Polio Cases Persist in Afghanistan and Pakistan



New cases have been reported in Afghanistan and Pakistan, bringing the global total to 8 compared with 5 at this time last year. Afghanistan will launch another NID across the country in a few days to reach over 9.6 million children. Pakistan is planning a concurrent campaign to reach 20.9 million children.




ALL Rotarians Mark Your Calendars for May 17th. This is a FUN EVENT!

How The Rotary Club of Lake Forest Park Partnered to Ship A Full Container of Protective Gear to Fire Fighters in Peru

It all started with long-time Rotarian Leigh Readdy, Chair of Disaster Relief for Rotary District 5030, Vice Chair of Disaster Network of Assistance RAG (Rotarian Action Group) and member of the International Service Committee of the Rotary Club of Lake Forest Park.

Readdy and the Rotary Club of Lake Forest Park have had an ongoing relationship with the Consulate General Ad Honorem of Peru in Seattle located in Lake Forest Park. Last year, Readdy had the opportunity to meet with the head of volunteer fire fighters in Peru who explained to Readdy that most fire fighters in Peru do not have the protective gear and equipment needed for fighting fires. In fact, fire fighters around the world are generally volunteers, and work with minimal or no protection.

Readdy brought the problem to a weekly Rotary meeting and suggested this might be a project for the club.

Coincidentally, Rick Verlinda, a new club member who had recently retired as a fire fighter and Battalion Chief from the Seattle Fire Department, could offer a solution.

Verlinda reported that fire fighters' protective gear in the United States must be retired and replaced every ten years, even if it hasn't been used. He also knew that the Seattle Fire Department currently had 400 sets of retired gear and other equipment in warehouse storage.

Claire Conway, current President of the Rotary Club of Lake Forest Park, contacted Consul General, Miguel Angel Velasquez. Consul General Velasquez was stunned by the large amount of gear available, agreed it was badly needed in Peru and offered to look into the shipment of the donation.

Verlinda obtained formal permission to remove the gear from the Seattle Fire Department warehouse. He then contacted the Washington State Council of Fire Fighters, who agreed to provide and pay for temporary storage and collect more gear and equipment from fire departments in Washington State and Oregon. Consul General Velasquez connected with Forbes Logistic Corporation to provide the shipping container and the transportation. Forbis Logistics Corporation offered a discount on the transportation cost and the Rotary Club of Lake Forest Park offered to pay for the transportation cost.

At the end of March, after months of coordination, collection and storage of the gear and equipment, arranging for the shipping container and preparing logistics of distribution to rural areas in Peru, members of The Rotary Club of Lake Forest Park, the Washington State Council of Fire Fighters, and Consul General Velasquez packed the container full. Consul General Velasquez noted that this shipment is the largest donation of fire fighter gear and equipment transported to Peru and estimates that the value, if new in Peru, would be a minimum of \$750,000.

The Washington State Council of Fire Fighters plans to continue to collect and store retired gear and equipment from fire departments throughout Washington State and Oregon. The Rotary Club of Lake Forest Park plans to continue to partner with them to arrange shipment to firefighters around the world where there is an ongoing need. As President Conway says, "This demonstrates that a small club can network and make the partnerships to pull off a huge project that can impact a country in a big way."

Jim Hathaway 1930 - 2018

We are deeply saddened by the sudden loss of our dear Rotarian, Past District Governor Jim Hathaway, husband of Carolyn Hathaway, on April 30, 2018.

A kind, compassionate and gentle man, he truly lived the Rotary motto of Service Above Self. Many of us have special memories of Jim.

Jim was District Governor (1988-89), University District Rotary Club President (1990-91) and member of that club since 1980. Jim and Carolyn are members of the Arch Klumph Society of The Rotary Foundation. They were able to be at the District Governor's dinner Thursday evening to kick off the District Conference.

He graduated from WSU in 1952 with a BA in Speech and a commission as a second lieutenant in the U.S. Air Force. He served on active duty for two years, was later recalled in the Pueblo crisis, then subsequently served as a reservist. He retired in 1982 as a colonel.

Help Deliver Hygiene Kits & Peace Pole to YouthCare

Saturday, May 12, 2018 | 9:00AM - 10:30AM

On May 12 at 9am, we will be delivering several hundred hygiene kits to YouthCare near U Village. The contents of these kits were sourced by Rotaractors and Interactors throughout the greater Seattle Area and assembled at the District Conference in Tulalip.

This same morning, we will also be installing a Peace Pole. A Peace Pole is a hand-crafted monument that displays the message May Peace Prevail on Earth. The Peace Pole we are installing is 8' tall and features the eight different languages most common in the youth who reside at the Home of Hope: English, Spanish, Somali, Vietnamese, Chinese, Amharic, Russian, and Tigrinyan.

The Peace Pole will be installed inside the building and seen by passerby's. You will get the opportunity to scoop a shovel of dirt to the foundation and make a wish for the residents of YouthCare, "May Peace Prevail on Earth!"

What a fabulous opportunity at this year's District Conference for our Interactors, Rotaractors, and Youth Exchange students to connect with each other and other Rotarians and learn more about the great work Rotary does. This year we had 20 Interact members, 32 Rotaract members and 8 youth

exchange members attend. Saturday was our youth day with Rotaract plenary speakers and several breakouts featuring Interact, Rotaract and Youth Exchange speakers.



Eight Interact Clubs at the Conference

Our excellent plenary speakers included Jordan Harrison, Harvard University student and former Director of Reality Changers, Brittany Arthur, Immediate Past President of the Rotaract Club Berlin and a board member of the Rotary International Joint Committee for Young Leaders and Alumni Engagement, and Bobby Marsh, co-founder of Big West Rotaract.

A panel of Interact, Rotaract & Rotary speakers explored the steps for achieving success with this year's conference theme, *Open New Doors to Rotary*.

Interact, RYLA & Youth Exchange speakers shared how their experiences enrich their lives and build lasting relationships with Rotary at *Engaging our Future Rotary Leaders*.

Rotaract Presidents shared their club highlights and organized a service event to pack hygiene kits for hurricane relief aid in Puerto Rico and for U.S. sex trafficking victims.

There was a special reception for Interact & Youth Exchange, where they met students from other schools, heard about International Rotary Youth Exchange opportunities, and how to connect with a Rotaract club after high school.

Most will keep in contact with their host family. Their world and their lives have expanded.
