Wow, the Christmas holiday family event was a big success. We had so many kids in our room at the former Chou's Restaurant. The magician was doing his job well. I remember we had over 200 people there packed the dinner room.

Contrary to the happy time, it was sad to have to deal with the terminal sickness of our club president elect, Gary Ewing. My mission was to encourage him to get well to take over the club's leadership role. While I was doing that, I had to responsible for two

auctions in two years as club's president elect and club president. Gary came back later to assume the president's job before his pass two years later.

For the first time, I was representing Rotary Club of International District to attend Rotary International Convention in Taipei, Taiwan, along with over 35,000 Rotarians from all over the world. It was the beginning of my Rotary career that led me to become district governor of Rotary District 5030 in 2008-2009.

I do believe every Rotarian should assume leadership role as Rotary is a progressive organization, we need to change with time or we won't survive. New leaderships bring in new energy and ideas for growth and adaptation to our constant changing world.
