Establishing those roots, however, led Stacie to her passion. Single and happily sharing her home with cats Carter and Harley, she considered adopting a child, particularly one of the many older children who have only known foster families. At her first adoption fair, she was struck by the number of older children who clearly would not find parents that day. One teenaged girl appeared to have given up all hope. It broke Stacie's heart.

The experience moved her to action, including joining Rotary to meet and learn from like-minded people. Her goal is to facilitate safe, stable housing for children aging out of the foster care system. And she has her work cut out for her.

According to Stacie, there are nearly 10,000 children in the Washington State foster care system. Most experience three different home placements, typically losing six months of academic progress with each move. These loses mean that less than 50% of these children will graduate high school, and only 11% will move on to higher education. Many eventually flee to the streets, where they are highly susceptible to drugs, sex trafficking, and violence.

There is always more we can do, and it helps to have a strong advocate to keep us current and active. I know Stacie will soon feel she has found in Seattle #4 the right place to learn, work hard, and give back. Oh, and make lifelong friendships and have fun!

Speaking of fun, Stacie is all for it. She loves to try new things, explore new places, and entertain her friends. Don't be surprised if you're soon invited to travel the globe with her. And expect pickled vegetables around the holidays.
