

SPEAKER: Mari and Pete Satuloff, Cuba

Mari and Pete Satuloff shared wonderful photos and stories of their recent trip to Cuba with us. They went with a group on a direct charter flight – the only way to legally enter the country from the U.S. – but were given some time on their own, as well.

Pete is evidently a fan of classic cars, because there were a lot of pictures of vehicles from the 1950's. Then again, that was the last time cars from the U.S. could be imported there, so they make up a large percentage of the island's vehicles, and those that are still around are carefully maintained. The U.S. embargo has hurt a lot. (The taxis they photographed, though, were primarily bicycles and horse-drawn carts!) Car parts are available from the government, but can take 3 – 6 months to get, so they're a big piece of the underground black market.


Cars aren't the only things dating mostly to the 1950's; most buildings are from that period or earlier. Some, like the venerable Opera House, are beautifully maintained. Others, like side street dwellings, are in terrible disrepair. There are some new office buildings and hospitals, but not many, at least in the areas near Havana that they visited.

And sometimes those buildings that have survived have their own, special charm. Mari and Pete showed pictures of what could only be called an apothecary shop, complete with beautiful apothecary jars of various medicines. This pharmacy was where the medicine was dispensed for another person in their group who became sick on the trip.

Since the government owns everything, good housing is a challenge. If you owned your home before the revolution, you and your children can stay in it without worrying about being kicked out. But if you leave, the house is then totally under government control for the next tenants.

On the positive side, the government stresses the arts and education, and provides good medical care. And the people themselves are wonderful. Americans aren't "allowed" to enjoy themselves there, being called "the enemy", but the average Cuban certainly doesn't treat them that way.

The embargo has caused a lot of problems for Cuba, from making the only imports very expensive ones from Europe to shutting down the sugar cane industry and the Bacardi rum factory. One can only hope that with the slight thawing of relations between out two countries, this situation will soon change.

The underground economy is about the only way most Cubans can earn enough to get by. They get just \$12 per month in salary, like the professor who was one of their guides. He was able to earn \$200 a month in tips from tourists. Others entertain, or produce art. There is no limit on artists or where they can export their work, even to the U.S. Mari and Pet saw beautiful works of art, many quite large (too large to bring home!), and most at very high prices.

Those high prices did not extend to food, which was quite reasonable. They ate at several paladores – one room restaurants in homes, which the government allows. The food was always excellent, and a 5-course lobster dinner cost just about \$20. One such restaurant was highly decorated by its owner, Fusta, a local artist who took his inspiration from Gaudi. Photos of his mosaic

work on walls and a pool showed magnificent designs reminiscent also of Picasso and Matisse.

They shared photos the view from a hotel Hemingway did a lot of writing at when he stayed there and his house and boat; images of Santeria, the local African-based religion that was nominally Christian; the local synagogue for the again-growing Jewish community; a cemetery with very elaborate monuments. Other photos included the lobby of a beautiful Meyer Lansky-designed hotel; Las Terrazas, a 1984 UNESCO biodiversity reserve, and a Cuban children's theater company called Colmenita. Also known as the Bumblebees, these children perform all over the world, even the U.S., and are the first Cuban group to be named Ambassadors of Goodwill by UNICEF (in 2007). Mari and Pete got to see them perform, with members of the audience being literally pulled in to participate in their dance before the children went back on stage.
