ARTFUL INSPIRATION: A LOOK BACK AT THE PAST YEAR AND A LOOK FORWARD TO SEATTLE ART FAIR

Calling her second-to-last meeting in her Rotary year to order, **President Cathy Gibson** noted that the focus of the meeting was to "shine our Rotary spotlight" on the world of art and "artful inspiration." She noted that to celebrate the first anniversary of **Club Manager**, **Caroline Bobanick**, she asked Caroline—who has a fine arts background—to deliver the Inspiration of the Day.





Caroline started her invocation by showing a slide of "Peaceable Kingdom," the famous painting by Quaker painter, Edward Hicks. Little known fact: Caroline's own Quaker ancestors came to this country in the late 1600s with a "Utopian vision of nonviolence." They eventually settled in William Penn's woods—now Pennsylvania. Caroline urged Rotarians to let the Quaker "spirit of the divine help you find your own spark," and asked us to find "the place within you that inspires kindness and compassion for all of God's creatures."

Following **Caroline**, we welcomed back **Skip Roland**, who had been on leave to take care of his wife after a knee replacement. **Skip**, accompanied by **Marli Iverson**, led us in "The National Anthem." **David Woodward** then introduced visiting Rotarians; **Cindy Runger** next took the mic to **Charley**'s Table, to introduce us to prospective members.

Ben Wicks next called for volunteers to hang charms for an event a Pike Place Market. Following **Ben**, **Connie Miller** introduced us to **Annie Peters**, Executive Director of Pet Partners (formerly the Delta Society).

Thanks to **Diankha Linear**, for proposing **Annie** for membership. **Joe Phillips** then introduced **Kevin Medved**, CPA, a tax accountant at Peterson Sullivan, LLP. **Kevin** was sponsored by **Jerry Adams** and **Chris Russell**.

Jim also acknowledged this year's 50 Paul Harris Fellows, listing how many years each Fellow has had that honor.

Next up: **Program Chair Lisa Mayfield** acknowledged fellow Rotarians for their contributions over the past year. "For 48 weeks, our Club pulls together a gathering of 250+ members and

guests," she said. "This is no small task and truly takes a village. Today is our opportunity to thank everyone who has been involved in making our programs possible since last July 1."

throughout the region for the past decade.

Lisa then introduced the main program, an exclusive preview of **Seattle Art Fair** which will be held August 3-6 at CenturyLink. Founded by Paul Allen in 2015 and produced by Vulcan and Art Market Productions, this event is in its third year in Seattle.

Program co-presenters were Laura Fried and Kira Burge. Fried is the Artistic Director of Seattle Art Fair; Laura is a curator and writer living in Los Angeles. Prior to that, she was a curator at the Contemporary Art Museum St. Louis.

Kira Burge, the Senior Project Specialist at Vulcan, is a Pacific Northwest native who has produced art events and exhibitions

We learned that there are two parts to the event: The first is a commercial art fair, bringing together 80 galleries around the globe. The second is a series of "projects and talks" whose

purpose is to educate the community about the arts. The projects are "artist-driven," said Burge, noting that projects are interspersed throughout the community.

With artists and galleries from all over the world, the event is expected to draw a large crowd. There will be "an entry point for everyone," with small galleries featuring new artists, to big names for serious collectors.

As to advice for first-time Art Fair attendees? "Don't be shy," said Burge, who noted that while there is no overarching theme for the event, "themes always emerge" from the works. This year, she said, the unofficial theme is social activism. Children under 12 get in free, and there is a 20 percent discount for Rotarians.

After a brief question and answer period, **President Cathy** closed the meeting by thanking **Lisa** and acknowledging the work of Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation in keeping that work going.
