District Governor's Message

Greetings! - During August, we focus on membership. The more we grow, the more we do! In July, we welcomed new members in Mill Creek, SeaTac/Tukwila and Seattle 4. To all of the clubs in our district, keep up the great work!

Rotary has stabilized at 1.2 million members for over 17 years. Rotary International (RI) President Shekhar Mehta has a vision of 1.3 million members by June 30, 2022. A simple vision: Each One, Bring One, inviting every Rotarian and Rotaractor to introduce a new person into their club. Our district adds: "Each One, Keep One," focusing on Membership Retention.

Each Rotarian and Rotaractor should ask themselves: 1. When did you join Rotary? 2. When did you become a Rotarian? 3. What brings you back to the Rotary meeting after meeting? During your club meetings, have members share these questions and answers. I am sure that you will hear individual member's insights that you were not aware of before. It will bring you even closer together.

Our district theme for the upcoming District Conference and throughout the year is "Ignite YOUR passion with Action"! What is YOUR passion? Which one or more of the 7 areas of focus resonates the most with you?

Many Rotarians have been members of their clubs for years and have built great friendships with their fellow club members. Sometimes, clubs have specific missions; however, the club's mission may not precisely fulfill the member's passion. Our district is asking that we "break down the silos" of our clubs so members can learn of other clubs that might focus on their passion by participating in service projects related to their passion while keeping their membership in their home club. "Breaking down the silos" is also an excellent tool for clubs to collaborate with like-minded projects, giving even more significant impact to the community and the world.

fellow members. I consider each Rotarian in our district as family. When I think of family, the first thing that comes to mind is getting together for Thanksgiving. If you invite family members to Thanksgiving dinner and a member of your family does not show up, you would contact them by calling, texting, or even going to their home. Yet, when fellow Rotarians, who in many clubs meet week after week, may not show up for a meeting or two, do we contact them? Do we let that fellow member know that we missed them at the meeting and that we are concerned about their well-being? That gesture will make a lasting impression. I suggest we create a buddy system, whereby members get matched up, two by two, to keep track of each other. It will grow our bonds even greater.

Finally, let's not forget the creation of New Clubs. It's a perfect way to bring at least 20 or more new members to our district all at one time. Our district was proud to welcome the Environmental Rotary Club of Puget Sound and the Southeast Seattle Rotary Club in June.

Coming soon, we will be welcoming two more new clubs, the [Rotary Club of the Pacific Northwest Ending Sex Trafficking](#) and the [Rotary Club of North Creek](#).

Here are things you can do when considering forming new clubs: • Map out existing Rotary clubs and other service clubs • List district demographics (key areas, cities, towns, age, specific causes, mobility, etc.) • Identify communities for Rotary development • Report to the district governor and other leaders.

As I travel around the district to meet all the clubs, I look forward to meeting every one of you. I hope to see you in Coeur d'Alene on October 1-3, 2021, at our first District Conference in 2 ½ years. 


He will be declared the president-nominee on 1 October if no challenging candidates have been suggested.

Jesse Salk MD PhD

Chief Executive Officer, Chief Scientific Officer, Board Member

Dr. Salk is a molecular biologist, clinical oncologist, and a cofounder of TwinStrand. He invented and developed TwinStrand's core Duplex Sequencing Technology with colleagues at the University of Washington. Jesse has authored more than two-dozen peer-reviewed publications in cancer biology and genomics, and has more than 50 issued and pending patents. In addition to his executive and scientific leadership role at TwinStrand, Jesse is an Affiliate Clinical Faculty member at the University of Washington and Fred Hutchinson Cancer Research Center and sees cancer patients part time at the VA Puget Sound in Seattle. He is Board Certified in Medical Oncology and Internal Medicine. Jesse is a volunteer teacher in science and medicine for students from middle school through post-doctoral levels. He holds an MD/PhD with honors from the University of Washington and a BS in Biology *Summa Cum Laude* from Brandeis University.



On March 26, 1953, American medical researcher [Dr. Jonas Salk](#) announces on a national radio show that he has successfully tested a vaccine against poliomyelitis, the virus that causes the crippling disease of polio. In 1952—an epidemic year for polio—there were 58,000 new cases reported in the United States, and more than 3,000 died from the disease. For promising eventually to eradicate the disease, which is known as “infant paralysis” because it mainly affects children, Dr. Salk was celebrated as the great doctor-benefactor of his time.



4th Annual JPMGC Charity Classic benefitting Harvest Against Hunger, Co-sponsored with Seattle Northeast Rotary

July 27, 2021 Tourney Recap - What a Tremendous response from Jackson Park Men's Golf Club, Seattle Northeast Rotary, and the community to raise \$12,100 for Harvest Against Hunger with the charity golf tournament!

The annual tourney has grown impressively:

- 2018 - 26 Golfers - \$ 2,500 Raised
- 2019 - 42 Golfers - \$ 3,200 Raised
- 2020 - 99 Golfers - \$ 11,000 Raised
- 2021 - 105 Golfers - \$ 12,100 Raised

Tee Times All Day: The 26 teams of golfers teed off at times of their choosing, from 8:30 AM to 3:00 PM. 2/3 of the foursomes played in the morning, while 1/3 played in the afternoon.

Headquarters outdoors in the Tent: We missed the social side of the tournament last year but were able to have a modest 19th Hole in the Tent this year. Results were announced the next day, except for those who accessed the Golf Genius mobile scoring leaderboard, with real-time scoring. Jar Raffle results were announced on Wednesday as well, with winners needing to go back to Jackson Park GC to pick up their items.

Support from Jackson Park Golf Course: Wonderful help from Tony, Matt, Anthony and the entire staff. We were allowed to keep maximum tee times open for our tournament right through to the day of the event, so we were able to accommodate every golfer that wanted to play. Anything that we needed on the day of the tourney was cheerfully provided for us. They played in the tourney, too!

Support from Jackson Park Men's Golf Club: Growing each year, as members have learned more about the cost-efficient non-profit, **Harvest Against Hunger** and its' mission. The need for fresh food for our food banks has been elevated since the start of the pandemic, and JPMGC members have elevated their participation and generosity each year. Sponsors, donors, organization, scoring and volunteers. Over 60% of the field were JPMGC members and friends.

Support from Seattle Northeast Rotary Club and local Rotary clubs: Harvest Against Hunger is a program of Rotary District 5030, encompassing 45 Rotary clubs in the greater Seattle area. Many clubs provided teams of golfers. Seattle Northeast Rotary has provided continuous support for Harvest Against Hunger since HAH began in 1982. Its' members provided leadership, sponsors, donations, golfers and volunteers.

THANK YOU! A fantastic team effort with Jackson Park staff, Jackson Park Men's Golf Club leadership and members and Seattle Northeast Rotary members all working together towards a common goal of helping our needy neighbors.

The net proceeds, thanks to the efficient four-person staff at Harvest Against Hunger, will provide approximately **360,000 pounds of fresh fruit and vegetables for distribution at local food banks and meal programs! 180 tons! Nine full 40' truck trailers full of produce! Thank You! Well done!**



Lake Forest Park Rotary gets Global Grant approval at 11th Hour

When someone says that a decision was done in the 11th hour, our Club can relate. The final financial documents for our Global Grant were submitted to RI with 38 minutes to spare. But that is the happy ending to a very, very long 11 ½ month saga.

Almost a year ago our Club, in partnership with our District 5030 and many member clubs, applied for our first ever Global Grant.

The previous year we had worked with District 5030's International Service Committee and several other local clubs to get a \$12K District grant (\$24K total with the club contributions) for PeaceTrees Vietnam (PTVN). These funds built a two-room school in Cua in the remote foothills of Vietnam's Quang Tri Province.

With the sage advice from our District 5030, we sent in that Global Grant and began working with RI's Southeast Asia team. Because Vietnam didn't have any Rotary Clubs (altho' they have one as of this writing), we needed an international partner.

Through Rotary networking we connected with one of Canada's largest clubs, the Rotary Club of Downtown Calgary. What a bit of luck that was as they have processed tens of millions in global grants. We also heard from South Bangkok with their support.

The application process was flowing well until RI made staffing changes. Our new contact informed us that the grant text did not meet the criteria and would need to be rewritten. After many versions written by our Club's ISC co-chair (and now Club President), Ed Sterner, and the staff at PeaceTrees Vietnam, we got the "thumbs up" from RI.

Because we'd met the June 30, 2021, deadline for the original global grant application, we were eligible for the RI and District funding at the higher levels. That means the \$26k of club level contributions generated a total Global Grant of \$89K. Wow and thank you to our District, our partner clubs and RI.

These funds will be used to provide additional training to demining teams and expand Explosive Ordnance Risk Education to children and teachers living in Quang Binh Province. It is a sobering statistic that several hundred thousand pounds were dropped in the provinces near the DMZ 50 years ago. Hundreds are discovered by the demining teams every month which opens up safe land for cultivation and habitation.

Our hats are off to our District 5030 ISC, our 5030 partner clubs, to Calgary and Bangkok, and to RI – it was a great learning experience, and we now have 1 global grant under our belts.

PeaceTrees employs 150 deminers who clear land of dangerous unexploded ordnance (UXO) each day. The picture shows a team is using a large-loop metal detector to locate UXO's which are either detonated in place or removed for detonation. Local residents can report sightings of UXO's directly to PTVN teams so that they are immediately prioritized for removal. PTVN has been working in Quang Tri Province for 25 years and now have

expanded into Quang Binh Province under agreement with the Provincial government.

The children pictured are the first class of the Cua kindergarten that was funded by our Club's District 5030 Grant 20-21. These children are mostly ethnic minorities whose families face generational poverty as a result of war-legacy. They usually do not speak Vietnamese which is required to enroll in 1st grade. So these kindergartens built by PTVN teach Vietnamese and provide daily lunch – and that is done with \$50 USD per child for a YEAR.

PTVN has also built several libraries in other communities. The Women's Associations that run them offer "shelter" for abused women and children.

Below is the Danaan Parry Landmine Education Center. It houses the PTVN team and hosts many educational sessions. Founders of PTVN are Seattle #4 Rotarian Jerilyn Brusseau and her husband, Danaan Parry. After his death 25 years ago, she moved forward under unsurmountable odds with the US Government and the Provincial and National Governments of Vietnam. The organization is now a model world-wide for partnering between agencies and governments for the benefit of the people.

Pictured below is the January 2020 PTVN Citizen Ambassador Tour including Rotarians Jerilyn Brusseau, Matt Albertson (both Seattle Rotary), Ed Sterner and Larry French (both Lake Forest Park Rotary).

A Citizen Ambassador's Tour to Vietnam is being organized for 2022 pending the World's health. It will be about 14 days and explore into the remote hillsides of Vietnam to meet the people and dedicate the Cua School, and will include major historical sites and cultural visits. Having traveled a great deal myself, the 2020 tour was the most moving and important trip of my lifetime. Details will be available later this year.
