




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Jack Wood: "A History of the Oil Industry in Ventura"

Our very own club member, Jack Wood will speak to us of very important industry in this area which has greatly shaped the community we live in now. Jack was formerly part of the local industry, as well as the head of the Ventura Realty Company, which owns many properties the Downtown area,



including the Bella Maggiore Inn. He joined Ventura Rotary in 1974.

By all accounts, the history of oil in our community has been very important. Ventura's oil fields were discovered in the early 1900's. By this time, oil was rapidly replacing coal as a fuel for locomotives, ships, and homes. In 1914, gasoline outsold kerosene for the first time, due largely to the increasing popularity of the automobile. The introduction of the Model T Ford in the 1920's led to an even higher demand for oil.

Ventura County experienced tremendous population growth during the 1920's due primarily to the discovery of the Ventura Avenue Oil Field in 1916. By 1926, this field was producing over 20,000 barrels of oil a day and its level of productivity brought in thousands of oilworkers, geologists, engineers, and oil-related businesses to the City of Ventura and outlying areas.

Rotarians Honored by White House

Twelve U.S. Rotarians were honored at the White House on 5 April as Champions of Change for their efforts to improve communities locally and around the world. As part of the daylong event, more than 160 Rotarians attended a morning round of briefings by government officials on topics including polio eradication, health, violence prevention, and the environment.

"It is a great honor to see these dedicated Rotary members recognized by the U.S. White House as Champions of Change for their work to improve the lives of people around the world," said RI President Sakuji Tanaka. He said the honorees exemplify how Rotary brings people together to solve problems that are too large for one person to tackle. "Alone, we look at the problems of our community and our world and we feel helpless," he said. "But together, we are powerful. And through Rotary, we have the power to change our communities and communities throughout the world -- now and into the

future. We have the ability to build the world we dream of: one that is healthier, happier, and with hope for better things to come."

RI General Secretary John Hewko said the 12 Rotarians represent what Rotary is all about: "committed volunteers working together to improve communities not just in the United States but throughout the world."He said that Rotary is an early and continuing example of organizations that are neither government institutions nor private businesses, that increasingly are joining together to address the world's most pressing problems. He noted how Rotary's partnership with other organizations has nearly eradicated polio worldwide.

"When we defeat polio -- and, yes, we will defeat this disease -- we will prove that there is nothing we cannot accomplish for the good of humanity by working together."


Kristin Taylor was finemaster and quizzed us on hypothetical ethical situations and how we might react.

Program

Norm Blacher introduced the speaker, who happened to be his wife, Joan Blacher. Her talk would cover "how mystery writers make their stories of murder and menace.

Joan briefly described her previous life as an educator:she holds a Ph.D. in Educational Psychology. Her long career culminated in her professorship at the School of Education at Cal Lutheran University. Upon her retirement from there, Joan decided to give up her technical, scolastic writing and become a fiction writer, specifically of mysteries, of which she has penned two novels. This kind of writing was introduced to Jan early in life, as her father would read her Sherlock Holmes novels and her mother was an Agatha Chritie fan.

Joan spoke of the process by which mystery writers come to their stories. There are three basic elements: a twisting plot, compelling charachters, particularly the main protagonist and 'dark sins' that draw the reader in. The



research required for writing a novel can be voluminous and she has often drawn on personal experience to make the stories more authentic.
