Planning for a reimagined **Beachside Bash** is progressing together with Rotary Ventura East and South. Planning is also progressing well for **Fireworks 2024** at Ventura College, and the **Chalk Art Festival** at the Harbor.

Our club is sponsoring the May 3 **Chamber of Commerce breakfast**. We are considering using the coffee table books as centerpieces. Neal, Ken, Kellye, Andie, Madhu and Saurabh plan to attend to represent the club.

Brenda Allison-Hutchinson gave a **Treasurer's Report**. All the members' accounts have been reviewed and our finances are in good shape.

The **Julius Gius Memorial Rotary Foundation** (JGMRF) Board met recently and approved a total of \$41,000 in grants to about 20 organizations. Applicants didn't get all the money they requested, but all got some. Three additional applications were submitted too late for consideration. The JGMRF Endowment Fund investments are growing well.

Longtime member **Stephen Kipp** died March 15. The club will donate \$2,500 in his honor to the JGMRF Fellowship, and will honor him at our May 1 meeting.

Youth Service: Three students from Ventura High School will be attending **RYLA**. We received 31 entries for the **Perspectives on Peace** competition; viewing and voting is April 18.


