

RECOGNITION

Shannon Rains, Area Manager of Tierra Del Sol, told us about today's honorees, Yirby Vanegas and Englebert Peraza. Yirby was just given a Service Above Self award by the Valley animal shelter last week in recognition of his dedication and care in giving over 100 hours of volunteer service there. Shannon told us how he takes care of the animals both there and for Pets for Vets, then read the award plaque, which highlighted some of his many wonderful qualities in working with both the animals and the staff. Yirby is studying to be an animal care professional through Tierra's Nexus program.

Englebert, according to Shannon, was very shy when he first started coming to Tierra Del Sol, but he has really overcome that! He volunteers at a development institute that offers opportunities through technology to those in need, as well as at the Wilkerson Senior Center, where he put on a talent show, and he gives speeches that are so moving and well-written that he does very well with them in speech contests. Shannon noted that even when he finishes 4th, he's the one people come up to afterward to talk about what an impact his words had on them.

Mauricio gave both of our honorees a certificate to frame and \$50 a gift certificate.

SPEAKER: Jackie Mendelson, ArabicaDabra Coffee (with excerpts from Robin's articles)

Robin Kellogg introduced our speaker, Jackie Mendelson, whom she has known and admired for several years. For 30 years Jackie worked in the non-profit world, including working with the WHO and as an executive for a U.S. based nonprofit setting up AIDS clinics in the U.S. and around the world, before settling at home and starting her coffee business, ArabicaDabra. All the work except growing the beans is performed by companies here in the Valley. When Jackie contemplated retirement several years ago, she didn't see herself settling into an active senior community or becoming a full-time volunteer. "I didn't want to 'retire', I wanted to 'rewire'", she said. She has certainly done that!

Jackie showed us a PowerPoint presentation of her company's evolution and impact. Named ArabicaDabra Coffee because of the Arabica coffee bean and the magic that it does around the world, her tagline is "Coffee with a Conscience". With her non-profit experience she wanted it to do good, but realized she did not want it to be a 501(c)(3); this way she has full flexibility to help wherever help is needed, without the red tape.

While with the NGO (non-government organization), she helped set up clinics in Africa, South America and India, meeting clients and their families along the way. After a while their stories began to have the same common thread: once clients' health improved and they were living longer, due to the autoimmune boosting drugs they received, they needed to get back to work.

Most of the clinics she helped establish were in the tropics, near the equator, where most coffee is grown. A coffee drinker since she was 6 (it was the only thing that soothed her tonsillitis), she had been interested in the different types and flavors of coffee she found in her travels, and began thinking about the connections that could be made for the patients to help them. Her goal became to establish "social entrepreneurism" to give an economic boost to these working poor. As Jackie put it, she "provides and exquisite bag of coffee and puts the money into the non-profit work" she chooses.

She learned from the farmers that one coffee tree, which takes 4-6 years to mature, produces just two pounds of coffee per year. In order to keep their farms sustainable; farmers had to sell all their produce. That's why although they grew the more desirable Arabica beans, they only drank Robusta beans, and instant, at that. Jackie realized the opportunities these farmers and their families could develop if they only had access to the right resources.

In Uganda Jackie saw first-hand the kind of service Rotary provides to help communities. The local Rotary club helped her with the AIDS clinic there. In Honduras a local club raised money to buy two vehicles for the clinic. These experiences gave her ideas and some contacts for developing her company in a way that it could also do good in the world.

Seeing the devastating poverty in the communities where she set up clinics was an eye opening experience for Jackie. She witnessed women in these communities, particularly widows, pushed to the far edges of society, and wanted to give them hope. Starting with providing two looms to two widows (and later a teacher so they could know how to use them), Jackie set about making a difference in the lives of those living in extreme poverty. The women were provided the raw materials by Touch of Hope Foundation with which she has a relationship. The Foundation also paid the women for their labor at the same rate paid to commercial weavers in that area. They are now producing waistcoats, which are being sold through the Foundation.

Since its inception in 2010, ArabicaDabra Coffee Co., LLC has devoted a portion of its net proceeds to farming families, widows and others who need a little help from the outside world to improve their lives. Many live in desolate areas of India and Africa, places where traditional NGOs do not venture. Through her contacts in those regions, Jackie tries to fill the economic gap with the purchase of looms, pigs, goats and bicycles.

A significant percentage of her proceeds to date have gone to help families in the Indian State of Manipur, where Jackie says she witnessed the most severe poverty she had ever seen. "They have nothing. I didn't have to look any further than that." Her purchases there include:

Two pigs, one each for two women, who have successfully reared them. Both pigs have had litters of piglets. Each woman has kept one piglet and sold the others, allowing them to support themselves and greatly improving their self-confidence and status in the community.

Through Touch of Hope, a bicycle for a man who previously walked from village to village educating people about the causes of HIV. The bicycle has saved the man, who also works full-time job at a local church, hours in travel time, allowing him to now reach 4-5 villages a day.

We then learned a little history – and some fascinating factoids. Jackie told us how coffee had first come to the attention of humans, in approximately 800 C.E. when goat herders in Ethiopia (the only place it's indigenous) noticed their goats jumping around with lots of energy after eating the berries on a coffee tree. Hard to believe, but here's the photo she showed us of goats (I count 8) in the branches of coffee tree, eating the berries. Who knew they were that nimble?



Coffee today is the second most traded commodity in the world, second only to oil And it is gaining in popularity, particularly in Asia. There are over 100,000 coffee houses in Japan alone. If you have a choice, opt for the Arabica bean, which is 70% of coffee on the market; the Robusta bean has more caffeine and is the usual culprit if you find coffee makes you jittery or upsets your stomach.

Did you know coffee is really a type of cherry? The pit is the "bean". In most cases the fruit is processed off and used for compost – it is quite sour. There are different ways of processing the fruit and beans depending on the locale where they are grown – some need more drying time, others longer roasting.

In some ways coffee is like wine – people hold coffee tastings the way they hold wine tasting events; the flavor and finish of beans grown in each area is distinct, and each has its aficionados. The Arabica coffee beans used in ArabicaDabra Coffee come from all corners of the world, from Ethiopia, Tanzania and Sumatra to Brazil, Costa Rica, Guatemala and India. Clients can choose among several exotic varieties: Sumatra (regular and decaf), Costa Rican, Tanzania Peaberry, Ethiopian Yirgacheffe, Brazil Decaf, Afro Asian Fusion, Guatemalan and Monsoon Malabar, which can be purchased separately or through the "Magic Club", which delivers a pound of coffee to clients' doorsteps every month.

Jackie is writing a book on the various uses for coffee,

and shared a number of tips with us, such as using coffee grounds to hide scratches on furniture, or to feed rose bushes, or as a paste to get rid of cellulite (recently highlighted on the internet). Recipes using coffee as a flavor enhancer can be found on her website. Use grounds outside the house to repel ants and to charge up your compost heap.

In the UK they have actually developed a car engine that uses grounds for fuel! So far the car can go up to 65 mph; they're working to make it 85. And she showed us some rather nice furniture, platters and bowls made from coffee resin. It is even a good bath for your dog, repelling fleas and de-odorizing in the event of a skunk attack.

ArabicaDabra coffee hit the shelves of Whole Foods Markets in Tarzana in 2011. Jackie sought out this affiliation because the organic food chain has an ethos similar to her own. Since the first store took it on, she has gotten on the shelves in other Whole Foods Markets in the area, including Woodland Hills, Venice, Westwood and Sherman Oaks. In the store 12 ounces sells for \$14.99, but you can buy a full pound from Jackie directly or from her website for \$14.

Selling premium coffee from farmers who are given a fair share of the profits was only part of the dream. Jackie wants her customers to understand that their purchase of her coffee beans means that they, too, are giving back. To reinforce this message, she refers to her customers as "coffee patrons". ArabicaDabra is also committed to supporting other like-minded companies that want to help change the world. Jackie encourages people to "be the change" by buying local, buying from small businesses and supporting businesses who care about the world we live in.

Jackie doesn't limit her work to foreign countries – she leaves next week to help set up clinics in Rockaway, NY, to serve 4-5,000 undocumented victims of Hurricane Sandy who have no health care.
