

#### **DESIDER ATUM**

President Maurice F. Twitchell designated that a history of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria would be the Club's Project honoring the Seventy-fifth Anniversary of Rotary International, and the Fifty-seventh year of our Club.

Three previous efforts to provide the Club with a written narrative of its history met with various fates.

The first endeavor was in 1926 when William C. Keefe collected a short biography from each member, including their activities in Rotary, and re-typed them on heavily textured paper. These pages were filed in a red leather box, imprinted "Santa Maria Rotary Club", in gold, on the cover and placed in the Club's archives. Over the years, the red leather box disappeared. Not until this current history project was undertaken did it come to the surface, due to the sharp eye and memory of member Henry Datter who had spotted it a number of years ago on the shelves of the Santa Maria Valley Historical Society.

While it cannot be classified as an attempt to record the history of the Club, the next event, chronologically, was the death of "Allie" Martin, Club Secretary, in 1950, and the appointment of a temporary Secretary to complete his term. This individual, whose name appears to have been A. N. Onymous, decided that the files were too full of unneeded papers. He burned everything, including the original Charter!

Early in the 1950's another attempt was made to compile information about the Club. It is apparent, from what is available, that each Past President was asked to write a short history of his term. Copies of these papers sur faced in the files of several Rotarians during the current search. Far from complete (as related to the Past Presidents then alive), these reports have certainly been of inestimable help with this Club project.

In the early 1960's, the Club printed a loose-leaf membership book which has been of considerable importance to this current Project. First, it provided us with many of the pictures which we have used; second, it gave us the then-current members of the Club; and, third, it included a two-page "Brief History" of the Santa Maria Rotary Club membership from the first meeting as a "provisional" club through 1943. We have used this book extensively in our search for the names of members and the year-by-year membership list included as a part of this booklet.

#### PRAEFATIO\*

At the outset, we must admit that this is not a "history" of the Santa Maria Rotary Club - - it is, more or less, an abridged "diary." The first five formative years have been abstracted from the pages of the <u>Daily Times</u>; those reports of the Presidents from the 1930's and 1940's, which were written by them, are quoted verbatim; a third type of statement as been written from records which have been made available to us by Past Presidents who are still with us. There are voids where no material is at hand. We hope that this will be corrected in due course.

We know, without knowing, that there will be errors. Particularly will this be true in the membership lists for they were compiled from several sources and, although cross checked by several individuals, there are bound to be omissions and/or spelling errors. Please forgive us -- and make the corrections.

There remains much to be done, but there is one small satisfaction in viewing what has been accomplished -- it is more than we had before.

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#### HOW ROTARY BEGAN

Rotary was born in the fulfillment of a dream envisioned by a man who loved his fellow men.

Paul P. Harris, the founder of Rotary, was born in Racine, Wisconsin, April 19, 1868, but lived most of his youth in Wallingford, Vermont. He attended the University of Vermont, Princeton University, and was graduated from the law school of the University of Iowa in 1891

Harris traveled extensively, but at last settled down in Chicago where, in 1896, he opened a law office. In 1900, he accompanied a lawyer friend on an after-dinner stroll in the business district. He was impressed when his companion stopped in several stores and introduced him to the owners.

Harris realized then that his own law clients were business friends, but not social friends. He began dreaming of how business and professional people could become social friends perhaps through a club of representative men in the two fields united in friendship and fellowship.

By 1905, Harris had formulated a definite philosophy of business relations. He discussed his ideas with three of his clients -- Sylvester Schiele, a coal dealer, Gustavus Loehr, a mining engineer, and Hiram Shorey, a merchant tailor - and on February 23, 1905, the four men met in Schiele's office and organized the world's first Rotary Club. The name "Rotary," was chosen by Harris because the members met, in rotation, in their various offices and places of business.

When the Rotary movement had grown to include 16 clubs, they were united in 1910 as the National

Association of Rotary Clubs. Within the next two years, clubs were founded in Canada, Ireland, and England, and the movement became an International Association of Rotary Clubs. The name was shortened and changed in 1922 to Rotary International.

Paul Harris was president of the Chicago Rotary Club during its third year, and served two one-year terms, 1910-1912, as president of the National Association of Rotary Clubs. He dedicated himself to promoting the growth and advancement of Rotary in the firm conviction that Rotarianism could be developed into an important service movement throughout the world.

Before his death on January 27, 1947, Harris had seen the realization of his dream literally sweep across the nation, and into many foreign lands.



#### ROTARY'S BEGINNING IN SANTA MARIA

In the early 1920's it was possible that you might find every business and professional man in Santa Maria eating lunch in Rencher's Cafe at least once week. The cafe was convenient to all who worked or shopped in "downtown" Santa Maria. It was to this center that a particular group of men migrated with a degree of regularity. Their numbers varied, as did the days of meeting, but, gather they did to discuss politics, economics, the state of the nation and, particularly, the state of Santa Maria. There was a companionship of interests.

In 1922, if one counted every person (some even say, 'and the dogs') one might stretch the population of the town to 4,000 souls.

We do not have a record which reveals who or when it was suggested to form a Rotary Club in Santa Maria. We do know that a num ber of the charter members had attended Rotary meetings in San Francisco, Los Angeles, and Santa Barbara. From what we know of the charter members, the ideals of Rotary would have had a strong appeal. There were problems to be solved then, as now, and Code of Ethics of Rotary could be seen as a means to an end.

In the Fall of 1922, some of the group from Rencher's went to Santa Barbara to meet with members of the Rotary Club of that City. As the result of this meeting, the Santa Marians began to think seriously of forming a Rotary Club. By October 10, 1920, the original nineteen members began to meet every Tuesday noon, as a "provisional club," at the Santa Maria Inn. There were six organizational meetings during which they elected Jesse H. Chambers as the President and George M. Scott as the Secretary. They also determined that their first charitable efforts should be directed toward supplying milk for needy school children.

On December 5, 1922, the first official meeting of Rotary Club #1288 was conducted, and the official meeting place was listed as the Santa Maria Inn, on Tuesdays, at 12:00 noon.

On the 19th of December, the District Governor, Jack Williams of Long Beach, presented the Club with its Charter at a banquet.

This was also the first of a long list of "Ladies' Nights." Thirty members of the span soring Santa Barbara Rotary Club drove up the not-so-good Coast Highway for the event to present the new Club with a banner, a gavel, and a bell.

A "Special Edition" of the Santa Maria <u>Daily Times</u> devoted the entire front page to the founding of the first service Club in Santa Maria. The <u>Daily Times</u> donated the income from the sale of that edition to the Rotary Milk Fund.

The selection of Jesse Chambers as the first President was indeed fortunate. Jesse was a born organizer and was imbued with the spirit of Rotary -- even before he had heard of the organization. He immediately set out to create committees which were to report on the needs of the community. The aforementioned milk program is an example of that effort.

George Scott was a good choice for Secretary. Thanks to George's meticulous recordkeeping (and to parties unknown who gave that attendance book to the Santa Maria Historical Society) we have an accurate record of the members of the Club, and the meetings attended by each, from October 10, 1922, to the end of July 1943.

Within forty-five days of its Charter Night, the Club had organized the Santa Maria Boy Scout Council. All the officers and the Directors were Rotarians; all but one of the Court of Honor were Rotarians; and nine teen of the twenty-one members of the Council were Rotarians. Among the new Boy Scouts was Curtis Tunnell, who would later become a Rotarian, a President of the Club, a City Council member, and on the Board of Supervisors of Santa Barbara County.

Even more oriented towards agriculture than it is today, Santa Marians were concerned with the various problems facing the farmers of this area. Many of the early meetings of the Club were

devoted to this subject in general and to the latest methods of turning the valley green by irrigation. It was not unusual for innkeeper and member Frank McCoy to coordinate his menu for the luncheon meeting with the topic under discussion. Outstanding among these joint efforts was the time Frank arranged to serve valley grown beans in twelve different ways for the talk given by Franklin Marshall on the bean brokerage business.

The "Rotary Year" in the 1920's began in February. Jesse Chambers and George Scott were reelected to serve a full term.

Early in March of 1923, Rotarians became very involved trying to get the "Espee" to run a spurline into Santa Maria. Failure spurred them on to make the Southern Pacific route its line so that it would not prevent some other railroad from providing connecting services between the narrow-gauged Pacific Coast Railroad, which ran through Santa Maria, and the "Espee". They were successful and their active participation in this community problem made it possible, at a later date, for the Santa Maria Valley Railroad to exist.

On April 23rd, Rotarians were up early in the morning. They had to string a banner across Broadway before the first of a convoy of automobiles passed through town on the way to the District #2 Conference in Pasadena. "Welcome to Santa Maria

-- Home of Rotary Club #1288" the banner read. A hospitality booth was set up on the lawn in front of the Carnegie Library. For the next three days, caravans from Washington, Oregon, Northern California, and the Central Valley passed through the town. Every day there was a Rotary meeting at the Inn. Next stop: Santa Barbara. The Santa Marians went to the conference, too. They won a Silver Cup for having the largest percentage of their membership present.

What was reported to be the largest invitational track meet in the State was held in Santa Maria on April 22, 1923. All the meet officials were Rotarians. Again, the Club had provided a needed community service. It should be noted that a couple of future Club Presidents were also present as students at Santa Maria Union High School: Winston F. Wickenden was the Head Scorer, and Morris J. Stephan wore #55 as a participant in the meet.

The interest in working with boys seemed to know no limits for, five days later, on the 27th of April, Rotary hosted 150 local boys at a two-day camp on the Oakley Ranch northeast of town. The Club provided the transportation, food, shelter, and the entertainment at the evening campfires.

In May and June of 1923, the comings and goings of Cecil B. DeMille were reported daily in the <u>Times</u>. DeMille was bringing in 3,000 people and 4,000 horses and setting up a city on the Guadalupe dunes to produce "The Ten Commandments." He, his family, and many of the major stars of the film stayed in the Santa Maria Inn. DeMille was also a member of the Hollywood Rotary Club and made-up in Santa Maria every Tuesday while on location.

When the Santa Maria Union High School's "American Football" team played out of town, it was the Rotary Club which organized the caravan to carry the team and the rooters to the game. When the games were played in town, it was the Rotary Club which saw to it that the necessary guarantee (generally about \$800.00) was raised to pay for the travel, feeding and housing expenses of the visiting team. To more or less oversee their investment, as a manner of speaking, the Referee, the Umpire, the Head Linesman, and the Timekeeper were all Santa Maria Rotarians. SMUHS 30 vs. Lompoc 9; SMUHS 29 vs. Santa Barbara O; SMUHS 44 vs. San Luis Obispo 6; SMUHS 53 vs. Lancaster 0. The CIF Championship game was played out of town: SMUHS O vs. Long Beach 39.

Four 100% meetings in September: Cornelius Vanderbilt, Jr. made up in November; Restrooms, for the ladies, were provided at the Armistice Day Parade; the Rotary float carried the large "wheel" which Cecil B. DeMille had given to the Club; speakers of national reputation often spoke to the Club on matters of local concern; there was a 100% turnout for the Charter Night of the San Luis Obispo Rotary Club (which had been sponsored by the Santa Maria Rotary).

Christmas time saw the establishment of two long standing traditions for the Club: The distribution of food baskets and Christmas trees to the needy of the community, and the Christmas party for the children of Rotarians with Harry Dorsey as the Santa Claus.

In January, 1925, there were special showings of "The Ten Commandments" at the local theater. Streetcar tickets from Guadalupe to Santa Maria, and return, were 50¢. On the 6th of the month, Rotary Prexy C. Leo Preisker was elected as the Chairman of the Board of Super visors of Santa Barbara County -- a post which he held for the next 20 years.

High School student Curtis Tunnell spoke to Rotary on "Interdependence of the School and the Community." Don't we wish we had a copy of that?

New by-laws were written and hereafter the President was [still] elected in February but would take office on July 1st.

On April 28th, the Charter Night of the second club sponsored by the Santa Maria Rotarians, Lompoc, was held with "Allie" Martin, Past District Governor of District #8 and Santa Maria Rotarian, as the speaker.

L. E. Blackman was back in town and spoke on "Rain"; a committee was formed to study the formation of a Chamber of Commerce; L. E. Behymer, artists agent, world traveler, and member of the Los Angeles Rotary, spoke on the world-wide influence of Rotary; Al Roth, the Controller of Stanford University and Past President of the Palo Alto Club spoke on "Boys" at the annual Boys Day at the Club; on Memorial Day Dr. O. P. Paulding, Civil War veteran, E. D. Sword, Spanish-American War veteran, and Harry Nuss, World War I participant, spoke at the meeting.

On the 29th of June, 1925, the earth shook and Santa Barbara came tumbling down. The next day Santa Maria Rotarians held a short meeting and voted to send a truckload of milk to the stricken city. Many local Rotarians were busily engaged in numerous relief efforts for the next few weeks.



At 9:15 a.m., September 15, 1925, fifteen Rotarians and their wives climbed aboard the PCRR's "Rotary Special" and started for San Luis Obispo.



At about noon, the train was "held up" by bandits and prisoners were taken from the train.

The bandits escorted the Santa Marians to the Cal Poly picnic grounds, and all were found guilty by the impromptu court. Sentenced to eat the barbecue cooking on the open pits were Roemer, Preisker, Marshall, Geo. Scott, Rector, Asmus, Stokes, Church, Coblentz, Crawford, Keefe, Wheat, Cannon, Dorsey, Fuller.

Paul Harris, the founder of Rotary, made-up in Santa Maria on November 13, 1925. Mr. Harris' California schedule called for visits to the Rotary Clubs in Los Angeles, Santa Barbara, and San Francisco, but at the last minute (with the lure of staying at the Santa Maria Inn for two nights), plans were made to include Santa Maria. Hasty telephone calls were made to San Luis Obispo, Lompoc, and Paso Robles inviting members there to join the Santa Maria Club for a meeting with Harris. As the whole matter was quite impromptu, it was almost a business-as-usual meeting with singing, fines, announcements, introduction of visiting Rotarians and a half-hour talk by the man who began it all, Paul Harris.

During the 1925-26 year, Rotarians did not always meet at the Inn. In fact, they seemed to meet just about everywhere. To view the new Baldwin locomotive of the Santa Maria Valley Railroad, they ate in the maintenance building; to get to know the students at the high school, they held a meeting in the school's cafeteria; when USN destroyers visited Pismo Beach and Avila, they journeyed to Pismo Beach for a luncheon with the officers of the USS Hamilton; they were off to the County Fair grounds for a milking contest between Leo Scaroni (banker) and Ted Asmus (farmer); on the 22nd day of December, 1925, they had their luncheon meeting at the SMVRR headquarters but this time it was to inaugurate Santa Barbara County's first radio station, KXFC (later, KSMA); and, a barbecue in the Union Oil fields.

Bob Easton reported to his fellow Rotarians that there were 4,000 acres of alfalfa, 300 acres of peas, 200 acres of tomatoes, 300 acres of cauliflower, 25 acres of celery, 1,500 acres of lettuce, 3,000 dairy cows, 20,000 acres under irrigation and, that 113,000 tons of sugar beets had been processed at the local plant. The payroll in the oil fields exceeded \$600,000.00 and that of the flower fields \$210,000.00.

The Rotary-Kiwanis baseball game was played on March 21st. Rotary won by a score of 17 to 10. Over 1,000 people paid to see the game and the clubs, as usual split the gate -- each giving \$500.00 toward the new municipal plunge. To get into shape for the game, the Rotary team had spent the previous night at Pismo!

When President Lou Crawford boarded the "Rotary Special" in Los Angeles, bound for the Convention in Denver, Colorado, he took with him 100 cases of lettuce for the consumption of the train-riding delegates. Arrangements had been made with the trains' operators to have included on the printed menus, "Santa Maria Valley Lettuce."

The year featured many "special" days: "Get Out The Vote"; Ladies' Day; Ladies' Night; Memorial Day; Armistice Day Parade (and float); Scouting Day; Business Day; Dairy Day; and, Victory Day for the local high school's football team.

In mid-February 1927, Honorary Member G. Allen Hancock took a group of local Rotarians to Mazatlán, Mexico, aboard his ship, the SS OAXACA. While in Mazatlán, they had luncheon with a number of the local businessmen and came away with the sound feeling that there would soon be a Rotary Club in Mazatlán. With in a short time, a Club was chartered in that City and the Santa Maria Rotarians have always taken considerable pride in the fact that, while they were not the actual sponsors, they were, in fact, the party responsible.

Madame Ernestine Schumann-Heink "made-up" again; Rotarian Lasky was making "The Light That Failed;" a Kipling story, in the Guadalupe dunes; the Cuyama road was opened; President Harding died in San Francisco and the speech he was to have made to the San Francisco Rotary was read in Santa Maria by Lou Crawford; Senator Reed, of Missouri, was in town, and delivered the eulogy to Harding at the Club; Rotary pressure made the "Espee" change its mind about having only two stops a day at Guadalupe; Arthur Haslam won the Rotary golf tour, and Mrs. E. E. Bryant won the women's division at the conference that year; Rotary beat Kiwanis, 14 to 13; and \$100.00 was sent to the flood victims in the Mississippi Valley.



The Club initiated, and sponsored, a drive to establish a Chamber of Commerce in Santa Maria; Ben Blow, Field Secretary of the National Automobile Club spoke on the new 'National Highway System' and informed the Santa Maria Rotarians that US 101 would go through the town as the major coastal route on the system, the Rotary float won the Armistice Day theme prize again; the Club organized a special train, which ran from Guadalupe to a siding adjacent to the Los Angeles Coliseum, for the CIF Football Championship game

with Fullerton; Silver Cups were presented to the winners of the Rotary sponsored summer youth program in the city; and, as was becoming the pattern, Rotary distributed food parcels to the needy at Christmas time with Harry "Santa" Dorsey delivering toys to the children.

When L. D. Waller, his wife, and son, returned from the Rotary Convention at Ostend Belgium, they were met at the Guadalupe station by a 20-car motorcade and escorted back to Santa Maria.

#### THE EMBLEM OF ROTARY

The first emblem of Rotary was adopted in 1905 and was a wagon wheel. The formation of additional clubs brought about modifications to satisfy the aesthetic tastes of these new organizations. By the time of the 1912 convention, it was deemed necessary to standardize the emblem to a geared wheel similar to the one now used. The description of 1912 was not precise so, the 1919-20 Board further defined the details. However, it was not until 1929 that the "wheel" was given specific details.

"...a geared wheel of six spokes... twenty-four teeth... and a keyway... "Rotary" [to] appear... at the top... and... "International" at the bottom... the wheel should be of gold with the rim of royal blue. The words... of gold..."

#### THE UNEXPECTED GUEST

On January 22, 1924, President Jesse Chambers was confronted by an unexpected, and uninvited, "Honorary Member." A distinguished, shortish, plumpish, stylish woman walked into the room, placed herself next to the piano, and announced that she was going to lead the Club in singing the "Star Spangled Banner." President Jesse did not know exactly what to make of this, and his concern was read in his face by Frank McCoy. Frank hastened up to the head table and whispered something in the ear of the President. A wane, and somewhat puzzled, smile came over Jesse's face. "It will be," he said, "our honor to have you lead us, Madame."

The golden voice filled the room; guests in the main dining room of the Santa Maria Inn stopped eating; chefs and bus boys stopped working; the telephone rang unanswered at the switchboard; the mouths of song loving Rotarians dropped in awe and admiration. When the last notes of our National Anthem lingered in the air, the woman pulled back a chair at the nearest table and sat down.

Softly, as though he did not wish to disturb the air, President Jesse said, "Thank you, Madame Schumann-Heink. Thank you very much."

Ernestine Schumann-Heink, reigning diva of the world's greatest opera houses, returned the smile and then, to the amazement of the seven Rotarians who were then seating themselves at the table, she began eating and talking -- as if she were one of them. She was, in fact, "one of them" for she had acquired, among her other titles, the classification of "Honorary Rotarian." A quick Board meeting was called for after the meeting, and Madame Ernestine Schumann Heink was also made an "Honorary Rotarian" of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria. At least once a year, for the next five years, Santa Maria's own, special, "Honorary Rotarian" wore her luncheon badge to the meetings of this Club.

The depth of the Great Depression had been reached, but no one knew it yet. Businesses everywhere were struggling to keep afloat as best they could -- and many did not make it. Rotary memberships had to be relinquished for purely economic reasons. Again, the Rotary Club of Santa Maria was fortunate for, in this year, they had as their President "Mr. Positive" himself. <u>Variety</u>, the showbusiness daily, called him "Prosperity's Shill" when he announced that the theme for the year for the Club would be: "Pay bills promptly and bring back prosperity."

Harry and Ethel May Dorsey attended the R. I. Convention in Vienna, Austria, that year. One of the real highlights was the evening at the Theater of Vienna to hear "The Merry Widow" directed by the composer, Franz Lehar, Vienna Rotarian.

In June 1931 (the Club was still electing its President in February), Santa Maria "invaded" San Luis Obispo with a Flying Circus. Honorary Member G. Allen Hancock led a flight of five planes from his Santa Maria based flight training school over San Luis Obispo. Ten uniformed cadets emerged from the planes and were taken to the new Elmo Theater for the premiere of "Winning His Wings," a five-reeler filmed on location at the flying school. Santa Maria Rotarians, who were

members of the cast, L. P. Scaroni, and Lt. Col. Ross McBride spoke about the making of the picture to the 1,100 people gathered in the theater.

Frank P. Hayes and the Elks Boys Band entertained the gathering throngs at the Third Anniversary of the Santa Maria Theater while movie cameras recorded the entrance of celeb rities on "Rotary Night." Jesse Chambers presided at the microphone in the theater and the program was carried live over KSMA. Several weeks later, the movies taken of the arriving personages were shown on the screen of the Theater as a part of the billing.

Harry knew how to stimulate business and how to stimulate Rotarians at a time when everything looked to be at its worst. He invented the "golf game of the century" for the "Championship of the Salad Bowl of the Universe" between Rotarians and Kiwanians. Members of both clubs, even those who had never played before, were matched and hundreds of Santa Marians paid 25 cents to watch the fun. So certain that there would be some cheating on the greens, both clubs nominated their clergy members to keep score. However, this play to calm tempers and settle disputes did not work out as planned. The Rev. S. J. Kennedy (Kiwanis) and the Rev. Arthur Nagel (Rotarian) arrived at the match with pre scored cards.

"It has ever been the experience that community activities yield to economic changes and when the pinch is the most pressing, we see more and stricter attention to individual businesses and professions and less to club activity."

"In reviewing the year 1933-34, we must concede we were passing through an upsetting depression with the result that our Club suffered some losses in membership and fewer replacements, in other words, we were at a standstill. Another influencing factor was the political party [i.e. Republican] upset and which marked the beginning of that one party [i.e. Democratic] in the executive seat for a period of twenty years."

"It is very difficult for me to think back to that time and fix events in our Rotary Club happenings with a degree of accuracy without the aid of recorded minutes, which we under stand are not available (either lost or destroyed). These were valued assets and should have been carefully preserved."

"My term followed that of Dr. [William H] Conser, who had a pet expression very fitting for the time: "Maybe yes and maybe no." The Doctor and I accompanied our ladies-in-Rotary, Dale and Lauretta, to the District Conference held in Pasadena that year. After spending several days in the atmosphere of Rotary enthusiasm, making new acquaintances, renewing old ones, and participating in the events both business

and social, we were loaded with that Rotary enthusiasm. We had the hopeful feeling that our Club should so respond by a return to better attendance and a growth in membership. But the year 1933 closed and the early months of 1934 were still of the marking time status. As the year 1934 pro gressed, however, economic improvements were assuring and our Club began to recover membership interests and lost motion."

"[William Jesse] "Prof" Wilson was elected President for the Rotary year 1934-35. We, accompanied by our ladies, went to the District meeting in Fresno. We entered into and enjoyed the good fellowship prevailing in all the activities of the Conference -- both business and social -- and with a good load of this we returned with "Prof" ready to take over."

"Every member who has the opportunity to attend one of these conventions should do so. One owes it to himself and to his affiliation in Rotary. [At that time] Rotary District Number Two was as yet undivided and so large was the District that the District Governor was unable to cover it and visit the individual clubs as is the privilege today after the separation. The International Conference was held in Boston in 1933 and Robert Bruce, with his lady-in-Rotary, Iona, attended as our representative."

"I know that some may claim for their year as the most outstanding especially so when the membership showed the greatest growth, but I do claim for my year, and the one proceeding, a most interesting year in the history of our Club. [It is] interesting to experience how true the pattern of business and social life is affected by economic conditions and also to know that Rotary is built upon sound and helpful philosophy needed by every community and that membership in Rotary is not easily discarded even in times of reverses by those who are sincere in their affiliations with Rotary."

"Candidates for President were "Prof" Wilson, Bob Bruce, and K(enneth) B. Holeman. [Ed. of this, the Club bulletin, The Master Gear, noted: "...he entered into a conspiracy to perpetuate the presidency in the hands of the educational fraternity, and, to insure success of his plan, pretended to oppose Bob Bruce so he could be elected (in 1935)...]".

"The year began with only twenty members, the smallest number after the Club was organized. The Club was divided into two teams, each team responsible for presenting one or more names to be considered for membership. The year ended with forty-six members, having lost none of the original twenty."

"Two changes in policy were made. All the director's meetings were held in the evening at the home of the President. This allowed for more deliberation for business as well as a social get-together."

"The initiation fee was drastically reduced to conform with the times."

"One of the best meetings of the year was the one in which the Santa Barbara Club came up, <u>en masse</u>, and its President, Les McClelland, was the speaker. He became the successful candidate for District Governor."

"There was a very successful Ladies' Night program. The

speaker was brought down from the Oakland Club and was accompanied by a young lady from the San Francisco Grand Opera."

Robert Alexander Bruce, who, after a careless count of ballots, was declared elected president of Santa. Maria Rotary club at a meeting m April, has been diligently working to fit himself for the job, to which he has looked forward in hope and trepidation, hope that he would be allowed to take office without serious protest and trepidation over whether Prof. Wilson would surrender the job or not.

In a biography once written of the new jefe politico of the Santa Maria Rotarians it was said that "A com munity must be careful to choose the right man to head its school system." Nothing was said about a Rotary club doing likewise, so Bruce was elected.

The new prexy is one of those numerous Native Sons who fill all the state's good political offices and look down with considerable scorn upon the Iowans who pay the taxes. Born in Chico, he labored under a disadvantage from the start, but managed to overcome this after he had gone through all the schools they had there by going to Columbia and picking up a master's degree. "As we travel through life meeting people from all over the world, I find our paths are crossed with the Quiet People, the Special Ones and often, and more often than not, they are one and the same."

"In meeting them, if we are fortunate coming to know them, we find there are certain characteristics in their personalities setting them distinctly apart from others. They are the doers. A quiet simplicity, a shy modesty, a certain humility and unless one is acutely aware they could go quietly on their way unnoticed.

"It is a privilege for me to nominate to Rotary's "Hall of Quiet People" or the "Special Ones" our longtime friend, neighbor and my hus band's fellow Rotarian, Manuel Bello. This is long overdue, for through the years, Manuel has done much for Rotary, the community, and count less friends and acquaintances."

"Recently, at the installation of new officers, Manuel presented the Rotary Club of Santa Maria with a new lectern. Only after much urging would he come to take a bow and acknowl edge the thunderous applause for this beautiful gift. The lectern is made entirely of perfectly inlaid woods of several varieties, complete with speaker and amplifier and a Rotary Wheel in exact scale, hand carved by Manuel. He admitted to having worked on it a hundred hours. I feel sure there were many more hours devoted to it. This lectern was given to replace one he had made several years ago and presented to the club. He discovered the Rotary Wheel was plus or minus a cog and just could not rest until he had made a new one."

"He also presented the new Rotary Club of South Santa Maria with a lectern the night it was chartered recently and is replacing the wheel on the old Santa Maria Club lectern. He says he will save this to present it to another Rotary Club in the future. Manuel also presents each incoming President with one of his handmade gavels."

"Manuel does this beautiful work in his orderly workshop just off his garden, each creation a labor of love. Mostly he likes to make things that are a real challenge. I collect tiny previous boxes. Manuel made a heart shaped box for me, and it is displayed alongside an ivory and porcelain box presented to Mr. Suchart, French Consulate to Persia by the Shah of Persia in 1895 and given to me by Mr. Suchart's only daughter. The



wood in Manuel's box is from the burl of an ancient California Redwood tree, lovingly shaped and polished. Both boxes to my mind keep excellent company. Manuel also carves fruits adapting various woods to the color and texture of the fruit being carved, pears, apples, lemons, bananas, grapes, walnuts. I have a bowl of them, and more than one person has attempted to crack a walnut or peel a banana.'

"Manuel started this craft when he retired and it fills many hours, but you could hardly say he is retired. He is Clerk of the Santa Maria Resource Conservation District, active in the community, travels a great deal here and abroad, but when someone wants something special done in wood, it is to Manuel Bello they turn."

"A fine person, a fine Rotarian, much loved by all who know him. One of the Quiet People, one of the Special Ones."

#### JESSE CHAMBERS' CHARGE TO NEW ROTARIANS

"My friend, you have been honored with membership in the Santa Maria Rotary Club, and this Club expects you to honor the principles for which Rotary really stands. A fine conception of Rotary is very largely an individual matter. Some men take their Rotary very differently from others. With some it is an opportunity; with others, it is an obligation; then there are others who regard a Rotary Club as just a bunch of good fellows, and I am very sorry to say that in the communities, there are men who look upon a Rotary Club Luncheon as just a place to eat."

"In commencing your career as a Rotarian, you will start at least a step or two higher then this latter class. If you do not, you will be just so much dead material for Rotary to pack, and for which it will receive no adequate return in manpower. Rotary is big enough to pack you, you understand, but you will not be big enough to get away with that interpretation of Rotary for any great length of time."

"You are to attend these Luncheons regularly -- that is the first requirement that Rotary makes of you. They are held at this place on Tuesday of each week at 12:10 p.m. sharp, and adjourn just as promptly at 1:30 p.m. This is where you contact with the practical side of Rotary life. It is the charging room for your Rotary Spirit Battery, and unless you come around about once a week and get a re-charge of the spiritual things in Rotary, you will find that your battery is not much good. At these Luncheons you will meet men who are trying to build the principles of Rotary into their everyday lives. They are growing men -- men who are becoming more and more efficient in their businesses and professions, and more and more useful in their community. You need to touch elbows with that kind of men. And if that is the class of men you want to get into step with, come where they congregate; where all barriers are thrown down, catch the hearty goodwill of their Fellowship and learn to be a Rotarian "

"If you attend these Luncheons regularly, you will someday come to get Rotary right in to your blood -- and until you get it there, you will not be sure that you have it at all."

"So about once a week, you want to hit a Rotary Luncheon someplace, get a vision of the things unseen in Rotary, and then go back into the world and live the life that Rotary makes possible for you."

"And one of the things that Rotary stands for is Friendship -- real, simon-pure Friendship. Not the Friendship that expends itself in goodwill toward men that you like -- you were born with that -- but the Friendship that makes you big enough to like men in spite of their faults and help them in spite of their mis takes in judgment. Rotary doesn't expect you to be perfect, but as a Rotarian, you have the right to expect the Friendship of every man who sits at this board with you -- patience with your shortcomings, and charity for our errors in judgment."

"And this brings me to say that the things for which Rotary really stands are the things that are unseen -- the important things the vital things; the things that a man takes with him when he sets out upon that Great Adventure from which no man returns."

"It is a good many years since a wise man said, "Look not upon the things which are seen, but upon the things which are unseen; for the things which are seen are temporal, but the things which are unseen are eternal." And because Nations heeded not that injunction, and fixed their gaze upon the material things alone, and sought after them and fought for them, this world has just recently gone through the greatest period of bloodshed and devastation of which man can conceive"

"And Rotary believes that it is just as fatal for the individual as it is for Nations to fix his gaze upon the material things alone, and shut out the spiritual things."

"So you were not invited into Rotary be cause of the money you have, and I don't know whether you have much or little. And it wasn't because of your social standing, but we in Rotary will soon find out just how much of a social being you are. And it wasn't because of your political influence, be it great or small. Nor was it because of the church you do, or do not, attend. In extending you an invitation to become a Rotarian, is it not significant that you were not asked about any of these things? These are the things that men ordinarily give their lives for, but Rotary is dedicating you to bigger and better things."

"You were invited into Rotary because we believe you to be a man of vision -- a growing man; not only in the matter of the business or profession which you happen to represent in this community, but in the matter of your own manhood. There are men in Rotary who have this vision, and they are leaders among us. They are gradually becoming greater leaders in their community, and are helping to make Rotary a living, vital force in the life of humanity."

"Reach out to this standard of Rotary manhood; to this life of "Service Above Self"; get a vision of things unseen in Rotary, then let Rotary help you build them into your life eternal"

"The year 1939 recorded two history shattering events: First, the election of T. A. (Cap) Twitchell as President of the Santa Maria Rotary Club, and second and of lessor importance, the start of World War II."

"The election, as anyone would suspect, was unanimous. The installation of officers fol lowed the usual routine for such events, with the exception that the newly elected president was practical in his demands upon the various committee members. The policy of the new regime was expressed in the concrete direction to all committee members: "For God's sake do not do less than the same committee members did last year, and assuredly at the same time the administration does not expect more." In this way the even, slumbering tenor of the Rotary Club was not disturbed."

"The National Convention was held at Cleveland, Ohio, and was attended by the President and his wife. The convention, as is always reported by the attending delegate from the local club, was outstanding in all particulars -- outstanding speaker--outstanding program-- an outstanding ball, and in fact just plain outstanding.

"The assembly was held at Del Monte and of course, was attended by the President and the genial secretary, Paul Nelson."

"The district conference was held at Santa Barbara was attended by President and Secretary."

"One of the Past District Governors spoke at both the assembly and the district conference. There were numerous other speakers who spoke at both meetings. The similarity of language, gestures and facial expressions of all speakers prompted the President to make his now famous report of both meetings. The report was: "Gentlemen, in making my report, I will be brief. Please refer to the New Testament, Hebrews 8. To those unfamiliar with the Bible, the language referred to is: "Jesus Christ, the same yesterday, and today and forever."

"At the local level (a favorite expression of present day bureaucrats) the Rotary year of 1939-40 was outstanding. Fines were modest, honesty imposed, and only for just cause, with liberal discounts for cash. The budget was almost balanced, although not without complaints. The program committee did an outstanding job under the leadership of Stanley Hancock and Marvin Andrews. Every program held the rapt attention of each and every member. The attendance record, I am proud to report, was below the normal average. Each succeeding president has taken ten years off his life fretting about attendance. The President in 1939-40 lost neither sleep nor years from his life because of the laxity of his fellow Rotarians. I am sure you will agree that this habit has not changed. He did feel duly and properly rebuked by a recent address of the Honorable Howard Kirkland, Past District Governor of Rotary International."

"Two outstanding events must be recorded for posterity:"

"One: The last choo-choo and chuff-chuff of the Pacific Coast Railway passenger train, chartered for a gala occasion when the Rotarians and their Ladies of Rotary dressed in their appropriate attire, rode in state to a dinner and dance at the barnlike dining room and dance hall formerly operated near San Luis Obispo. The train was equipped with an ancient although well-equipped bar. The event was memorable though

few Rotarians remember all the details. However, those who attended will never forget how our Past District Governor and great stickler for Rotary protocol, Allie Martin, sang "Sweet Adeline" and made love to his girl friend."

"Two: 1939-4-0 was one of the occasions when Rotary prevailed in the Rotary-Kiwanis Field Day. At least 'tis my recollection that this was so."

"The President retired in 1940 (as is the usual custom of all presidents) amidst the applause of and to the great relief of all members of the Santa Maria Rotary Club."

"During my year as President of the Santa Maria Rotary Club, commencing July 1, 1940, and ending June 30, 1941, the following achievements took place:

"I attended the International Convention at Havana, Cuba, in June of 1940, at a time when the ideals of Rotary were being tested. All the Rotary Clubs of Germany had been officially banned, but the Rotarians were reportedly gathering at the usual meeting places, not as Rotarians, but merely as private citizens enjoying a meal. Rotary was not discussed because Hitler had delared Rotary Clubs illegal, however, the spirit of Rotary revealed itself amongst most of the members and the French and British Rotarians reported that the German Rotarians were still interested in Rotary International, but could do nothing in the open."

"The British First Vice President of Rotary International had left London during the critical time when the Blitz bombs were creating great havoc. The Germans were just starting to take France and were reported to be taking Paris during the Convention. Even with all the gloom, the International spirit of Rotary burned high. The theme at the Convention was that International peace and goodwill would still prevail no matter what the outcome would be in Europe. At that time, the United States was merely an interested bystander in the conflict. The British First Vice President made an inflamed appeal to all the delegates to return to their home countries and work toward International peace and coopera tion, even though he expected to return to London and find his family wiped out and his home in shambles. He was at the Convention one day when he made the key address and then he returned to his devastated London. All the delegates with whom I talked were greatly impressed with the thought that this man who faced so much personal loss could still stress to Rotary embers the need of peace and goodwill, and that the spirit of Rotary cannot be defeated at any cost "

"During my year as President, the European war fared so badly for the allies that Rotary International did little except try to keep the clubs intact throughout the free world. The British and European Clubs were so busy with their war that they could only give the Rotary work what time could be spared from their more urgent war-time duties. The American Clubs stressed community voca tional projects rather than International projects except to stress the need for ulti mate International peace and understanding."

"When France fell to the Germans, the French Rotary Clubs had to go underground, as did the Spanish and Italian Rotary Clubs. We in America kept getting reports that the individual interest in Rotary was still being maintained by the members of the Clubs which had to forego open meetings. They were merely waiting until the fortunes of war changed so they could resume their place at the world convention of Rotary International."

"Our Rotary membership was approximately 40 at the beginning of my year, and the same increased to about 48 members at the end of the year. We had two 100% meetings during the year. In order to instill good fellow ship, we had several Ladies' Nights, one of which was a buffet supper at the Minerva Club, followed by group games and dances. Another official event was the "Dust Bowl" hayride in which the members and Rotary Anns met at Fred Sherrill's farm near Sisquoc, piled into hay wagons, and were hauled by tractors to a spot where we had a barbeque, games and fun. It was wonderful, except for the dust which filled the air and the ladies' hair. They spoke spitefully of the occasion for many months, calling it the "dust ride."

"During the County Fair, Phil Daniel was put in charge of the construction of our Rotary Club float, and he used the big Rotary wheel, plus hundreds of choice flowers. We worked until 4 o'clock in the morning building the float and were gratified when we won the First Prize for the same."

"In order to have more fellowship among the members, we had our luncheon tables joined together so it formed a large "U" shaped table with the head of the table where the stage is located in the dining room. At that time, prosperity had not fully returned, and a fine of \$.50 was considered an exorbitant fine since most of the fines were in the \$.10 or \$.25 bracket. Paul Nelson was the Secretary of the Club, and did a splendid job under the tutelage of George Scott, who had been Secretary for many years."

"In order to keep the members appreciative of the Rotary's obligations, I had to inform several members who missed three

meetings in a row that if they missed one more, they would be automatically dropped from the membership. This helped in keeping the attendance in the upper brackets because there were only 4 or 5 members who kept pulling our attendance down. The directors took a serious view toward compelling the members to attend the required time, and notified the members that they would be dropped if they did not keep their attendance to the minimum established by Rotary International."

"During that year, our Club sponsored Boy Scout Troop No. 1, which under the leader hip of Scoutmaster Otto Kramer, was considered the outstanding Troop in this area."

"I was installed as the Nineteenth President of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria. When I took office, our country was in its first year of World War II. During the year, the Club maintained an Air Observation Post on the Ellis Rice Ranch about 20 miles east of Santa Maria. The Club was also very active in the local Savings Bond Drive; contributed a leader and funds for the Rotary Boy Scout Troop; and assisted with the United Service Organization (USO)."

"Paul Nelson was the Secretary for the Club. Clyde Dyer was the Program Chairman, and formulated an all-year program scheme centered around the four avenues of Rotary Service. The wartime travel restrictions and the quality of the programs gave us a 92.60% attendance for the year."

"Four Ladies' Night Dinners; an intercity meeting with Guadalupe, San Luis Obispo and Lompoc; and exceptionally good Club Assemblies (2) led by members of the Rotary Information Committee, coupled with extensive coverage in the local newspaper, resulted in a most active and successful year."

#### PAST PRESIDENTS CLUB

"The Past Presidents of Santa Maria Rotary Club held their early meetings at George Scott's cabin in Lopez Canyon. I didn't have occasion to attend any of the meetings up there, but the earlier Past Presidents reported having great times, even finding a live rattlesnake cohabit ing their accommodations. They earl adopted the policy of not disclosing their activities (or winnings) at regular Rotary meetings.

"The first contact I had with the Past Presidents Club was at Herschel Scott's cabin in the upper Santa Ynez mountains, east of what is now Cachuma Lake. I think Hershel acquired it from L. D. Waller. It was beautifully located and had ample sleeping accommodations."

"The group started gathering on Friday afternoon, had a lamb chop dinner on Friday, breakfast and lunch on Saturday barbecue beef Saturday night. On Sunday mornings, Jess Chambers cooked chicken livers and Herschel made biscuits (from scratch). Needless to say, all attenders left the get together relishing the gourmet servings. The entertainment on the weekend included horseshoe pitching, chess (for Jess Peterson) but mainly poker. Someone (I think Jess Chambers) installed a slot machine (illegally), but it provided revenue to help defray the food for the weekend. Jess Chambers regularly siphoned off the excess coins from the slot machine and added them to the \$5.00 each of us paid for the week-end grub. If the total didn't appear to equal the total costs, Jess would confiscate part of the table stakes in the poker games. He'd rob Peter to pay Paul -- everyone joined him in his fun (except the winner of the hands from which part of the table stakes were grabbed). The immediate Past President would be duly initiated into• the august group -- often he'd have to "sit on the throne" (a block of ice) while being initiated. The candidate could not sit down at the Past Presidents table for dinner, he had to act as waiter, and also assist in the dishwashing. He was also sworn (or warned) to preserve secrecy as to the "lost week-end." The poker always had limits on the betting so no one could really get hurt."

"The Rotary records for the years immediately before and after my reign having been destroyed, this treatise will have to be one of supposition, memory and just plain darn lies."

"I was elected President in 1948 and the election resulted in two notable events: First, the Club dug rather deeply into the barrel for a President, the question being who won and who lost. Secondly, the Club placed the accent on youth for administration,"

"G. Allen (Allie) Martin was our fine Secretary and attended the Monterey Conference with me after I had previously attended the Stockton Assembly with Ed Adler, my predecessor.

"On October 18th, I attended the Pacific Grove Rotary Club and on behalf of the Santa Maria Club presented them with a plaque for the lobby of their meeting place. I made an exceptionally fine presentation, probably the best those boys had ever had or were ever to experience. As usual, your President raised the stature of the home club."

"On October 12, 1948, a very fine Gay Nineties party was held with the ladies as guests at the old Gaiety Theater under the guidance and sponsorship of the incomparable Harry Dorsey."

"On February 22, 1949, a joint meeting was held at the

Santa Maria Club with Arroyo Grande, Lompoc, Guadalupe, San Luis Obispo and Santa Maria in attendance. The occasion was to dine with and listen to Mr. Russel Greiner, who had been the third Rotary International President in 1908. Again, your President handled the occasion in his faultless manner."

"On March 3rd, Club Assembly was held at Rusconi's, and a 100% meeting was the result. We had to prepare for the District Governor's visit, you know, and visit us he did, on March 8th -- your very clever President introduced Mr. Raymond Taylor, the District Governor, by a name he had never heard of before."

"On March 9th, quite a number of the local yokels of our Club visited San Luis Obispo and hobnobbed with Royalty at the visit there of Rotary International President Angus Mitchell."

"On July 12, 1949, after working on the budget sufficiently, I took off for New York for the International Convention and a few rounds of drinks with the newly elected Presi dent, York Peterson."

"I was elected President of the Rotary Club for the year 1949-50. That year, Rotary International was held in New York City, and my family and I drove back to the Rotary Convention."

"Upon my return to Santa Maria, I took over the reins as President of the Santa Maria Rotary Club. Since I was the City Engineer of the City with most of the duties of City Manager and had given a talk on the slide rule before the Club, which I thought was well received, I mistakenly introduced a slide rule for an exemption badge. The member drawing the badge was given a simple problem in relation to his business or profession. In order to qualify for "no fine" the member had to answer problem approximately, which in many cases could have been done mentally. To my disappointment and chagrin, not one member drawing the slide rule exemption badge throughout the Rotary year was able to solve one problem. With the slide rule in their hands, they seemed to become seized with catalepsy. To my utter embarrassment, the membership made a coffin for the slide rule exemption badge, and upon my retirement, placed in the box and this exemption badge has never been seen in Rotary again. I had high hopes of imparting a little useful knowledge of the slide rule and elementary mathematics.



- *Chess:* One one-man team per club; one game limit; played to finish. Three points to winner.
- *Golf:* Handicapped; nine holes; one ten-man team each club; paired matches. One point per match.
- **Softball:** Ten players each team; neutral officials; 5 innings; standard rules. Five points to winner.
- *Horseshoes:* Three one-man teams; regulation 21 point scoring system. One point for each winning team (total 3 points).
- **Tennis:** Two singles teams and two doubles teams per club; regulation rules. One point per match (total 4 points)
- **Poker:** One four-man team per club; players furnish own chips; \$5 maximum in chips; "freeze out" rules; two rounds California draw and two rounds stud; largest pile wins. Three points.
- **Bridge:** Three two-man teams each club; Contract Bridge rules; three rubbers; highest score in each rubber wins one point (total 3 points)
- Team scoring most points to be guests of team scoring fewest points at supper following Field Day.

In keeping with its long established policy of supporting the Junior Statemen Program, the Club sponsored David Hall as the representative from Santa Maria. David used Rotary's Four Way Test in his campaign for the Governorship of the conference and gave credit to the Test for playing an important part in his success in being elected. He had analyzed his platform, plank by plank, with the questions put forth by the Four Way Test and, when he had finished, he said, "I had a handful of splinters." Rebuilding until each plank faced the test, David was able to measure himself and his program and say that it was fair to all concerned.

The Four Way Test was used again when the scholarship committee went over the applications presented by the staff of Allen Hancock College pointing out to the authorities that the Club would not only consider the scholastic record, the character, and the leadership abilities of the students but would also question the students on their attitudes towards the standards set out in the Test.

The end result of this activity on behalf of the Four Way Test resulted in the Santa Maria High School's use of the plan within its Social Studies curriculum. The Club distributed 800 sets of gummed Four Way Test stickers (3 stickers per set) for student notebooks; 800 pocket folders with the story of the Four Way Test; and 20 copies of "Suggestions for Teachers" which indicated useful applications of the Test.

#### WALLER PARK BIRD CAGES

(Reprinted from the August 1959, ROTARIAN)

"The automobile dealer, a bit out of breath, paused in his work to glance about him. It was a bright Spring Day in California. It was an ideal day for a round of golf. Or to be out on the nearby Pacific Ocean after the big fish. But Hal McBride, a member of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria, California, was digging a ditch. And as he looked about him, he saw many of his fellow Rotarians doing tasks equally strange to the business or profession that they normally followed. Sitting behind the wheel of a fork-lift tractor was Dennis Dallaston, an investment broker. Perched 30 feet high in the air was Ray Hardy, a sugar-

refining executive. All were working on a project which has spanned three years and which, since its completion, has brought pleasure to thousands of residents of the area. They were building an aviary which now houses hundreds of birds ranging in size from tiny finches to huge predators.





"On this project they provided the manpower that resulted in a \$10,000.00 aviary being constructed for less than \$1,500.00. They built it in Waller Park, a favorite picnicking spot in the Santa Maria area.

"To help entertain the youngsters, several years ago, the local park caretaker obtained some geese, ducks, chickens, a few deer, elk, and mon keys and started a little zoo. But the facilities were not the best. The county provided no money for the project. Soon afterward the Santa Maria Rotary Club launched a fund to build new pens for the animals.

"Pipe for framing was solicited from oil firms. Contractors donated time and materials, and Rotarians worked on weekends for five months to build nine pens, each nine by nine feet, with concrete floors and shelter houses. The completion of the \$5,000.00 pens for less than \$700.00 was only the beginning. The County Park Department had a master plan for a zoological garden in the park and included in this master plan was an aviary. Rotarians started a community drive which raised \$1,150.00. Then, every weekend for 21 consecutive weeks,

Rotarians turned out to work on the project -- as many as 45 or 50 on some Saturdays. On rainy week-ends Rotarian Galen Hartwich provided a warehouse where trusses were fabricated. In mid-July, five months after they began, the job was finished. The pens cover 6,100 square feet of ground area and contain 162,000 cubic feet of space. And now when Rotarians visit Waller Park, the singing of the birds in their shiny new cages is indeed sweet music to their ears."

During the year, the Club accepted the responsibility of sponsoring the new Explorer Scout Troop. 
established and flourished for several years. A barbecue-dance was held, jointly, with the Lompoc Club.

Culminating four years of effort, the bird and animal cages at Waller Park were finally completed. This had been an allout effort by all members of the Club who not only donated their time, but also materials and funds, or, as one person put it, "preferably all three." The dedicatory addresses were filled with compliments to the Club for this exceptional addition to the cultural and educational benefits of the community.

One can hardly do justice to the 27-page report written by Ezra Lyon on his year as the President of our Club in the space allocated.

Ez organized the Club into 16 committees on Club Service, nine on Community Service, four for International Service, and six deal ing with Vocational Service. This was not an unusual undertaking, but the results were.

Twenty-six community service-oriented programs were presented during the year as were sixteen on vocation service, seven on international service and the balance on club service. This was accomplished by having a Program Committee of 55 members -- each responsible for a specific program thus insuring that the best possible programs would be secured.

A new Explorer Scout troop was sponsored by the Club; the Visiting International Student Association was organized on the high school and college levels; scholarships were awarded to John Johnson and Mary Johnson; an award was made to the student writing the best paper on the vocational program in the high schools; three representatives were sent to the Junior

Statesmen conference; the Rotary float, using the theme of the R.I. President "Bridges of Friendship" featured a bridge on which stood the foreign students at Hancock College dressed in their native costumes; there was a concerted effort to see that the members made up missed meetings; the 4-H steer was purchased at the Livestock Fair; Board meetings were held monthly; committee reports were used as guidelines for discussions on the progress of the Club; the R.I. rules governing membership were given special attention; a classification survey was made; Senior Active membership was strongly stressed; prospective members attended roundtable discussions on Club and R.I. history, organization, classifications, and objectives of Rotary; a Safety Council "Fire Prevention Week" was sponsored in the community. - "... the object of Rotary is to foster the ideal of service through friendship and mutual understanding and to encourage this ideal of service as a basis of worth enterprises ..."

- "... Rotary did not invent, nor is the ideal of service peculiar to our organization alone. Where, then, is its value? ... The value of Rotary in the jdeal of service, as a basis of worthy enterprise, is in Action. Doing, Giving of one's self. A driving force, not merely contemplative, but operative as well..."



"Vocational Service at Work Through Occupational Information" was a major emphasis of the 1968-69 Rotary year. The primary objective for the Club during the year was the development of a scholarship program which included the students of all three High Schools -- Santa Maria, Righetti, and St. Joseph -- and Allan Hancock College. This was the fulfillment of a long-time desire to recognize academic excellence of the students within the boundaries of the Club.

In the Spring, the District Conference was held at the Vandenberg Inn. Our Club was the Host, with the Lompoc, Guadalupe, Arroyo Grande, and San Luis Obispo Clubs acting as Co-Hosts. District Governor Bob Howlett arranged for an outstanding program for the 500 participants. Dennis Dallaston was the Coordinating Chair man for the event and is to be commended for a superior job. Vegetables, fruits, and sugar products, grown in the area of the hosting Clubs, were given away as door prizes, and a basket of locally grown fruits was placed in each delegate's room prior to their arrival. A banquet and dinner dance completed the three day conference.

#### CHARGE TO NEW MEMBERS BY EZRA C. LYON

Few of us can remember what was said by the Speaker at our High School graduation. Practically none of us can remember what was said to us upon our induction into Rotary. With this in mind, we thought that it would be appropriate to include in this 'history' the Charge given to new members in the Rotary Club of Santa Maria as written (and often presented) by Past President Ezra C. Lyon.

"Gentlemen, today you are being honored with membership in the Rotary Club of Santa Maria, and this club will expect you to honor the principals for which Rotary stands."

"Because Rotary is an association of individuals, a fine conception of Rotary is largely an individual matter. Some members regard Rotary quite differently from others. For some, of course, Rotary is an opportunity; others consider it somewhat of an obligation. Then there are those who regard a Rotary Club as just a bunch of fine fellows, and, in some associations, I am sorry to say, there are some members who look upon a Rotary Club Meeting as just another place to eat."

"In commencing your career as Rotarians, you should plan to start at least a step or two higher than this latter class, or your membership will represent just so much dead weight for Rotary to pack, and, for which it will receive no adequate return in man power."

"You are to attend a "weekly Rotary meeting" regularly. This is the first requirement that Rotary makes of all its members. At a Rotary meeting, you will make contact with the practical side of Rotary life. It is the "charging room" for your Rotary Spirit Battery, and unless you attend a Rotary Meeting about once a week, you will find that your battery isn't much good."

"At a Rotary Meeting, you will meet men who are becoming more and more efficient in their business or profession, and, thereby, more and more useful in their community. You need to touch elbows with these men, and if you find that they are the class of men with whom you want to associate, come where they congregate. Catch the hearty "goodwill" of their fellowship and learn to be a Rotarian."

"By regular weekly attendance, you will someday come to get Rotary, as we say, right into your blood, and until you do get it there, you will not be sure you have Rotary at all."

"So, make it a habit to attend a Rotary meeting each week. Get a vision of the things "unseen" in Rotary, then go back into the world and live the life that Rotary makes possible for you. YOU, YOUR FAMILY, YOUR ASSOCIATES -- ALL WILL BE HAPPIER FOR IT."

"Friendship is one of the things for which Rotary stands. Not the friendship you have for someone you like -- you were born with that, but a type of friendship that makes you big enough to like someone, in spite of their faults, and to assist them to correct, or rectify, their mistakes in judgment. Rotary doesn't expect you, or any of its members, to be perfect, but, as a Rotarian, you gentlemen have the right to expect the friendship of every man who sits at a Rotary Board with you, his patience with your short-comings, and his charity for your errors in judgment."

"You were not invited into Rotary because of the money you have, and I wouldn't know if you have much or little, and it wasn't because of your social standing in the community, or your political influence, be that great or small. Nor was it because of the church, which you do or do not attend, and the subject of Race was never mentioned. Was it not significant that you were not asked about any of these things?"

"You were invited into Rotary because we believe you to be "men of vision", growing men,progressive men, who will recognize the IDEAL, as expressed in the "Object of Rotary", as worthy of your effort. There are men in Rotary who have this vision, and they are leaders among us, and are helping to make Rotary a living, vital force in the life of humanity."

"Reach out to this standard of Rotary Manhood; to this life-concept of "service above self". Get your vision of things, unseen, in Rotary, then let Rotary help build your vision into your life eternal. Do this and you will realize your fondest hopes of Rotary, and Rotary its fullest expectations of you.

"On behalf of the Rotary Club of Santa Maria, it is my pleasure to welcome you gentlemen into the "WORLD OF ROTARY"."

#### THE TROPHY for 1958-1959

TO THE ROTARY CLUB OF SANTA MARIA, CALIFORNIA:

A great deal of hooey, rough stuff, shouting and jargon has been heaped upon the heads of the Conquering Kiwanians by the Defeated Rotarians.

The heroic members of the Kiwanis Club accepted in good faith the challenge to meet the Rotarians in the Annual Rotary-Kiwanis Field Day Events, and the contest took place, as scheduled, on September 25, 1958.

Acting with quiet dignity, the powerful Kiwanians bowled over the howling Rotarians in six major events, making a score of 18 points. Three ladies' games were given to the Rotarians as a courtesy: Tiddley Winks, Gin Rummy and Bridge. The Rotarians howled over the Golf score until the Kiwanis Club sportingly conceded this event to be a tie. The Ring Tennis was won by Kiwanis by default, since Rotary refused to play more than one game.

These are the facts, and the true score is 18 to 9 in favor of Kiwanis. Without any argument.

Realizing that they were hopelessly defeated, the Rotarians adopted a policy of claiming victory by trickery, deceit and intimidation. Two goons were used at the banquet, one to shout out a fake score of 28 to 22 in favor of Rotary, the other goon, by brute force, tore the true score from the grasp of the official Kiwanian score keeper and bore him, with hoarse shouts, out into the outer darkness.

The Rotarians were much more active in faking and publishing a fake score than they were in the actual contest events

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Not satisfied with their rowdy tactics, the crafty and unprincipled Rotarians sent police officers in full uniform, carrying a false Writ of Possession issued by a certain Jaques Strappe without any power or authority, to grab the trophy which the Kiwanis Club holds safely in its vaults.

Such buffoonery at first aroused contempt in the minds of the learned Directors of the Kiwanis Club, but it finally melted into pity. The question was: What can we do to raise the morals of the weeping and howling Rotarians?

After mature deliberation, the following findings were

First: The Rotarians were, by the events of the Field Day, rendered insane, incompetent and non compos mentis.

Second: To restore their mental balance and future happiness, a concession could and should be made to make them think that they had won the annual Field Day for 1958.

Third: This concession would not be true, but it might save the Rotary Club from complete dissolution.

Fourth: That the trophy should first be properly inscribed by the Kiwanis Club, then shrouded in white as a symbol of Kiwanian purity and then delivered into the custody of the Rotary Club to be held by them until the next Field Day.

Fifth: A prayer should be made that the Rotarians may be restored to sanity by this big-hearted appeasement.

In view of these findings, IT HAS BEEN ORDERED by the Directors and approved by the entire membership of the Kiwanis Club that the coveted trophy be delivered as aforesaid to the President of the Rotary Club, to be held in their custody for one year or until the next regular Field Day. That a copy of these resolutions be delivered with the trophy, together with a prayer that the Rotarians be restored to sanity.

### SPONSORSHIP OF OTHER ROTARY CLUBS

It is now the responsibility of the District Governor of Rotary International to establish a new Rotary Club. However, in the 1920's, the District (No.2) in which Santa Maria was located covered all or parts of five states. It was, therefore, up to the established clubs to take the initiative, as Santa Barbara had done for Santa Maria, to create new clubs.

Santa Maria Rotarians were caught by a zeal to spread the word of Rotary to nearby cities, which would provide, by the way, a means of keeping up on one's attendance -- an important factor to those early members.


In the 1920's, California had a population of around 4,000,000 people, with most of them concentrated around the San Francisco Bay Area. (The next most populace area was in the small cities around Los Angeles). I can remember driving up the Coast with my parents in the 20's and stopping every 40 or 50 miles to visit with someone my father knew quite

personally. Almost everyone knew almost everyone else--at least, Rotarians knew potential Rotarians up and down the 400 mile stretch. It was in this atmosphere that Santa Maria's Rotarians operated and spread the word of Rotary.

With a Club hardly a year old, the Santa Maria members took upon themselves to establish San Luis Obispo as their first effort of expansion. On December 1,1923, the San Luis Obispo Club was chartered. All of the Santa Maria Rotarians were there.

By 1925, L.D. Waller was not only in the seed business, but in the Rotary expansion business, too -- in Lompoc. He saw to it that Frank McCoy and Leo Preisker were present at several meetings he had set up, and presto, on April 28, 1925, all but two of Santa Maria's Rotarians were in Lompoc for that Club's charter night.

In February, 1927, Honorary Member G. Allen Hancock took L.P. Scaroni, F.H. Gates, F. J. McCoy, L. B.Coblentz, A.D. Church, C.L. Preisker, and F.B.Marshall to Mazatlan, Mexico, aboard his SS OAXACA. During their stay south of the border, they met with a group of Mexican businessmen and talked "Rotary." Although not directly responsible for the sponsorship of the Mazatlan Club, the Santa Marians certainly sowed the seeds for a Rotary Club was formed in that city shortly thereafter.

After a lapse of activity for a few years, our Club sponsored the Guadalupe Rotary Club and on May 18, 1940, watched as the District Governor, Dr. Howard B. Kirkland, of San Luis Obispo, handed the Charter to A. E. Gracia, the first President of the Club.

On February 23, 1973, the South Santa Maria Rotary Club received its Charter under our sponsorship.

There are probably some clubs within Rotary International whose record of actively organizing new clubs exceed those of the Santa Maria Club, but we think that four direct and one indirect sponsorships is a very tidy record, indeed. And we are proud of it!

The Santa Maria Rotary Club continued its long list of sponsoring needed programs for the community with the "YES" office's establishment. "YES" = Youth Employment Service. It was with a great deal of satisfaction that the membership heard about the success of the Youth Employment Service (YES) which the Club had sponsored during the summer. Within a 25-day period, 385 jobs had been found for the community's youth -- at a cost of only \$350.00. "Operation Bicycle," in cooperation with the Police Department, had gratifying results as shown by the marked decrease in accidents in volving bicycles. "Meals on Wheels," the Association for Retarded Children, and assistance to the Kiwanis Club with its program to provide transportation for the crippled and elderly to cultural events were among the contributions of the Club in the support of local entities.

The year placed a considerable emphasis upon youth. Invited to attend the meetings were: The winners of the livestock fair-auction for juniors; the Captains and Coaches of the local college and high school football teams; the Homecoming Queens of the various schools; the representatives from Santa Maria to both Girls' and Boys' State; and the Student Body Presidents of all the schools in Santa Maria.

The annual family Christmas Party (with Carl Engel, as usual, as Santa Claus); a Valentine's Day Dance; a family outing to Mussell Fort; a Ladies' Day; and, of course, the annual Tom and Jerry Party marking the New Year, were the social events organized by the Special Events Committee.

During the year, the Club lost two valued Past Presidents. Auggie Mollath had been President for 1936-37, and the District Governor, District #524, in 1961-62. Auggie was "Mr. Rotary" as far as this Club was concerned. Bob Poole had been the President during the 1953-54 term. A very active Rotarian in Santa Maria, Bob moved, eventually, to Portland, Oregon, always keeping his interest in our Club alive through repeated contacts with our members.

There may, or may not, have been a connection between the fact that our President was a Judge and a Naval Reserve Officer, but crime-and punishment, and the operations at Vandenberg Air Force Base provided a number of interesting and informative programs. Solar energy, electrical energy, atomic energy, air quality control, and earthquakes were, shall we say, "off-set" by the Allan Hancock Choir, a lesson on the training of a seeing eye dog, and the development of the local wine grape industry.

Of particular importance to the Club were the amendments to the By-laws. These changes provided for the election of a single Vice President; such Vice-President to be the President-elect for the following year; and that the person being elected as the Vice President must have served at least one year as a member of the Board of Directors prior to his assumption of the office. This change in the By-laws had been proposed by Ezra Lyon during his administration but, sometimes, the wheels of progress move slowly. It is the concept of the change that it will give continuity to the administration of the Club, as well as to provide a training period for a President.

The Secretary was given a new typewriter and the members were given Four-Way Test pens. Rotary lost to Kiwanis at the annual Field Day. A \$1,000.00 contribution was made to Rotary Foundation in the name of Auggie Mollath. Member Hank Stafford gave two Paul Harris Fellowship contributions.

The April 26, 1932, issue of <u>Variety</u> newspaper of the entertainment industry noted that: "Harry Dorsey [Santa Maria] exhib, has instituted a campaign for prompt payment of bills among Santa Maria merchants and stamps all his checks: "Pay bills promptly and bring back prosperity ..." The article noted that Harry was the President of the Santa Maria Rotary Club and that the Club's membership had swung into the quick bill paying campaign as a Club project.

The first person to join our Club was W. C. Conrad, on January 9, 1923. He was followed by Dolf Tuggle, E. E. "Britt" Bryant, and Louis N. Crawford, on February 20, 1923, and A. F. Bettersworth, on February 27, 1923.

Students on the 1980 tour are quite representative of past members of the Youth Exchange Program. They represent a wide spectrum of the countries: Argentine (1), Australia (11), Austria (2), Belgium (3), Bolivia (1), Brazil (7), Columbia (3), Denmark (1), England (1), Finland (6), France (6), Japan (4), Mexico (4), Netherlands (2), New Zealand (3), Norway (1), Philippines (2), Rhodesia (7), South Africa (2), Sweden (11), and West Germany (3).

In 1975, Chuck Hebard, President-elect for 1975-76, was the coordinator on behalf of the Club. For the years 1976, 1977, and 1980, Hans Kardel has been in charge of the arrangements. Terry Dittmore was responsible for the year 1978 and Mike Welch handled the planning for 1979. The undertaking's success is due, in no small part, to the dedication of these Rotarians to International understanding and goodwill.

Since 1975, the Santa Maria Rotary Club has participated in the "Central States Rotary Youth Exchange Program." This youth exchange venture is sponsored by over 500 clubs in the States of Wisconsin, Minnesota, Michigan, Illinois, Indiana, in the United States, and Ontario, in Canada. Beginning in Wheaton, Illinois, about eighty students from foreign lands are taken on a 28-day, 7,000-mile bus trip to acquaint them with the United States and Canada. These students have either just finished or are about to begin a year's study in high schools located in the Central States area.

One of the few stops on their tour was when they were taken into the homes of Rotarians in Santa Maria. When their buses pulled into a Rotarian-owned automobile agency they are met by their local "families" and taken to their hosts' homes. A quick assessment is made of their needs and, if possible, remedial actions are taken. It is usually their laundry which needs attention, but there have been several instances where Rotarian-dentist, Bob Ibsen, has made some quick repairs. At 7:00 p.m., the students and their hosts go to the Elks Club for a "Santa Maria Style" barbecue. After eating, they don the dress of their native lands and provide the local Rotarians and Rotary Anns with an International Night. Turn-about is fair play; the young people are then turned-on by a disco dance. Happy, and worn out, everyone goes to their "home" for a good night's rest.

Next day a trip to Avila Beach for a day in the sun on the beach is in order. More laundry is washed, and there is time to relax, too. That night, the travelers spend the evening in the homes of their hosts. Some long-time friendships have been formed, and more than one Rotary family maintains a correspondence with several of their past guests. At 8:00 a.m., the following morning, our new friends are back at Chuck Hebard's lot and boarding their buses. Smiles, waves, and blown kisses...the bus doors close... the motors roar into action...faces in the windows...some forgotten laundry arrives... slowly, the buses move out, and slowly, Santa Maria Rotarians drift back to their cars happy about their experiences but saddened that it was over so soon and resolving to make next year's encounter even better.

"I attended the International Conference in Tokyo, Japan. A photographic slide presentation of the convention and other places visited during the trip was shown to the Club."

"The following were some of the activities under the four avenues of Service:"

"Club Service: The Century Club was established. \$100.00 was provided -- \$50.00 to the Club in lieu of fines, and \$50.00 was accumulated for the Rotary Foundation. Twenty members par ticipated, and a Paul Harris Fellowship (\$1,000.00 to Rotary Foundation) was presented to Maude Scott in Memory of deceased Rotarian Herschel Scott. A Rotary Blood Bank was established to provide blood for Rotarians and their immediate families."

"Vocational Service: In cooperation with the Santa Maria Chamber of Commerce, we sponsored a \$500.00 award to the class of the student who demonstrated the most exceptional achievement in a vocational training area. We also assisted the Chamber of Commerce in presenting a series of films on "Free Enterprise."

"International Service: We continued the program of Rotary families being the host for 80 foreign students on tour of the Western United States. Santa Maria is considered the highlight of their trip because of the Santa Maria Style

Barbecue dinner and program, along with a day of relaxation in the sun and surf at Avila Beach. Rotary families provided lodging, meals, laundry service and friendship to these young people in June 1979."

"Community Service: We assisted in the selection of Santa Maria as the site for the annual District Conference in March 1979. We also aided in setting up and carrying out a suc cessful District Conference which was conducted by District Governor Mac Little of Morro Bay. We sponsored a "Monte Carlo Night" with proceeds in excess of \$2,000.00 presented to the Y.M.C.A. Building Fund. We also presented an academic scholarship of \$1,000.00 to Kevin Dykema, a Hancock College student."

"During my year as President, our participation in the Rotary Foundation increased from 1,400% to 1,700%."

"At the beginning of my year as President, I set my goals and presented them to the membership as follows:

- A. "Encourage greater participation in the Rotary Foundation, and the awarding of additional Paul Harris Fellowships."
- B. "Creation of a Blood Bank for Rotary members and encouraging participation."
- C. "Active member participation of Vocational Service to establish better understanding of the problems of the business community!"
- D. "Assist District Governor Mac Little in making the District Conference in Santa Maria to be the best ever."
- E. "To provide interesting programs."
- F. "To increase each member's interest and pride in being a Rotarian by encouraging participation in the club activities and percepts of Rotary."

The first son of a former President to hold the same position was Maurice F. Twitchell, son of T. A. "Cap" Twitchell, the 57th and 17th Presidents of the Santa Maria Rotary Club.

"The goal of the President of the Santa Maria Rotary Club for the 1979-80 Rotary year was to emphasize the weekly Rotary meeting, and in particular, the weekly program."

"Rotary has long fostered projects for the good of the local, national and international communities. Many of these projects are directed towards the im provement of the material well-being of various groups. These projects have been, and will continue to be, important."

"It is in our actions as individuals, however, that we best serve our community, our nation, and the world. If Rotary can inspire us to do our individual jobs a little better, then Rotary will have fostered its ideal of service. This inspiration comes primarily through the weekly Rotary meeting and program."

"The first event that inspired our members to greater achievement was the annual Field Day with the Santa Maria Kiwanis Club. For the first time in the long history of this event, we for got to bring the food. The reputation of this year's Rotary Administration was tarnished by the sight of several hundred famished Rotarians and Kiwanians, staring icily at the Rotary President. After the President recovered from his state of shock, an impromptu barbecue was arranged at the Santa Maria Club."

"As usual, the deciding event for the Field Day was the mumbly-peg contest. For the first time in recent history, Bill Holman lost the event. This loss was attributed to disruption of Bill's pre-event eating and drinking schedule. The Rotary-Kiwanis trophy was located and presented to the Kiwanians with the resolve that future Field Days would be better."

"Smarting from the Field Day food fiasco, the Administration vowed that the annual Christmas Meeting with the Rotary Anns and the children would be better. This event was held at the Vandenberg Inn. There was plenty of food, but few people. Christmas fell on a Tuesday of that year, so that the Christmas Party was scheduled a week before Christmas, while school was still in session."

"In February, the President, while meditating over his brilliant planning of the Field Day and the Christmas Party, received a flyer advertising a special entertainment program. Since there was no cost involved, and the program was endorsed by a Southern California Rotary Club, and the program promised professional entertainment, the President determined that this would be a good opportunity to promote the weekly Rotary program. A joint meeting with the Rotary Anns was arranged."

"The program turned out to be 10 minutes of horn-tooting on various devices, such as oil cans, and 20 minutes of promoting and selling an exercise trampoline. (Advertising and sale of commercial products at Santa Maria Rotary meetings is not permitted.)"

"With these triumphs under his belt, the President perceived that the members were becoming more than exercised. A diversion thus appeared to be in order. The attention of the members must be distracted from the efforts of the current Administration. Therefore, the Rotary history project was proposed so as to emphasize past triumphs over current efforts. The project was unanimously approved by the Board of Directors. There was a suspicion that the approval was designed to divert the President's attention from the present to the past."


