With limited opportunities to be out in the local community that we serve, we found ourselves with the enormous challenge of adapting and reimagining the way the club operated. During the year, what started as a general wanting to get back to the way things were quickly shifted to moving towards where we knew we should be. We came to see that the challenge wasn't having to

divert from our old way of doing things. The challenge was adapting more quickly to a new way of doing things.

We leveraged our virtual speakers programs to continue engaging more with the community and pushed forward with our usual club work - albeit in different forms. More importantly, though, we took this time to reimagine our club and took actions to make it more accessible, inclusive, and diverse than ever. In this report, you will see not only a recap of the year, but also that renewed focus on the future.

The aftermath of the George Floyd tragedy brought about a renewed stand against racial injustice. We began the Rotary year in the midst of lengthy discussions about our role, and Rotary's role, in support of racial justice. In July, the Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Committee formed as an ad hoc committee of the Board of the Rotary Club of Seattle - International District. The purpose of the Committee was to draft a statement on racial diversity, equity, and inclusion for the Club's membership to approve and to recommend an Action Plan based on that statement. Further, it was charged with overseeing the implementation of that Action Plan by the Club.

That Action Plan had three categories of goals: education/learning, membership, and internal club operations. Goals for *Education & Learning* included having at least half of our speakers bring us info and opportunities in the local DEI space. As to *Membership*, we were to keep a census of members and focus on finding new members who could increase our diversity. As to *Internal Club Operations*, we decided not to recite the pledge of allegiance since, at this time, there is no justice for all of us and also with the recognition that, with Rotary being an international organization, not every member/future member is an American citizen. With *Internal Club Operations*, we were also committed to considering our community and international projects through a DEI lens.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion became, and will continue to be, central to everything we do as a club.

- Participate in District and Interact Meetings on Racial Justice
- Conduct book group and table discussions/breakout rooms
- Research and maintain diversity census of the Club



All club meetings this 2020-21 Rotary year were conducted virtually. While an adjustment at first, we found that virtual meetings were much more accessible for speakers. With speaker programming, we continued to focus on gaining a better understanding of the work that other organizations and groups are doing in the community that we serve and exploring ways in which we might work together. We had an amazing line-up of diverse speakers and we hope that many of these relationships will continue in the future as new club members or working partnerships!
