate, to give them a better understanding of the Civil War. They had to create a flag, battle plan, march song, etc. Although teaching methods have changed over the years with changes in LAUSD standards, teachers still work collaboratively with each other.

Because the school is small, it doesn't have the ability to offer many of the advanced classes that other high schools can offer their students. To compensate for this, the school has developed an internship program where students can learn career skills or a program that allows students to attend Los Angeles Valley College. The school district provides buses to transport students to the college and LAVC waives some of the fees.


Due to budget cuts, the school no longer has an afterschool sports program but is capable of having lunchtime clubs. This was in response to Les's suggestion of possibly starting an Interact club at the school. This would fit in well as high school students at Valley Alternative have to get a certain number of volunteer credits before they graduate. Many of the students currently meet this requirement by tutoring at local elementary schools.

The goal, said Chuck, "is to work with every student as an individual and meet their needs."
