- A) For the past several years we have participated in an annual clean-up of he local cemetery. This year it was held on April 26 in conjunction with the Rotary Club of Ojai West, the Boy Scouts and the Master Gardener. Members weeded, trimmed and cleaned out debris.
- B) Our major fundraiser for general contributions to non-profit organizations is the "Taste of Ojai" which he held for the seventh consecutive year with the cooperation of the Ojai Valley Inn and Spa, and local restaurants in September. Food was donated, prepared and served by 30 food purveyors and restaurants. Tickets are limited, but the maximum of some 500 people attended and enjoyed in what is becoming a fall afternoon tradition on the beautiful grounds of the Inn. Club members are involved in marketing, set-up, cleanup, hosting and event management.
- C) This year our Club initiated in conjunction with the Ojai Valley Community Hospital and joined in by the Rotary Club of Ojai West "Fit Kids Fit Ojai" a planned on-going program to reduce and discourage child obesity in the Ojai Valley. Major sponsorship was acquired and "Youthfest" a free Sunday afternoon festival for youth took place November 4 featuring a fund raising "Rubber Duck Derby". Funds are granted to local non-profits who qualify with obesity reduction projects for children. Our members provided marketing, event management, hosting, set-up and clean-up.

Agricultural Demonstration Garden in Niger



A \$22,000 Matching Grant Project sponsored by Rotary Clubs of Agadez, Niger (D9100), and Ojai, CA (D5240)

Project Description:

The nomads of Niger face continuous pressures to survive in their traditional lifestyle. They battle repeated cycles of starvation and poor health brought on by natural and manmade forces in their country. Niger is a desert country with little agricultural activity, but there are areas that have water and soil that can be cultivated. The proposed Demonstration Garden Project is designed to conduct basic agricultural research to adapt basic modern agricultural knowledge and techniques to the local geographical conditions so that the nomads can gain some self-sufficiency through the ability to grow their own food stuffs for themselves and their animals. This project will address issues of improved water usage and increased food production, which will lead to better health, and the ability to raise produce for a cash crop.

The majority of the project implementation will occur before and during the first growing season (which will start in June 2008), but the benefits are expected to continue in future seasons as workers will refine techniques and train people from other locations, who will then apply what they learn to their local conditions.

The Demonstration Garden in Agadez will be located on land owned and managed by the Nomad Foundation. This project will provide funds to train selected personnel in basic agricultural techniques and proven methods. The results of research into the type of seeds, crop rotation strategy, fertilizer usage and irrigation methods will be determined and communicated to the community. People from other nomad communities will visit the demonstration garden and be trained in these processes, procedures and methods, so they can implement these new ideas in their own communities. The benefits will result from the ability of the nomads to grow their own vegetables, grains and animal feed and not have to purchase these basic food stuffs from other areas of the country when the dry season or cyclic drought occur. Overall the health and well-being of these poor people will improve.





Project Sustainability:

Produce from the demonstration garden will be sold in local markets, so the garden is expected to be selfsupporting and sustainable after the first year. Hopefully, other communities who learn from the demonstration garden will also see a consistent increase in production in their locations as well.







Scope of Matching grant:

The Demonstration Garden Project will include providing fencing around the existing site to keep animals out, optimizing the existing water well to improve efficiency, installing irrigation systems, conducting seed research, purchasing basic cultivation tools, determining best practices for fertilization, establishing a crop rotation strategy, contracting local field labor and training management staff.

This \$22,000 matching grant will pay for site fencing, a diesel well pump, irrigation ppiping and fittings, cultivation tools, training materials, consultation, training and supervision in the use of an irrigation system and cultivation techniques for the nomadic zone. It will also fund follow-up supervision and transportation costs so that a consultant can visit the communities where nomads who participated in the demonstration garden training will apply what they learned in their own communities. Seeds for the demonstration garden and participating communities will be provided through the World Seed Bank, arranged by Ojai Rotarian Dietrich Schmidt.

Rotary Clubs of Agadez and Ojai will work together:


The Host Partner Club (Rotary Club of Agadez) will hire the training management staff and workers who will cultivate and plant; oversee all site preparation and construction; arrange to purchase the irrigation and fencing materials, and make sure they are maintained; and oversee the harvesting of the crops and work out a plan to sell and distribute the food stuffs. They will also initiate contact and consult with the agricultural experts at the university in Niamey who were located through the International Partner.

Eight members from the International Partner Club (Rotary Club of Ojai, CA) went to Niger and saw the proposed site for the Demonstration Garden. One of the team members is a farmer, and another is on the board of directors of the World Seed Bank that is developing seeds for use in Africa. In addition to providing funds for the project, the International Partner Club will assist in the seed research and procurring the most beneficial seeds, and recommend best practices for efficiency agriculture, soil production and environmental protection.

Rotary Clubs 'ducking' issue of child obesity

Duck Derby, set for Nov. 4 Youth Fest, will fund local Fit Kids! Fit Ojai! projects

The Rotary clubs of Ojai hope to get 10,000 rubber ducks out of the bathtub and send them racing down Loebl Creek as a fund-raising event to fight childhood obesity.

With one out of three American children suffering from type 2 diabetes and 24.4 percent of the Ojai Unified School District's 5th-, 7th-, and 8th-graders overweight, the Rotary clubs of Ojai have decided it's time to do something local to tackle the issue.

"It's a nationwide problem and there are a number of local communities have initiated grassroots efforts to address it," said Larry Beckett, a member of the Rotary Club of Ojai West and a coordinator for the event. "This is the first generation that may not live as long as their parents."

The Rotary clubs' game plan is to set rubber ducks racing down a scenic waterway during their Ojai Youth Fest on Sunday, Nov. 4. Plump, yellow ducks sporting dark sunglasses will be up for adoption at \$5 a duck, and \$25 for a

"quack pack" of six.

The Golden State Water company has agreed that the battle to diminish childhood obesity is worth the several gallons of water they intend to pour, pro-bono, into the currently dried-up creek for the race.

Adopters of the quickest

At the end of the race the two Rotary clubs plan to tally up the revenue and drop it into a "Fit Kids! Fit Ojai! fund. That money will be used toward existing efforts that help prevent childhood obesity, as well as create new youth fitness-geared projects, said Beckett.

Fit Kids! Fit Ojai is the program both of Ojai's Rotary clubs recently conceived, to begin gathering money to tackle the nationwide youth obesity epidemic by focusing on local projects.

They are not sure where the fund-raising dollars will go yet but have some ideas to work with. The Rotary clubs have already dished out funds for an afterschool P.E. program at Topa Topa Elementary School, an Oak View Teen Center program that provides guided physical activities and healthy low-fat treats, and collaborated with the Meiners Oaks Parent Teacher Association and Food for Thought to repair a student vegetable garden for the local elementary school.

The new Fit Kids! Fit Ojai program is to be an ongoing fund-raising project that will pump money toward such projects and jump start new ones, said Beckett.

The Rubber Duck Derby is set for 2 p.m. in the midst of the combined Rotary Clubs' Youth Fest 2007 on Sunday Nov. 4 from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. at Libbey Park.

The day-long fair offers a number of aerobic activities for kids including a climbing wall, Jolly Jump, and an obstacle course. Parents can get their kids free health screenings from the Ojai Valley Community Hospital and munch on healthy refreshments from local vendors while being educated about youth fitness, said Beckett. The importance and magnitude of the program is emphasized by the fact that it is the first time in the 25 year history that both Rotary Clubs, operating at the same time in Ojai, have united in a major program.

Dear Marty,

On behalf of the low income teens of Oak View, and their families, we thank you for including our Oak View Teen Center program as one of the first to be funded in the Fit Kids/Fit Ojai Initiative. We have begun the program this summer with a group of younger teens (ages 10 to 13) who have become regular participants. This is a disadvantaged, at-risk group of Latino kids who are enthusiastically participating in fitness activities, health and nutrition education, and incentive programs. They have already learned better snack buying choices, are drinking water instead of sodas, walking and exercising more, as well as learning yoga and general healthy habits.

Boy Scouts return from Joshua Tree

Rotary-sponsored troop spends weekend in Mojave Desert

Joshua Tree is the name of a small desert community in the Mojave Desert, and the name of the Dr. Seuss-shaped cactus tree that was christened in the name of the national park. There are wide vistas of broadly scattered Joshua trees poking out of the desertscape for miles and miles, mixed with imagineering boulder piles, creating a porcupine surface as far as the eye

can see.

It is difficult to pinpoint the source of the magic of such a natural wonder. Was it the clear blue sky and warm November sunshine over the desert landscape, or the starlight that backlit the trees and boulders at the remote campsite? Was it the amazing traction the feet had on the granite boulders, or their odd shapes that looked like faces of giants, or the views we had once we pulled and climbed our way skyward? Was it just the sound of young people and a few old goats enjoying the great outdoors?

Ojai Scout Troop 504 had planned to camp at one of the regular group campsites, but as Plan B, would take the park's backpack option, hiking at least one mile from certain designated areas and at least 500 feet from any trail. On our weekend, Plan B won out as all the regular sites were filled and the park rangers were happy to send our crew backpacking. An old mountain man once told us that if we were willing to go at least a mile off the main roads, what hidden natural treasures we could find. This was surely true for us

We drove near Pine City Trailhead and hiked toward old gold mines. From there the older scouts plotted a course along a dry river bed and found a wide and flat sandy area that served as our home base. There were boulders surrounding the site and a few pinon pines and turbinella oaks to block the wind and give some shade. The scouts found ways to wrestle and play a flashlight tag game that night, but the biggest highlight of that site was the variety of boulders and crevices to climb during the day. There was no moon that night but the stars were bright and backlit the trees and boulders as we watched for satellites and shooting stars.

The Park Service encourages and the scouts work on the "Leave No Trace" principles of having a light footprint so that critters and people alike can continue to enjoy the park after our group has moved on. This means that the scouts work at minimizing their impacts on the land and look for ways to clean up trash that others have left or improve sites.

Our thanks and appreciation go to the Joshua Tree National Park and park rangers that have created many ways to get many people close to these natural wonders, most especially for creating the backpacker's option that allowed us to get off the beaten path and to experience the natural magic of the area!
