2009/2010 SIDR International Service Projects

Barbara's Kids Barb Gregg Vietnam \$2,000.00

The intent is to offer both short and long term assistance to the center and the children. This will include financial aid for basic needs such as rent, rice, clothing as well as assisting in purchase of wheelchairs.

Assistance will continue to meet medical needs for the disabled children as well as aid for educational needs.

Comido & Mcedo Scholarship Program Novelett Cotter Kenya \$2,625.00

This project is multi-year and the goal is to provide primary 1-8 education for children in the Kwan Jenga and Mathare Slums of Nairobi, by paying for tuition and uniform. It cost \$75 per child to attend school and that includes the one meal they have for the day. Children that do not attend school most often go without eating for days. Our goal for 2009-2010 is to sponsor 60 children @ \$75 per child for a total of \$4500. By helping to educate these children, we provide them with an opportunity to get a high school education and eventually be able to find a job to help support their families. We would continue to sponsor these children till they have completed the 8th grade at which time they take an exam and move on to high school.

Upgrading and Expanding Health Care Services in a Level I Health Care Clinic Win Mitchell Jamaica \$3,000.00

The purpose of this project is to purchase equipment and medical supplies for a Level II Health care clinic in the District of Harry Watch, Jamaica. This clinic is now operating as a Level I clinic. A Level I health clinic only provides health education services, family planning services, well-baby checks and education, prenatal visits and six-week postnatal mother-baby check-ups. A Level II clinic will provide much improved and expanded services. This district is a rural, hilly region that includes eighteen communities, with approximately 3,000-4,000 residents. Most of the 3,000-4,000 residents are self-employed peasant farmers with very low incomes. The ratio of males to females is about 1:1. The unemployment rate among females is at 47 percent; and among males,

unemployment is approximately 59 percent. Farming is the predominant employment activity of the area. While information on average income levels of individuals living within the Harry Watch and surrounding communities are not available, the World Health Organization reports that 25 percent of individuals in Jamaica earn less than \$2.00/hour. Access to primary health care for the residents in the eighteen communities is extremely limited.

Kalang Grinding Mill Ray Connell, Elinor Dofredo, Bob McKay Uganda \$1,000.00

Kalang, Koch Amar Parish in Amuru District Uganda, is an IDP (Internally Displaced Persons) returnee community. There are no infrastructures available. They are remote from any trading centers. One of the needs is the ability to process locally grown food commodities for community consumption. There is no grinding mill for flour production. The community has to travel at least four miles to the nearest mill. This will eliminate the long tedious travel that the women and young girls of the community have to make every other day

Hand & Burn Medical Trip to Vietnam for Children Heidi Behrens- Benedict Vietnam \$850.00

Hand and burn surgery medical trip for the children of My Tho, Vietnam, October 11 to 16, 2009. Approximately 60 to 70 operations and/or procedures will be performed on about 50 to 60 children. Following the medical trip, the Healing the Children medical team will continue communicating with the My Tho surgeons regarding outcomes, complications, and planning any needed future operations, for the patients.

Training on Organic Soap Making to Differently Able Persons of Sindhuli Districts of Nepal Judy Ginn Nepal \$1,000.00

In Nepal persons with disability are marginalized and have great difficulty finding gainful employment. This project will train 60 people with disabilities in making and marketing organic soap. The project will take place in the province of Shinduli, which is located some 150 miles Southeast of the capital city of Kathmandu. There will be at least two types of soap made, both with locally available resources. It is a sustainable industry.

Support for Aids Impacted Orphans in Eldoret, Kenya Kenya \$1,000.00

AIDS is responsible for leaving significant numbers of children across Kenya without one or both parents. After the loss of a parent children often continue to live in the care of a surviving parent or family member, taking on the added responsibility of housework, looking after their siblings and perhaps caring for the ill or dying in the family. Sadly, children who have lost one parent to AIDS are at higher risk of losing the other parent as well.

Because of the demand from the community, Chebagogo Group Home would like to reach out to more children. To do this Chebagogo proposes purchasing an additional 20 cows and 1,000 chickens. The milk and eggs would be sold at competitive prices to local wholesalers and retailers. Profit from the milk and eggs would sustain from 30 to 36 children who join the Group Home. Additional acreage would be acquired by Chebagogo Foundation to expand the Group Home, and to increase the live stock area as well as vegetable gardens. Rotary International funds would be used for the purchase of cows, chickens and for the infrastructure needed to maintain the additional animals. A water pump and tank would be added to deal with the increased demand on water supply

Retention

Most of the club's retention success should be attributed to the Club Leadership and one-on-one communications to members whose attendance dropped.

Diversity

We continue to recruit and attract people of great diversity in gender, age, ethnic origin and race. At June 30th, we had 32 men (60%) and 21 women (40%) in our club.

Growth

Our club added one new member during the Rotary year, but terminated 9 members by June 30th, thus ending the Rotary year with 53 members.
