Leadership Awards 6th – 8th Grades

Both the junior high student leadership awards and mini-grants to middle school teachers will be presented this afternoon, March 21. Grants for teachers are to encourage creativity in teaching, while including aviation and community service in their curricula. They are especially appreciated in this era of budget cuts and large classes. Jan Goforth gave us the list of winners: Among the teachers, LaRue Fernandez at Frost will receive a \$200 third prize, Janice Wald at Nobel will get \$300 for second prize, and the first prize of \$500 goes to Aphrodite Antoniou at Frost.

Students will be recognized for excellence in several areas. A \$100 prize for excellence in academics will go to Citlalli Castillo at Madison Middle School; the prize for athletics will be split, with \$50 each for Brian Piche at Avlley Alternative Magnet and Nancy Alanis at Vista Middle School; the \$100 arts award will go to Justine Yap at Vista, and the Community Service/Leadership award will be split, with \$50 each going to Nayellie Barragan-Mejia at Madison and Inkiad Ahmed at Frost.

Jim Tenner pointed out that these awards and grants are in keeping with the club's tradition of honoring and recognizing those who might be overlooked, but should be told "You're doing well! Thanks! You deserve this, and keep up the good work."

Foundation

Very special thanks to Don Reinkin, for keeping his promise and donating \$100 to PolioPlus as part of the drive we are tying into the track meet. Don encouraged all of us to follow suit – in any amount. PDG Les also encouraged each of us when he accepted the check, and reminded us any contributions to be counted for this year for either PolioPlus or the Annual Fund need to be in to him before June 15 – that's when he leaves for Lisbon. So far we have contributed \$3,700.

Speaker – Kevin Luperchio and Rebecca Lienhard, Tierra Del Sol

A career counselor at Tierra Del Sol for 6 years, Kevin introduced honorees Alejandra Hernandez and Marius Endeward. Alejandra had worked at two different retailers before losing her job, but after two years of looking with Kevin just got a new position at Vons yesterday that starts Saturday. Marius is interning at the Van Nuys courthouse, but he's still looking for a permanent job.

Rebecca Lienhard showed us a short video about the families Tierra del Sol helps with its programs, and then told us about their history, current efforts and plans for the future. She explained that Tierra del Sol was started 42 years ago by 8 families with children who had disabilities, and who did not want to follow the prevailing pattern of putting them in an institution. They bought – and the Van Nuys Rotary club helped convert – a convent in Sunland,

which is still the main campus. The idea was to keep the kids at home and give them places they could feel safe, isolated from the dangers of and lack of understanding in "normal" society. Over time, and with legal challenges for school and other services, the climate changed and those with disabilities stated to be "mainstreamed", making it easier for the Tierra del Sol clients to widen their scope of opportunities.

As Rebecca observed, Tierra del Sol families had always felt those with disabilities had a right to a full, productive and integrated life. "Rather than worry about what people *can't* do, we focus on what they *can*", and help develop those skills into job skills. Their clients "may have a disability, but everyone also has abilities." They help them love what they do, and do what they love. In some cases groups of clients work for some of the many companies who have found hiring these dedicated and conscientious workers to be good business.

Besides developing job skills, Tierra del Sol teaches how to navigate the public transit system, handle money and do their own banking. In the last year or so they have added Nexus, a post-secondary education program at Pierce, Valley and Mission Colleges. That led to their adding another 150 families in the last 6 years, so that over 600 are helped by Tierra del Sol. After getting their AA degree, students get job internships.

Other classes, offered at their own sites, include computer programs and art development. Over 50 of their artists display their art at galleries in Claremont, the Sunland location and around the world. They have had exhibitions in Japan, Germany and elsewhere that have been so well received the artists actually support themselves with their sales. They are seen as artists who happen to have disabilities, rather than disabled people who make art. For all of us, focusing on our own and others' abilities, rather than disabilities, makes us a stronger community.

Autism may be much more widespread than previously believed, or we may be seeing a major increase in numbers – 1 in 88 children have been diagnosed with autism spectrum disorder, with LAUSD seeing possibly 1 in 50. Thanks to California's entitlement program, we are the only state to guarantee education and services to the disabled, so these children will be taught, but State money has been reduced (\$300,000/year for the last three years), and doesn't cover as much as it used to, forcing them to do more fundraising.

What can we do to help? Hire and help find jobs for Tierra del Sol graduates! They can do so much more than most people think. But also help them refurbish and update the campus. Rebecca pointed out the Van Nuys club had put the roof on the Sunland campus and painted Terra West. She hopes we'll again become more active helping on site.
