# Common Threads Project



## **Grant News**

It's truly remarkable the work Rotary 4 accomplishes through the dedicated members. I had the pleasure of learning about Common Threads Project (<a href="www.commonthreadsproject.org">www.commonthreadsproject.org</a>) through fellow Rotarian, Maureen Brotherton, and Dr. Rachel Cohen, the founder of CTP. Rotary 4's International Service Committee's long-time member, Maureen Brotherton is the Seattle Rotary advocate for Common Threads Project, a nonprofit that helps women heal from traumatic experiences. "Rotary 4's Peacebuilders and District 5030 funded the Common Threads Project to help female refugees who live in the Pacific Northwest. The project is a collaboration between Common Threads and several community organizations in the Greater Seattle area. "The project will provide a unique and effective long term recovery program for women who have experienced gender-based

violence in the context of war, displacement and resettlement as refugees," said Maureen Brotherton. Common Threads Project is a nonprofit based in New York working with local organizations on behalf of survivors of sexual and gender-based violence. Successful projects have been established in Ecuador, Nepal, Bosnia & Herzegovina, as well as the Democratic Republic of Congo.

Inspired by ancient cultural practices and validated by current neuroscientific understandings of trauma, Common Threads Project has developed a unique and effective group recovery program that engages women in sewing circles that feel safe and familiar. The healing circles promote survivors' strengths and resilience, replacing shame and helplessness with dignity and agency, rather than simply treating symptoms, stated Dr. Cohen. CTP trains local facilitator-therapists so that they can train others in their communities to carry the healing work forward.

In a safe and supportive environment, women create story cloths to depict experiences that may be impossible to express in words. This becomes an entry point for a multi-dimensional therapeutic process. Common Threads Project builds local capacity through training and mentoring, successful interventions, and rigorous research. Thank you to Rotarians of Seattle 4 whose support helped bring the Common Threads Project to the Northwest which will help refugee and immigrant women heal from trauma, one stitch at a time.

Anything else you would like to share? The cover of The Rotary magazine this month will celebrate RI's first ever Program of Scale: a \$2 million grant to "Partners for a

Malaria-Free Zambia." With an additional \$4 million from World Vision and the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, the program will train 2,500 community health workers in Zambia to diagnose, test, and treat malaria in their communities. The program will "scale up" the significant work that our club and Rotarian Malaria Partners have done in the Copperbelt Province in Zambia. RMP was the inspiration of Nancy Osborne when she served as Seattle 4's president in 2009 when our club turned 100. RMP is now Malaria Partners International, Nancy is still one of the leaders in the fight against malaria, and all committee members can be justifiably proud of the role that Seattle 4 has played leading to RI's first ever Program of Scale.

## **Grant Reviews For FY2021 - FY2022**

A big thank you to the ISC Grant Review Sub-committee for reviewing and evaluating a whopping 16 projects which were submitted to SRSF at the end of March. Here is a recap of the projects:

#### Oakland 3 Saving Mothers and Babies - Guatemala

Disease prevention and treatment & Maternal and child health

The project aims to equip our community hospital with an infant warming table for the operating room and our hospital and community health outposts with hand-held portable ultrasounds to identify women with high-risk pregnancies throughout Sololá.

#### **Mwanzo**

Basic education and literacy

We propose, with your generous assistance, to purchase 13 computers and 4 projectors for MWCEA's teachers, staff, and students, and install wireless internet in the school building. Ten of these computers will be desktops, for primary use in classrooms, and three will be laptops, for primary use in program operations.

#### **Young Professional Exchange**

Leadership Development, Youth Service and Rotaract

Develop an ongoing annual exchange of young professionals between Japan District 2660 and 2590 (Rotaract, and Rotary Clubs of Osaka and Yokohama) and Seattle area District 5030. Young Rotary

professionals from each country will visit each other spending time at local companies, discovering leadership style, decision-making philosophy, corporate culture, and foster future cooperation and goodwill.

#### Village Reach in Malawi

Individuals and families will receive health information, learn how to protect themselves from COVID-19 and be informed about when and how to seek medical care. In a country where there is low access to healthcare, and where health systems are already stretched thin, this relieves the burden on health workers and increases the likelihood that individuals will have consistent care. As the COVID-19 vaccine is rolled out in Malawi, CCPF will also be valuable for dispelling myths about the vaccine.

#### Senegal Project Phase 2

Water and Sanitation, Nutrition and Food Security, Economic and Community Development The aim of this project is to help the rural community of Mbossedji in Senegal achieve food security, improved nutrition and healthy lives using environmentally appropriate technologies and nature-based solutions under the UN Sustainable Development Goals framework.

## **Roll a Hippo Garden Projects**

Water and Sanitation, Economic and Community Development

Provide women with a survival garden kit that includes the tools, seedlings, fertilizers and mentorship required to create household vegetable gardens. These kits will help women create self-sufficiency and food security during, and long after the pandemic has passed through.

#### **India Pudiyador Cradle Health Program**

Child Health Care

The Cradle Health program is composed of a series of 8-10 workshops (three times annually) for young parents, expectant/new mothers, and their infants. These workshops are designed to educate women about personal health and hygiene, provide a safe space for discussion, offer guidance in nourishment, and empower them to make individual choices for themselves and their babies.

## **Positive Action for Haiti**

Supporting Haitian children in need: housing, food security, education, and opportunities to learn and promote gardening and environmental restoration

This project is for plumbing facilities and composting toilets in the two children's dormitories and classroom of the new building.

#### **PeaceTrees Vietnam**

Peace and Conflict Resolution

Enhance the capacity of individuals and communities in Quảng Binh province, to promote safe behaviors and avoid injuries and death from unexploded ordnances.

#### **Limbe Hospital Water Project in Cameroon**

Clean Water Availability

To provide safe drinking water, and improve sanitation and hygiene, for patients of the Regional Hospital of Limbe in the southwest region of Cameroon, West Africa.

## **Guatemalan Literacy Project (GLP)**

Basic Education and Literacy

The GLP Global Grant consists of 4 parts: (1) providing literacy training to teachers and quality children's literature; (2) implementing literacy-strengthening textbook projects; (3) strengthening technological education through computer centers in middle schools; and (4) a youth development program that keeps students in school.

#### Sierra Leone Malaria

Disease Prevention and Treatment/Water and Sanitation

The project introduces a community-led malaria control program to reduce the incidence and severity of malaria. It's designed as a pilot, involving 21 subsistence agriculture villages and 2200 people living on \$1 a day. It will later be expanded to all 208 Bumpeh Chiefdom villages. It's intended to also serve as a model for the Sierra Leone government and NGO's in implementing malaria control programs in rural areas.

#### **Gambia Bridge to Success, Edmonds Rotary**

Literacy

MRC Holland Foundation will build a three (3) classroom science lab on the grounds of Kaur Senior Secondary School in the village of Kaur Wharf Town. This lab will also have teacher housing (crucial for recruiting quality teachers in the rural areas) as well as ample and safe storage. In addition, MRC Holland Foundation will refurbish two classrooms at Niani Senior Secondary School in the village of Wassu, to provide Science Laboratory experience to 140 students directly, as well as 12 feeder schools.

#### **Imagine Scholar, South Africa**

Education; youth development; leadership development

Digital resources to unlock world-class learning opportunities. Equip each student in the rural Nkomazi region of South Africa with a device pack including a Kindle Fire and case, Micro SD card (for storing videos/books), and 1GB of cell data (internet access) per month. When students can access the internet, they can access information from leading experts, watch lectures from top universities, explore art and culture, and gain inspiration from inspiring young leaders enacting entrepreneurial impact projects around the world.

#### **Best Future- Nakivale Refugee Camp Uganda**

Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene

The project is for a borehole to be drilled that delivers 3000 liters per hour. A security structure will be built to contain a water filtration system, complete with a 5-gallon bottle sanitation station and bottle filling station. The 5-gallon bottles will be delivered to residents by local water carriers, the empties collected, sanitized, refilled, and redistributed.

#### **Gambia National Library System**

Literacy

This project seeks to provide a transformation from manual to electronic system in all aspects of records management. It is important that the book control system be computerized to generally improve efficiency; it will keep up to international standards, improve the ease and speed in record searching, book issuing and keeping, improve security, and reduce manual work in report

preparation and data management.
