

Since today was Valentine's Day and, as she put it, "you are all sweethearts", Beth offered everyone their choice of heart-themed jewelry (in a heart shaped box, no less) for a \$10 or more contribution to the club, the club foundation or The Rotary Foundation, raising \$160 when almost every piece sold.

SPEAKER: Monique Garrity, Education in Haiti

It was a stroke of good luck that we were able to have Dr. Monique Garrity as our speaker today during her brief time in Los Angeles. In her capacity as a representative for the World Bank, overseeing development loans, she travels constantly. But she was already familiar with Rotary, having spoken to one for the first time in 1989, and knowing of the many clean water and education projects Rotary has done in Haiti, the country of her birth.

Monique told us about her big family and how her grandmother emphasized education – rare for the time, when 9th grade was the usual maximum level for even those girls lucky enough to get any schooling. She was lucky enough to escape with most of her family to the U.S. in 1959 when Duvalier came to power (the rest went to other countries), and continue her education. She eventually earned her Ph.D. in economics, which allowed her to do research in Africa, then be a university professor, until she joined the World Bank about 20 years ago. That job has taken her to the Republic of Congo (previously Zaire); China; Papua, New Guinea; Senegal, Fiji and finally, after many years of not being able to enter in spite of having become a U.S. citizen, Haiti.

Haiti was filled with only strangers when she returned because all her family and everyone they knew had left. (Fully 85% of those with a college degree left, leaving the country with limited intellectual resources.) But she visited her home town, in an agricultural valley in the center of the island, to see how it had changed. She found a school and an orphanage for girls run by nuns with a surprising

tie – in its building was a photo of her grandmother. She learned her grandmother had donated the land!

The connection made the organization even more perfect – Monique had been looking for an organization "on the ground" to help, rather than setting up a new, outsider, group. At the time they had 35 girls in the orphanage and 125 students (boys and girls) in the school, which covered only the first 4 years of education.

Only 20% of school-age children are in school, and most start very late. An 18 year-old in 7th grade or earlier is common. Most parents are illiterate and unable to help or read about their options. Teachers' pay is at the poverty level, so it's also hard to get enough teachers even for the few students who attend.

Monique helped set up Partners for Haitian Children to help in 2009, when it grew to 300 students. The board of the organization focuses on the school at the site, rather than including the orphanage. Since then, their support plus two grants and internet fundraising have helped it grow to 700 students, they've increased teachers' wages a bit and gotten textbooks for 500 students. Textbooks are so rare that the students really treasure their new possessions, showing them off with great pride.

Classes are very crowded – 60 to a teacher and room – but they are making progress in this area, as well. Soon they hope to add a library and job assistance. The nuns often keep a child there after they're 18 because there are so few jobs available and so little support – hunger is a serious problem. But the kids are always cheerful, and eager to learn.

Since the devastating earthquake there has been limited relief: some new building is in place and some areas are getting cleaned up, but the capital still looks like a war zone, A new state-of-the-art hospital is now open, but there are now 2 million people where there with 150,000 in 1959, with almost no improvement in the infrastructure.
