Human trafficking includes not only forced prostitution but forced labor in industries including agriculture, hospitality, and domestic services. They shared a video, "Alia's Story," about a girl who was led into prostitution from the age of 13 by her boyfriend; she is now a member of the Ventura County Human Trafficking Task Force. Stacey Zarazua is the Parks & Recreation Director for the City of Ventura. Zarazua oversees the department's three divisions: Parks, Recreation, and Community Partnerships. The department operates over 800 acres of open space, including 46 parks, three community centers, multiple historic sites, a sailing center, an aquatic center, two beaches, and golf services. Zarazua manages current and future park development initiatives and leads 56 full-time staff and over 200 seasonal part-time employees, who work to produce over 1,000 annual programs for all ages. Zarazua joined the Parks & Recreation

Dept. in 2001 as a Recreation Coordinator in the Youth Sports section and was later promoted to Aquatics Supervisor in 2005. Since then, she has held multiple leadership roles within the department, serving in all three divisions. Zarazua holds a bachelor's degree in liberal studies and a master's degree in public administration from California State University Northridge. She is a member of the California Parks and Recreation Society and National Recreation and Park Association. She has volunteered in key organizational leadership positions to advance the field.





Eric Berg is the Principal of Pacific Coast Land Design. Eric's experience and professional passion is three-fold: sustainable site design that emphasizes and exposes green infrastructure and natural processes so that users engage and learn from their environment, public participation as a fundamental practice of design success, and technology. These skills derive from Eric's experience in sustainable design research, design-build practice, higher education, and professional practice. As Principal at PCLD, Eric blends these experiences and passions together to help direct the firm's community

engagement efforts, site design strategies, design detailing, digital workflows, grant writing and administration services, and project/program management services.

Prior to joining the PCLD, Eric lived and worked in Montana where he gained technical expertise in landscape construction and installation working for a design/build landscape contractor. He also briefly served as an Adjunct Professor at his undergraduate alma mater Montana State University, teaching the senior capstone landscape design studio. Eric has been a LEED – Accredited Professional since 2009 and while a graduate student at the University of Washington, Eric worked as a research assistant for the then fledgling Sustainable Sites Initiative, which has since blossomed into USGBC's LEED-SITES rating system for sustainable site design and development. With PCLD, Eric maintains his commitment to education and sustainable design practices, helping train staff, and speaking at various conferences.

Here in Ventura, in addition to his involvement with the new award-winning inclusive playground at Arroyo Verde Park, Eric has played a critical role in the development of several local parks and places. He was also instrumental in the design and development of Kellogg Park on Ventura Ave and is currently managing PCLD's involvement in Ventura's Westview Village; an ongoing 10-year involvement of a massive sustainable site design housing redevelopment project with the San Buenaventura Housing Authority. Eric has also guided PCLD's effort in the grant writing, project design, and construction administration of the Ventura River Trail Improvements, the Westpark Skatepark, and the Marina Park Playground Replacement.
