


On April, 4 Seattle #4 Rotary is hosting a private viewing of the movie SOLD. This

# Polio Update by Steve Crane Bill and Melinda Gates Inspired by Rotary's Polio Persistence



Bill and Melinda Gates included the following in their Annual Letter this year:

*Melinda*: We're inspired by the infinite persistence of Rotary International. They were leading this fight (against polio) long before we joined it, and they've just kept moving forward. They know that going from 350,000 cases to 37 (in 2016) is amazing, but success is zero.

Bill: It's thrilling to be nearing the day when no children will be crippled by polio. But we're often asked why we're making such a big effort on polio if our priority is to save lives. The answer is, ending polio will save lives—through the magic of zero. When polio is eradicated, the world can dedicate polio funds to improving child health, and the lessons from polio will lead to better immunization systems for other diseases.

*Melinda:* And the world will benefit from the electrifying effect of ending a disease. The surge of optimism will draw energy and brains and dollars into global health, and that will intensify the fight against measles, malaria, TB, and AIDS.

There are three new cases of polio reported so far this year.

## Join a Rotarian Action Group

A Rotarian Action Group is an autonomous group of Rotarians, family members, program participants and alumni who are experts in a particular field, such as microcredit or water and sanitation. Group members share their expertise by collaborating with clubs and districts on service projects. For example:

- The Rotarian Action Group for Population Growth & Sustainable Development partnered with Rotary clubs in Germany, Austria, and Nigeria to reduce maternal death by 50 percent at 10 hospitals in northern Nigeria with a program to prevent and treat obstetric fistula, a serious birth injury.
- Rotarians for Family Health & AIDS Prevention and Rotary club members from Nigeria, Kenya, and Uganda sponsored a three-day event to provide HIV testing and counseling for more than 138,000 people.

24 high school students will be our ambassadors to the world when they leave for their Short or Long Term exchanges in July and August. March 4 is the first of 3 orientations and social events that the students and their parents will attend. The first orientation is mandatory as they get into the details of having a successful experience in another country, a new language and a new culture. Former exchange students and their parents will relate their personal experiences including the good and the

tough times and how they got through it. At the end of the day, the alumni bring the message that Youth Exchange was a life-changing event for them. Their parents all say that their child returned home more mature, more focused and more open to other people and cultures.

## **RYLA & INTERACT**

As the RYLA NW team gears up for the 48th session on March 16-19th, here are some tips on after-action for your sponsored RYLA Participants. By the conclusion of RYLA on Sunday, your students will have undergone a transformative experience. They will have a strong bond with the other students they meet. They will have gained perspective, broadened their mindset, and set goals for themselves and what they want to see happen in their community. They will also have a greater appreciation for the role of Rotary and the variety of programs and opportunity for service. What can you, as a Rotarian and a sponsoring club, do to tap into this energy, enthusiasm and interest?

- 1) Find a time to invite your RYLA participant to speak at your club about their experience. Be prepared to ask them questions about their ideas and goals. If they come back with ideas for service projects, see if your club is in position to support and help.
- 2) Be active advocates for your Interact Club. Interact members who attend RYLA may catch the bug and will want to recruit more students to join. Make sure the Interact club is ready to take on more members.
- 3) If you're driving your RYLA participant home or when you interact with them, please don't dampen their enthusiasm by pointing out flaws or pouring water on their new found ideals. Remember, you may have experienced and observed everything they have previous in your life, but for them, they are discovering the joy of service for the first time. Cultivate this and your club will enjoy the rewards.

## Scholarships Available for MS Degree in the Netherlands - Water & Sanitation

Dear district governors, district Rotary Foundation committee chairs, district scholarships subcommittee chairs, and district grants subcommittee chairs:

The Rotary Foundation and UNESCO-IHE Institute for Water Education are working together to tackle the world's water and sanitation crisis and are offering up to 10 scholarships for graduate study at UNESCO-IHE's Delft campus in the Netherlands. The partnership aims to increase the number of trained professionals who can devise, plan, and implement water and sanitation solutions in developing areas. The scholarships also are designed to promote long-term productive relationships between Rotarians and skilled water and sanitation professionals in their communities.

Scholars will receive a Master of Science degree in urban water and sanitation, water management, or water science and engineering. Graduates work with their Rotary club sponsors on a related project to benefit their local community. The application deadline is 15 June.
